Here We Go Again!

It started in 1893, this great tradition of Tulane-L.S.U., and it is small wonder that in the 61 years since the people of Louisiana have never reached accord on whether to cheer for the Green Wave or the Tigers. The arch rivals themselves do not even agree on the standing of the series. Tulane admits that L.S.U. leads, 26 victories to 19 with six ties. The Baton Rouge historians, however, contend that the tally actually should be 27-18-6. Basis of the dispute is the 1901 game in New Orleans, won by Tulane 22-0 but claimed on forfeit by L.S.U. because of the questioned eligibility of a star Olive and Blue halfback.

There remain fans willing and able to reopen the old, unresolved cold war, but there are more moderns who are interested only in what transpires today when the Greenies and Tigers have at each other for the 52nd time.

Tulanians are eagerly considering the possibilities of an upset win, which would completely overcome a modest won-lost record in evaluation of the season's success. L.S.U. adherents have confidence tinged with some anxiousness that their heroes will conquer the Wave for the fourth straight year. Nobody feels that the outcome is understood in advance.

There is no "Wait 'til Next Year" attitude among Coach Andy Pilney's Greenies, although with eight of their first 11, nine of their second team and 10 of their third unit slated to return the future does look bright. Already the young current crew has pulled surprises in tying North Carolina and Alabama and beating Vanderbilt. Today they go for No. 4.

Tulane seniors Captain Eddie Bravo, Alternate Captain Ray Price, Charlie Pittman, Ed McCool, Harry Duvigneaud, Dave McMurray, Charlie Coates, Tommy Ford and Doug Woodruff are playing their final college games. L.S.U. swan songs are by Al Doggett, Dickie Prescott, Ivan Camp, Larry Jones, Phil Beron, Sid Fournet, Joe McAdam, Gary Dildy, Sam-

my Murphy and Larry Mobley.






Medical research has been emphasized at Tulane since it was founded in 1834 by a group of young physicians who organized the Medical College of Louisiana, one of the University's predecessors. Their primary interest was to study and to teach about the diseases then prevailing in the area, notably yellow fever, cholera and endemic malaria. Today's second section of Cam-Pix shows a few scenes of the University's large medical research program. Dr. Maridel Saunders (center) is shown examining a patient with arthritis as part of the school of medicine's newly established balanced program of research and clinical studies on arthritis, rheumatism and related diseases in the Deep South area.

Influence of a hot and humid climate on the heart and blood vessels of the body and influences of other climatic stresses on blood circulation receive a great deal of attention in the department of medicine, directed by Dr. George E. Burch. Here a technician measures blood flow in a patient's limbs and fingertips, a procedure designed by Dr. Burch.



Dr. Walter S. Wilde, (right) professor of physiology, investigates the fundamental processes in heart action through radioactive isotopes. He has devised a technique which provides the first means of tracing the release of radioactive potassium accompanying a single contraction of the heart. The time course of the potassium release is now being correlated with the electrocardiogram of the heart and the heart contraction itself in an effort to achieve a better understanding of the basic processes which connect these three aspects of heart action.






Research on improved methods of childbirth and the health and care of expectant mothers by scientists in the department of obstetrics and gynecology is producing significant results throughout the medical world. The department recently sponsored one of the most extensive research projects of its kind ever conducted by a research team in this country. It involved the study of the use of one of the newer wonder drugs in the treatment and prevention of a disease which causes red blood cells of newborn infants to disintegrate.



Intensive research on new and improved vaccines against epidemic typhus and rabies is being conducted in the division of epidemiology at Tulane with satisfactory results reported to date. Dr. John P. Fox, (left) director of the two projects, explains part of the anti-typhus program to visiting physicians.



Dr. H. Warner Kloepper, human geneticist at Tulane, explains to a class in anatomy his research project which seeks to answer the question of whether susceptibility to paralytic polio is inherited. This is one of several polio research studies which is being conducted in the Tulane school of medicine.

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
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The University



Tulane University is the only private, non-denominational institution of higher learning offering a full university program in a nine-state area extending from California to the Atlantic Seaboard and embracing New Mexico, Arizona, Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Florida.

The University's geographical location has led to a natural emphasis upon a region which includes the Gulf States, much of the Mississippi Valley and a large portion of Latin America. This means that in addition to the basic work of the University, Tulane undertakes specialized instruction and research which no other institution is in a position to perform so well.

The University comprises the College of Arts and Sciences, Newcomb College for women, University College (adult education) and the Schools of Law, Engineering, Medicine, Social Work, Business Administration, Architecture, and Graduate studies. In addition, the Middle American Research Institute, the Urban Life Research Institute, the Comparative Law Institute, the Engineering Research Institute, and the Summer Schools round out its program.

President of the University is Dr. Rufus Carrollton Harris.

The student body of approximately 4,000 full-time students and some 2,000 others who are taking courses in the field of graduate medicine,

University College and other divisions, is drawn from most of the states of the union and from more than a score of foreign countries.

Tulane had its beginning in 1834, when seven young physicians banded together to combat yellow fever and cholera, the city's twin curses of that period. In 1855 the State Constitution established in New Orleans the University of Louisiana with departments of Law, Medicine and Natural Sciences, and Letters.

The University received its name from Paul Tulane of Princeton, N. J., who made his fortune in and around New Orleans and who donated \$1,000,000 to the institution in 1882. His gift, made at a time when the South was financially bankrupt as a result of Civil War, provided a revenue which revived a virtually moribund institution. Through his gift a reorganization of the university was completed. It was separated from the state and its affairs were entrusted to a self-perpetuating board of administrators.

In 1886 Mrs. Josephine Louise Newcomb donated to the Tulane Educational Fund the sum of \$100,000 to be used in establishing the H. Sophie Newcomb Memorial Fund College in the Tulane University of Louisiana in honor of her daughter. She subsequently gave more than \$3,000,000 through gifts and her will. These gifts enabled the Tulane administrators to round out the ideal of the University by creation of an institution which would give to women all the educational advantages which before had been offered only to men.

The campus of a hundred acres is located on St. Charles Avenue, facing Audubon Park, one of the most beautiful in the South.

Tulane Stadium

Tulane Stadium, a massive double-decked structure of steel and concrete, is famous as the home of the Green Wave football teams and of the annual Sugar Bowl Classic. It has an official seating capacity of 80,975.

The stadium is located on the site of the old Etienne de Boré plantation, where sugar was first granulated in this country. It is bounded by Willow and Calhoun streets, Audubon Boulevard and South Claiborne Avenue.

Tulane Stadium was dedicated October 23, 1926, with east and west side stands of reinforced concrete seating some 35,000. In the dedication game Auburn defeated Tulane by the margin of a safety, 2-0. Since then the stadium has been the scene of many memorable touchdowns and the making of important athletic history.

The original stadium was constructed with the financial assistance of the people of New Orleans and vicinity, in recognition of the Green Wave achievements of the early 1920's. More than 6,000 citizens donated \$300,000 in a drive completed in just five days.

Enlargements and improvements of the huge arena have been due largely to efforts of the New Orleans Mid-Winter Sports Association, sponsor of the annual Sugar Bowl Classic. The

Sugar Bowlers' investment at Tulane amounts to more than \$1,250,000.

The first Sugar Bowl game was played January 1, 1935, when Tulane defeated Temple in a 20-14 thriller. An 85-yard touchdown run by Tulane's Claude (Little Monk) Simons was the day's highlight.

The Sugar Bowlers' first step in the enlargement program was taken in 1937 when 14,000 North stand seats were erected through a financial arrangement with the Tulane University Board of Administrators at a cost of \$150,000. In 1939 they followed with a debenture bond issue of \$550,000 to double-deck the structure and boost its capacity to 69,000. Then in 1947 another bond issue of \$500,000 was offered to enlarge the massive bowl to its present capacity.

Stadium improvements have included permanent box seats, portal seats, two electric scoreboards, an electric time flasher, an elevator to the press box and a photographer's roof.

The press box, which has been voted among the nation's best by the Football Writers Association, is 240 feet in length and seats 254 in swivel chairs. There are five booths for radio broadcasting.

Herbert A. Benson served as stadium enlargement architect and A. N. Goldberg as contractor.
