



### THE PLAINSMEN - PAST AND PRESENT

A forward-looking group of Auburn footballers trot into Tulane Stadium today, full of hope, and with no way to go but up in pigskin circles.

Once a potent SEC football power, the Plainsmen have fallen on evil days of late, but under the tutelage of their new coach Earl Brown, the Alabamians are bent on regaining their former prestige.

Opening the season with a victory against Mississippi Southern and then tying Louisiana Tech, the Plainsmen lost a tough tussle to Florida, and last week ran into the Georgia Tech tornado. On the comeback trail against Tulane, they can be expected to make things interesting for the Green. Torrid Travis Tidwell, sensational tailback whose broken leg is now completely mended, is capable of breaking up any ball game, and his teammates don't have to give anything to Tulane in size.

In pre-war years, the Auburn-Tulane series produced one of football's unique chapters—three stratight years of ties. From 1936 to 1938, neither the Greenies nor the Tigers could push a touchdown across the other's goal, and 0-0 appeared on the scoreboard after each tussle.

Last year, however, the Wave had the Tigers measure to the tune of 40-0—one of the two Tulane victories of 1947. Soon, perhaps today, Auburn is expected to start anew her practice of making things tough for the South's football greats, and climb again into the chosen ranks.

Tulane and Auburn have met 28 times since 1902, when the series began. Six games have ended in ties, and Tulane holds a scant margin of 12 victories to ten defeats.



# THIS IS AUBURN . . .

The Alabama Polytechnic Institute is located at Auburn, in Lee County, Alabama. This strictly college town, with no manufacturing industries, is sometimes referred to as the "loveliest village of the plains," located at the southern border of the Piedmont area where it joins the Coastal Plains.

The college, founded by the Alabama Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1867, became a land-grant college in 1868, and in 1899 became co-educational—one of the first colleges in the South to admit women.

The campus consists of 2,085 acres and there are 35 major buildings. Close to 8,000 students are now enrolled, including 4,000 veteran students.

The college, which has an elective student government, has 21 social fraternities and eight sororities. Fraternities have their own houses while sorority women reside in suites in the women's quadrangle.

Students publish a weekly newspaper entitled "The Plainsman" and the college year book, "Glomerata."

Dr. Ralph Brown Draughton, A.P.I. alumnus, is acting president of the college. He was appointed in August, 1947 following the death of Dr. Luther Noble Duncan.

Athletics at Auburn include a vast intra-mural program of sports for both men and women students. On the intercollegiate level, Auburn competes in football, basketball, baseball, tennis, track, cross-country, wrestling, swimming and golf.

Nicknamed the Tigers, Auburn's colors are burnt orange and blue. Last year's Tigers won 2 and lost seven encounters on the gridiron—a record they will surely surpass in 1948.

Michigan vs. Minnesota—If the smoke ever clears away from this battlefield, survivors will count more dead Gophers than Wolverines.




