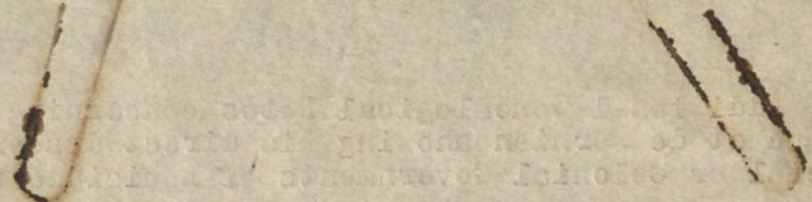


Additional Genealogical Notes concerning George Campbell La Bedoyere Huchet de Kernion showing his direct descent from members of the Provincial or Colonial Governments of Louisiana under French and Spanish Rule.

- 1 - George Campbell La Bedoyere Huchet de Kernion, born in N.O., La. on Jan. 15, 1878, son of Anatole La Bedoyere Huchet de Kernion, veteran of 1861-65 (C.S.A.) and ^Manny Evelina Heloise Campbell.
- 2- Anatole La Bedoyere Huchet de Kernion, born in N.O., La. on December 21, 1838, died in N.O., La. on June 16, 1909, son of Crispin Charles La Bedoyere Huchet de Kernion, planter in N.O., veteran of 1812 (Having fought in the battle of New Orleans), born in N.O. on October 25, 1796, died in N.O. on December 5, 1846, and of Euphemie Aimee Lambert, born in N. O. in 1804 and died in N.O. on July 4, 1877. Married in N.O. on Jan. 28, 1822.
- 3 - Crispin Charles La Bedoyere Huchet de Kernion, son of Jean Rene Huchet, ecuyer, Sieur de Kernion, former french militia officer in the french province of Louisiana, later Ordinary Alcalde in the Spanish Cabildo of Louisiana, in 1785 under Galvez, which said Jean Rene Huchet de Kernion was born in N.O. in 1737, and died about 1792 in N.O. The mother of Crispin Charles H. de K. was Marie Modeste Josephe de Verges de St. Sauveur, daughter of Pierre de Verges de St. Sauveur (french officer in La. who in 1758 took part in the fight against the english at Fort Duquesne, Illinois, and with Jumonville de Villiers and 500 french soldiers, compelled Colonel Greene and our immortal George Washington and 900 english troops to capitulate. This Pierre de Verges had married Marie Josephe Catherine Poupert, of Mobile, widow of the Sieur Antoine Griffon d'Anneville
- 4 Jean Rene Huchet, ecuyer, Sieur de Kernion, son of Jean Francois Huchet, ecuyer, Sieur de Kernion, born in Quimper, France, on December 28, 1700, and of Jeanne Antoinette de Mirebaize de Villemont, (daughter of Henri Martin de Mirebaize, ecuyer, Sieur de Villemont, one of the earliest concessionaires in the French Province of Louisiana, and of Antoinette Fourrier).
- 5 - Jean Francois Huchet, ecuyer, Sieur de Kernion, son of Guillaume Huchet, ecuyer, Sieur du Rest (of Quimper, Brittany, France) and of Thomase Renee Guesdon de Keravel, was a french officer in the Province of Louisiana, owner of a large estate or plantation on Bayou St. John, who came to Louisiana on the ship "La Loire" in 1720, as officer on the ship's staff, then was appointed by H. M. the King of France as Councillor Assessor of the Sovereign Council of the Province of La. on March 1, 1748, and later, or in 1662 was granted letters patent by the king of France as Titulary Councillor of the Sovereign Council of Louisiana. He took a very important part in the affairs of the early french colony and was a conspicuous figure in the rebellion of the french of Louisiana against the spanish, when Governor O'Reilly put to death several of the most important men of La. for rebellion, among whom was Chauvin de Lery, a near relative by marriage of Jean Francois Huchet de Kernion.
- 6 - Guillaume Huchet, ecuyer, Sieur du Rest, son of Jean Huchet, and Marie Le Lievre de Boisdanet. This family is one of the oldest in Brittany, tracing their direct descent from Bertrand Huchet, Sieur de La Bedoyere, who in 1400, or thereabout, was Keeper of the Seals of the Sovereign Duke John V of Brittany, and his ambassador to England to negotiate some official business there with the Count of Stafford. The origin of the Huchet family of France, is lost in the mists of antiquity.

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
