The Committee on Finance & Instru-
tion held a meeting this evening &

Communication. We take this mode of
informing you of very serious charges
that have been filed against you as an
instructor in this Association. We desire
to keep this matter a secret from the
rest of the Association in respect for your feelings
but we wish to be understood that the
interests of the Association require us to
perform our duty. The following are the
charges.

1st That you were absent from your
post as a teacher since Thursday Jan 27th
to date, without giving any notice or
excuse to the other instructors & causing
thereby serious Complaint among the pupils.
2nd It has been reported in good au-
thority to this Committee that on Wednesday
the 27th of Jan you ^{came to the school} were in a condition

incapable of attending to your duties
as an instructor, and that one of the
lady pupils, was very much angered &
mortified thereby

3rd That you have been exceedingly negligent
in failing to pay bills, when the money
was intrusted to you for that purpose
thereby endangering the Credit of the Assn.

4th On Wednesday the 29th Jan'y at
Krook's Saloon you were guilty of the
indiscretion of saying before strangers
that there were flirtations sometimes
carried on ~~at~~ the school at the windows
between young ladies & parties in the
street thereby injuring the Character of
the school by giving it a bad reputa-
-tion when such charges are not
warranted by the facts.

We do not wish to be forced to
the necessity of mortifying you by making
a public report of these matters to the
Association but desire therefore to communicate
with you privately

We do not discharge you but hereby
notify you that you are ~~resigned~~ for the
present suspended as an instructor on
virtue of the power vested in us by
Article 11 of Constitution.

In the meantime you shall
have opportunity of making any

4 case or justification.

We desire to give you a full hearing before proceeding any further in the matter & will give you our authority for these charges any time ^{that} you will decide it by notifying Mr. Molinary or Mr. Poincey & for the present we shall make no report to the Association.

We regret very much being compelled to address you an epistle of this character but hope you will consider it in the light of a disagreeable duty to be performed ~~with~~ by this Committee.
