PRESENTATION TO COL. BORLAND.

Among the first organizations to take the initiative against the Kellogg usurpation, and, indeed, the foremost, was Louisiana's Own, or, as it was then known, the first Regiment of Louisiana militia, of which that gallant officer, the late Gen. Angell, was the colonel. This regiment was formed long before its existence was known, and tendered its services for no matter what desperate *coup d'etat*. In this regiment Col. Euclid Borland, Jr., then Captain of Company A, was one of the leading spirits. When the issue came, and the 14th of September arcused the people, that regiment did untiring and gallant service, and Company A conspicuously.

Now that we have settled down to the quietude of peace, it was scarcely possible for the many associations of that exciting time to be forgotten, and last night was an evidence of the fact. Company A, Louisiana's Own, or what is now known as the Crescent Greys, took occasion to revivify them. After a pleasant meeting of the company, to which Col. Borland had been invited, Clement W. Gowland, a lieutenant of the company, stepped forward and in an earnest and heartfelt address presented his colonel with a beautiful regulation sword and belt. Col. Borland, with that coolness that is proof against surprise, responded in feeling terms, and afterwards, well, afterwards it's hard to say what happened, but then soldiers know what.

The sword is of handsome workmanship, exquisitely balanced, and has a blade as beautiful as it is rare. With it are two scabbards, one for dress, the other for service. The hilt is heavily plated in gold, and the grip carefully finished. Take it all in all, it is one of the finest pieces of sword workmanship we have seen of late.

AN INCIDENT OF THE FOURTEENTH.

In consequence of one of those slips which are often deplored but never accounted for, Capt. Smith's fine company, belonging to Col. E. Bolland's regiment, was omitted in our report of the Fourteenth of September pageant. They were present, however, and made a fine display, notwithstanding the following occurrence, which happened to them a while before going into line. As they were leaving their headquarters to take their place in the line, First Lieutenant Selles peremptorily ordered a halt, much to the surprise of Capt. Smith, for our friend Selles is a model soldier. Simultaneously appeared on the scene a welcome visitor in charge of a "thing" holding enough to furnish "forty drops" to a company. Order being restored, Selles "spoke a piece" thus:

Dear Captain—On behalf of the officers and men of your command, I am assigned the pleasing task of expressing to you, on this day of congratulations and friendly reciprocities, the high regard and affection which they have for you as their leader, because of the sterling qualities of the gentleman and the soldier, and for that constant devotion to our State which aided in her redemption. Her bosom swells with grateful emotion at the recollection of those deeds which on the day whose anniversary we celebrate won for her gallant sons universal admiration. Her voice cannot sound too high the praises of the civilians who, unmindful of personal interests, their comforts and even their lives, in the face of bristling bayonets and threatening cannon, with high resolve and unwavering step marched to her deliverance, and, as freemen must ever do, accomplished it, and swept away the vile minion of a tyranny more galling than any ever thrust on a civilized people.

Proud indeed may she be at those wars, unmasking the false deity that presided over her destinies and exposed to the indignant gaze and execration of the American people the grim, and at the same time ludicrous, face of heinous usurpation, trembling and cowering under the tutelar folds of Ulysses' cloak; proud indeed may she be, for their valor regained and re-enthroned on her fair brow her ancestral disdem, and while we are here assembled to celebrate the anniversary so pregnant with memories of the past and hopes of the future, our hearts beating in unison with those of all true sons of Louisiana in paying tribute to the memory of our fallen heroes, it is meet that we should honor also those who, having shared their danger, *might* also have shared their graves. Your company, therefore, deem it proper to present you with this sword "as a token of their regard."

Its hilt is not resplendent with the gems of Golconda, but in the lustre of its glistening steel sparkles the memories of a day that will be forever green in the hearts of our people. In presenting it to you we feel that no worthier hand could wield it, and, should the voice of country summon us again to arm in her defence, then, to whatever spot that sword may point, history again shall record deeds worthy of "Her Own."

Here, in the name of him whose honored name we bear, take it.

Capt. Smith, being utterly unable to reply to an address so cultured and elegant, could only briefly return his thanks. So drawing it from its scabbard, he said, "I tender you a soldier's salute, and pledge you on its bright blade a soldier's faith."

The aforesaid "forty drops" were then distributed by the artistic hand of "Frank" of the St. Charles bar, as a marching ration, and he was unanimously voted No. 1. The company then took its place in line for the work of the day.
