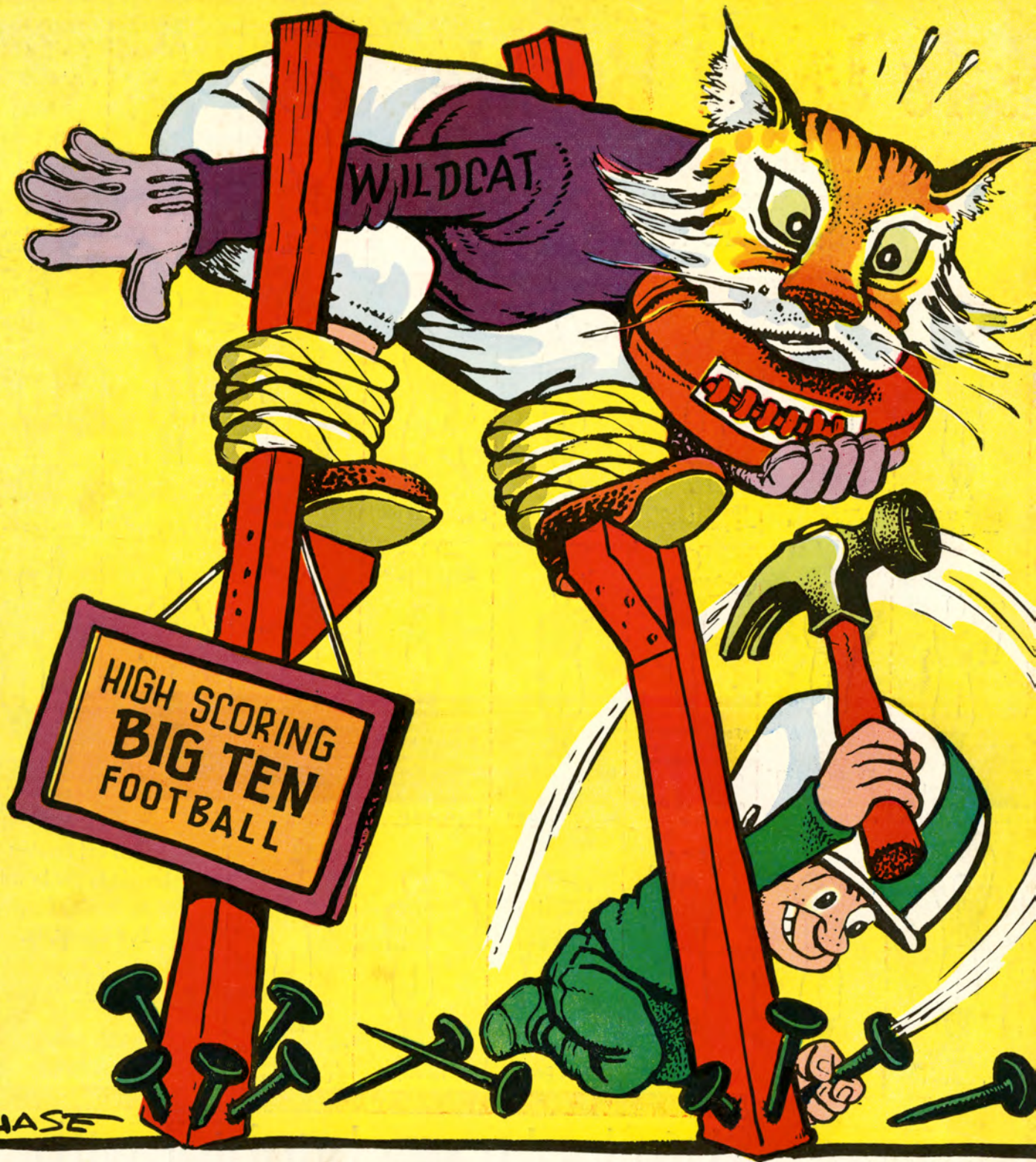

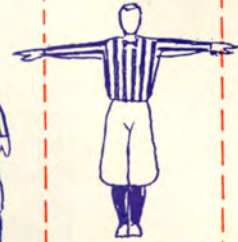

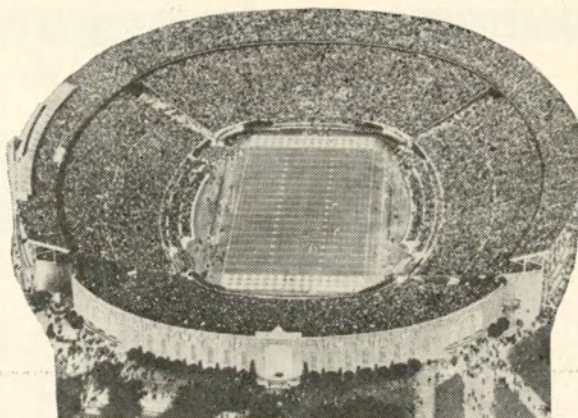

Tulane vs. Northwestern

As long as the Southeastern Conference and Big Ten have football teams, a verbal civil war is likely to burst forth regularly as to the respective merits of the two leagues.

Unfortunately the opportunities for spot comparison are all too few. The S.E.C. and the Big Ten collide only once this season and that is before your eyes today. Thus it is up to the Greenies of Tulane and the Purple of Northwestern to shovel all the 1955 fuel on the fires of friendly controversy.

While this is the first time Tulane and New Orleans have hosted a Big Ten team, the Wave has had five previous engagements with representatives of that group. After bowing to Michigan, 21-0, in 1920, they startled the football world with an 18-7 triumph over Northwestern on October 24, 1925, the date that is being commemorated today in the recognition of men who played on that great team. Northwestern got revenge, 14-0, in 1930, and in 1935 the Wave yielded to mighty Minnesota, 20-0. Then, in the most recent Tulane-Big Ten battle, in 1953, the Greenies had Michigan backing up in the third period before running out of gas and losing, 26-7.

The Tulane-Northwestern rivalry will continue in 1956 at Evanston, but first the Wave is interested in taking the series lead today.



It won't be easy. The men from the north have an impressive collection of young athletes under the leadership of new head coach Lou Saban. Jim (Trigger) Troglia (No. 18) is a senior right halfback who runs and kicks with authority. Captain Sanford Sacks (No. 71) at tackle and Ted Ringer (No. 57) at center are ranking all-conference candidates. Jack Ellis (No. 27) is a competent quarterback hustling ahead after recovery from a 1954 injury. Those are just a few.

The Greenies, too, have outstanding men—co-captains Bryan Burnthorne (60) and Tony Sardisco (64) among them. Catching the imagination of the opening home game crowd were junior fullback Ronny Quillian (40) and sophomore flashes Gene Newton (12) and Al Cottrell (35).

UNBEATEN 1925 TEAM

Here is Coach Clark Shaughnessy's memorable Tulane squad of '25, which went through the season undefeated while running up 246 points to 32 for the opposition.

Two of Tulane's greatest—Lester Lautenschlaeger, captain of the 1925 team, runs interference for Alfred (Brother) Brown, captain of the 1924 team. Lautenschlaeger quarterbacked the Wave to its triumph over Northwestern 30 years ago this fall. Many consider Les to be, in many respects, the top Tulane quarterback of all time. He, like Halfback Brown, was All-Southern.

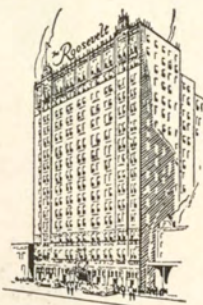

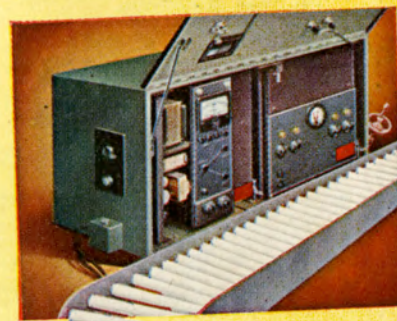

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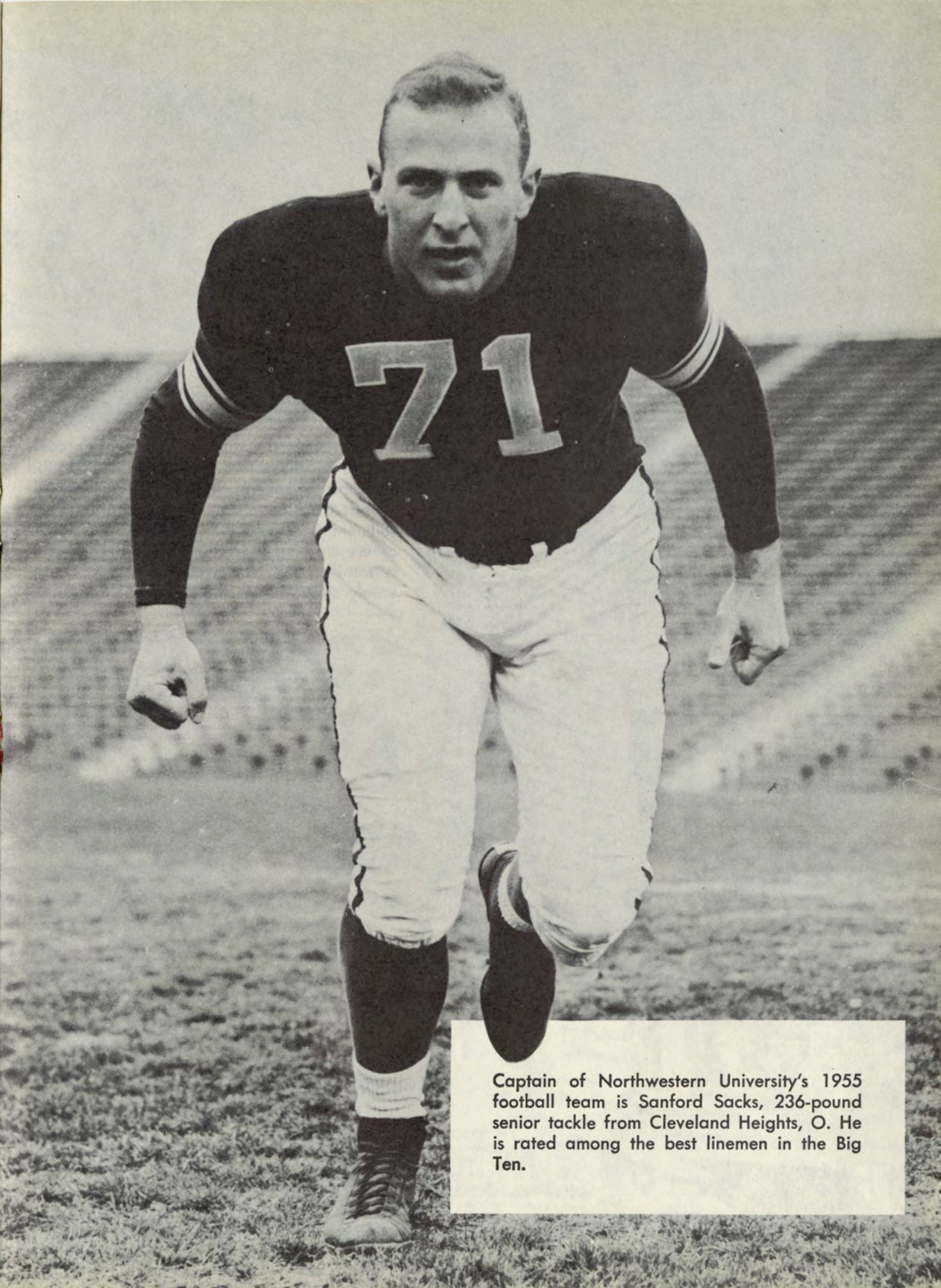

Here is University Hall on the Evanston campus of Northwestern. Founded in 1851 on the shore of Lake Michigan, Northwestern also has a Chicago campus. The full-time enrollment is some 7,800 students, plus 9,000 others enrolled in evening studies. The faculty totals 1,700. Northwestern is the only privately supported institution in the Big Ten.



Northwestern's founders pledged themselves to establish in a near wilderness a "university of the highest order of excellence to serve the entire Northwest territory." Now, 104 years later, the scope is broader. But the pledge to serve remains the same. This beautiful building is Deering Library.

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The University



Tulane University is the only private, non-denominational institution of higher learning offering a full university program in a nine-state area extending from California to the Atlantic Seaboard and embracing New Mexico, Arizona, Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Florida.

The University's geographical location has led to a natural emphasis upon a region which includes the Gulf States, much of the Mississippi Valley and a large portion of Latin America. This means that in addition to the basic work of the University, Tulane undertakes specialized instruction and research which no other institution is in a position to perform so well.

The University comprises the College of Arts and Sciences, Newcomb College for women, University College (adult education) and the Schools of Law, Engineering, Medicine, Social Work, Business Administration, Architecture, and Graduate studies. In addition, the Middle American Research Institute, the Urban Life Research Institute, and the Summer Schools round out its program.

President of the University is Dr. Rufus Carrollton Harris.

The student body, approximately 4,000 full-time students and some 2,000 others who are taking courses in the field of graduate medicine,

University College and other divisions, is drawn from most of the states of the union and from more than a score of foreign countries.

Tulane had its beginning in 1834, when seven young physicians banded together to combat yellow fever and cholera, the city's twin curses of that period. In 1847 the State Legislature established in New Orleans the University of Louisiana with departments of Law, Medicine and Natural Sciences, and Letters.

The University received its name from Paul Tulane of Princeton, N. J., who made his fortune in and around New Orleans and who donated \$1,000,000 to the institution in 1882. His gift, made at a time when the South was financially bankrupt as a result of Civil War, provided a revenue which revived a virtually moribund institution. Through his gift a reorganization of the university was completed. It was separated from the state and its affairs were entrusted to a self-perpetuating board of administrators.

In 1886 Mrs. Josephine Louise Newcomb donated to the Tulane Educational Fund the sum of \$100,000 to be used in establishing the H. Sophie Newcomb Memorial College in the Tulane University of Louisiana in honor of her daughter. She subsequently gave more than \$3,000,000 through gifts and her will. These gifts enabled the Tulane administrators to round out the ideal of the University by creation of an institution which would give to women all the educational advantages which before had been offered only to men.

The campus of 130 acres is located on St. Charles Avenue, facing Audubon Park, one of the most beautiful in the South.

Tulane Stadium

Tulane Stadium, a massive double-decked structure of steel and concrete, is famous as the home of the Green Wave football teams and of the annual Sugar Bowl Classic. It has an official seating capacity of 80,985.

The stadium is located on the site of the old Etienne de Boré plantation, where sugar was first granulated in this country. It is bounded by Willow and Calhoun streets, Audubon Boulevard and South Claiborne Avenue.

Tulane Stadium was dedicated October 23, 1926, with east and west side stands of reinforced concrete seating some 35,000. In the dedication game Auburn defeated Tulane by the margin of a safety, 2-0. Since then the stadium has been the scene of many memorable touchdowns and the making of important athletic history.

The original stadium was constructed with the financial assistance of the people of New Orleans and vicinity, in recognition of the Green Wave achievements of the early 1920's. More than 6,000 citizens donated \$300,000 in a drive completed in just five days.

Enlargements and improvements of the huge arena have been due largely to efforts of the New Orleans Mid-Winter Sports Association, sponsor of the annual Sugar Bowl Classic. The

Sugar Bowlers' investment at Tulane amounts to more than \$1,250,000.

The first Sugar Bowl game was played January 1, 1935, when Tulane defeated Temple in a 20-14 thriller. An 85-yard touchdown run by Tulane's Claude (Little Monk) Simon was the day's highlight.

The Sugar Bowlers' first step in the enlargement program was taken in 1937 when 14,000 North stand seats were erected through a financial arrangement with the Tulane University Board of Administrators at a cost of \$150,000 to double-deck the structure and boost its capacity to 69,000. Then in 1947 another bond issue of \$500,000 was offered to enlarge the massive bowl to its present capacity.

Stadium improvements have included permanent box seats, portal seats, two electric scoreboards, an electric time flasher, an elevator to the press box and a photographers' roof.

The press box, which has been voted among the nation's best by the Football Writers Association, is 240 feet in length and seats 254 in swivel chairs. There are five booths for radio broadcasting.

Herbert A. Benson served as stadium enlargement architect and A. N. Goldberg as contractor.

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
