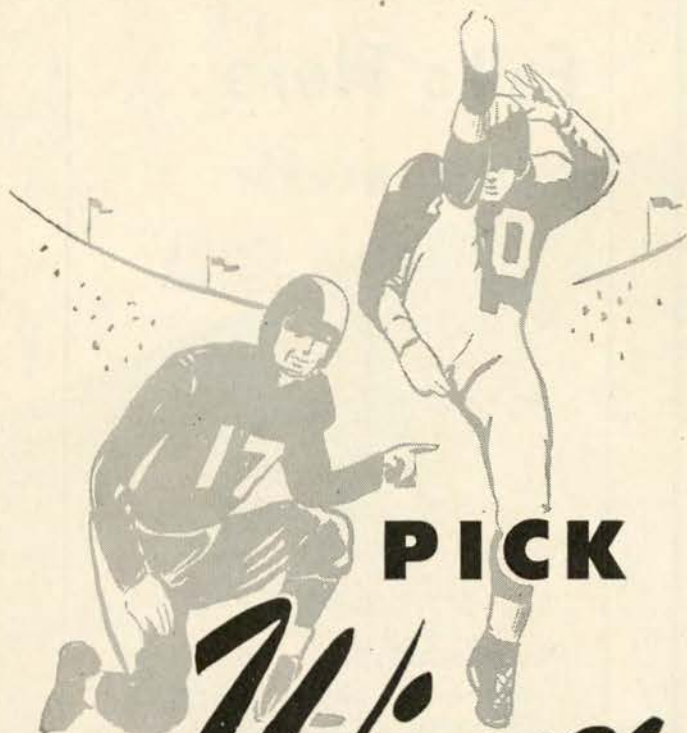

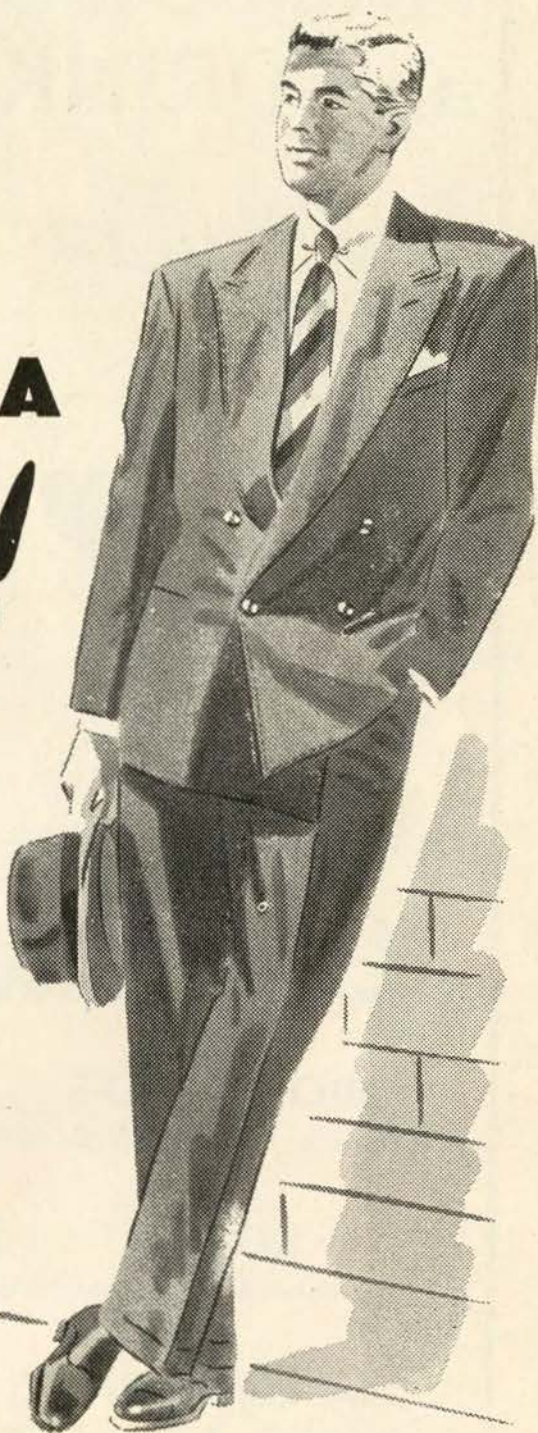

"HULLABALOO" TO MUSIC

A new Tulane song will make its debut at half-time today.

Although it has existed in another form for years until it has become a Tulane tradition, it will be played and sung as a song for the first time at today's game.

Its title is "Hullabaloo" theme of one of the most spirited cheers in collegiate history.

The new song was composed by John J. Morrissey, professor of music in Tulane's college of arts and sciences and director of the Tulane band. Professor Morrissey will lead the band during the premiere performance today.

Words to "Hullabaloo" were written by Lucy Lee Wing, research associate at the University and former chairman of Tulane's Campus Night productions.

Here they are:

"With a Hullabaloo and a Ray-Ray-Ray
We'll go hullabalooing along.
Backing the backs when they're running a play,
Toasting the team with a song,
And we'll pull for TU with a Ray-Ray-Ray
Knowing we'll never go wrong.
With a T - U - L - A - N - E
Hullabalooing along."

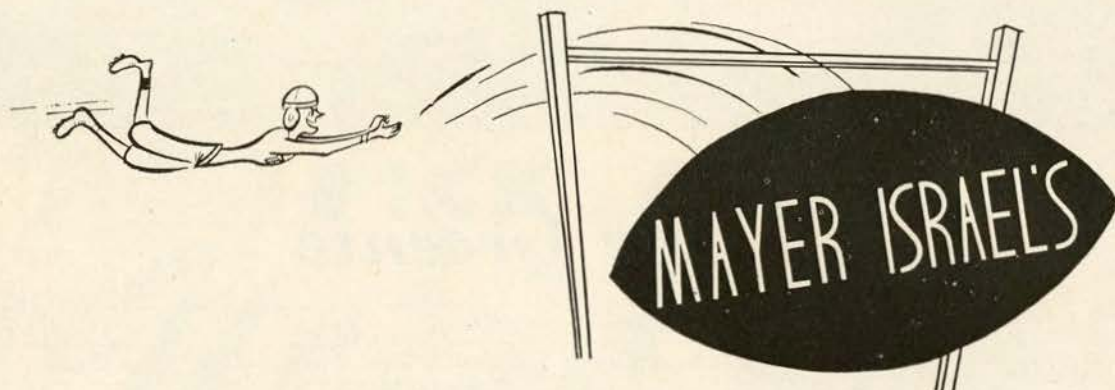
In introducing the new song, the band will form on the east side of the Stadium, facing the west side. It will march toward the Tulane stands, stopping near the sidelines. After a fanfare, "Hullabaloo" will be played slowly in order that the fans may pick up the tempo. Large cards with the words of the song on them will be held up as each half-sentence is played, synchronized with the music. After completion, the band will swing into a march tempo.

One of the South's outstanding composers, Professor Morrissey has written his first college song in "Hullabaloo." It is also the first time the Tulane marching band has premiered a Morrissey composition. Each year since 1941, war years excepted, the Tulane concert band has presented an original Morrissey composition at the annual Spring concert of the band.

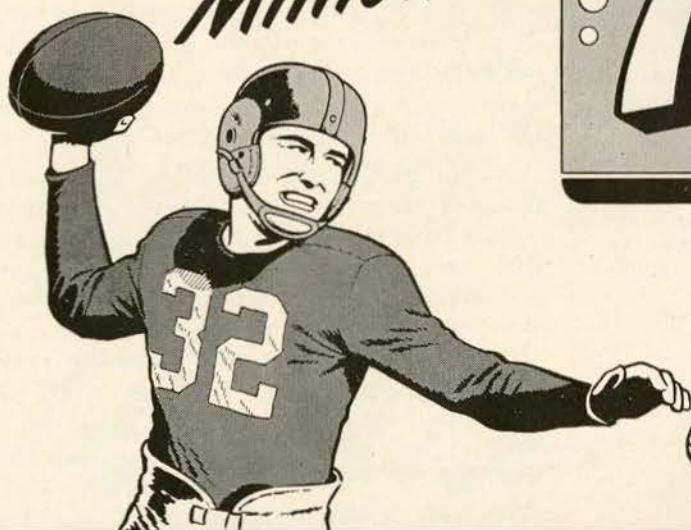

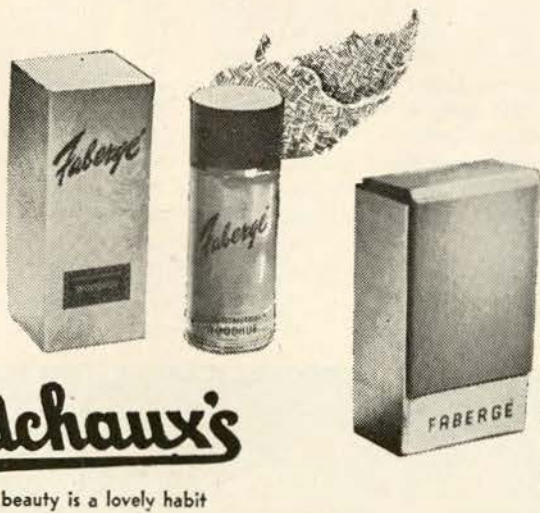

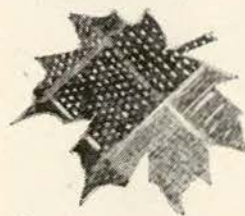

TODAY'S GAME

The Gold and Black of Vanderbilt University—Tulane's opponent today— makes its appearance in Tulane Stadium for the first time in eight years this afternoon, bent on evening up the series. In ten games that date back as far as 1902 the Commodores have come out ahead four times as compared with the Wave's five wins, the other game ending in a tie. Not since 1928 when the Green Wave went down 32-0, has a Vanderbilt team triumphed.

Beaten only twice in nine games thus far in 1950, Bill Edwards' eleven is replete with stars, best known of which Ernest Jackson (Bucky) Curtis, a lithe and fleet-footed left end who specializes in gaining an enormous bit of grid-iron turf every time he catches a forward pass. Curtis is fast approaching the national all-time record of 820 yards gained via pass receiving.

The ball which Curtis catches has its point of origin from the arm of quarterback Bill Wade, as able a thrower of the pigskin as can be found in the nation. This combination of Wade to Curtis has paid off for Vandy against such teams as Auburn, Alabama, Ole Miss, and Arkansas.

This is Edwards' second year with the "T" formation, and the Commodore outfit looks like it has the right combination for such a game. One reason is that the Vandy attack is spear-headed at times with a fast break-away fullback—almost a must for a "T" team.

The fullback of which we speak is Jim Tabor, often called the "Big Train" by people up and around Nashville. He's a fast and rugged 200 pounder who is nearing the mark of 500 yards gained in 1950. He'll be sharing those line-busting duties with Dean Davidson, a converted fullback to halfback, who has the best yard average on the Commodore team.

A hard-charging, potent Green Wave will match Vandy with its new found passing attack of Joe Ernst to Joe Shinn, Ferdie Kibodeaux, Gale Kirkpatrick, or W. A. McElhannon. In the Wave's last game against the Virginia Cavaliers quarterback Joe Ernst missed by one completion the record of 11 consecutive pass-completions set by Charley Conerly and Eddie Prokop. As a team last Saturday the Wave completed 12 consecutive passes—10 by Ernst, and one each by Bill Bonar and Harold Waggoner. Ernst secured 148 yards against the Cavaliers to boast his season total to 722 yards in completing 49 of 87 passes attempted.

For the running attack, the Wave will rely on the abilities of George Kinek, Ronnie Kent, and Hal Waggoner, with some help by Ellsworth Kingery and Vernon Van Meter.

Last season's Tulane-Vanderbilt game was a Green Wave triumph, the game ending 41-14. A victory this year against the Commodores would give the Wave a season's record of six victories as against two defeats with one game remaining.

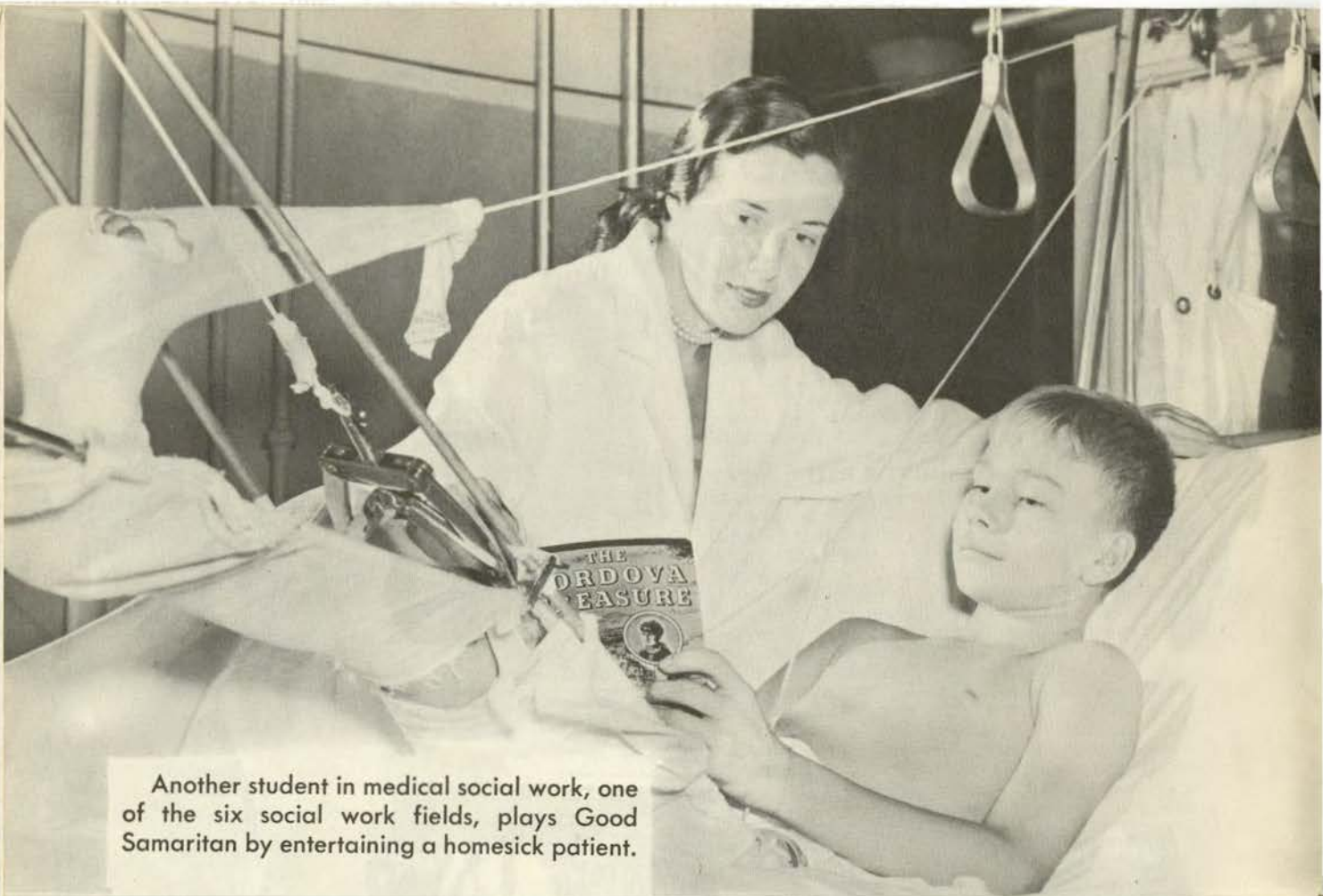

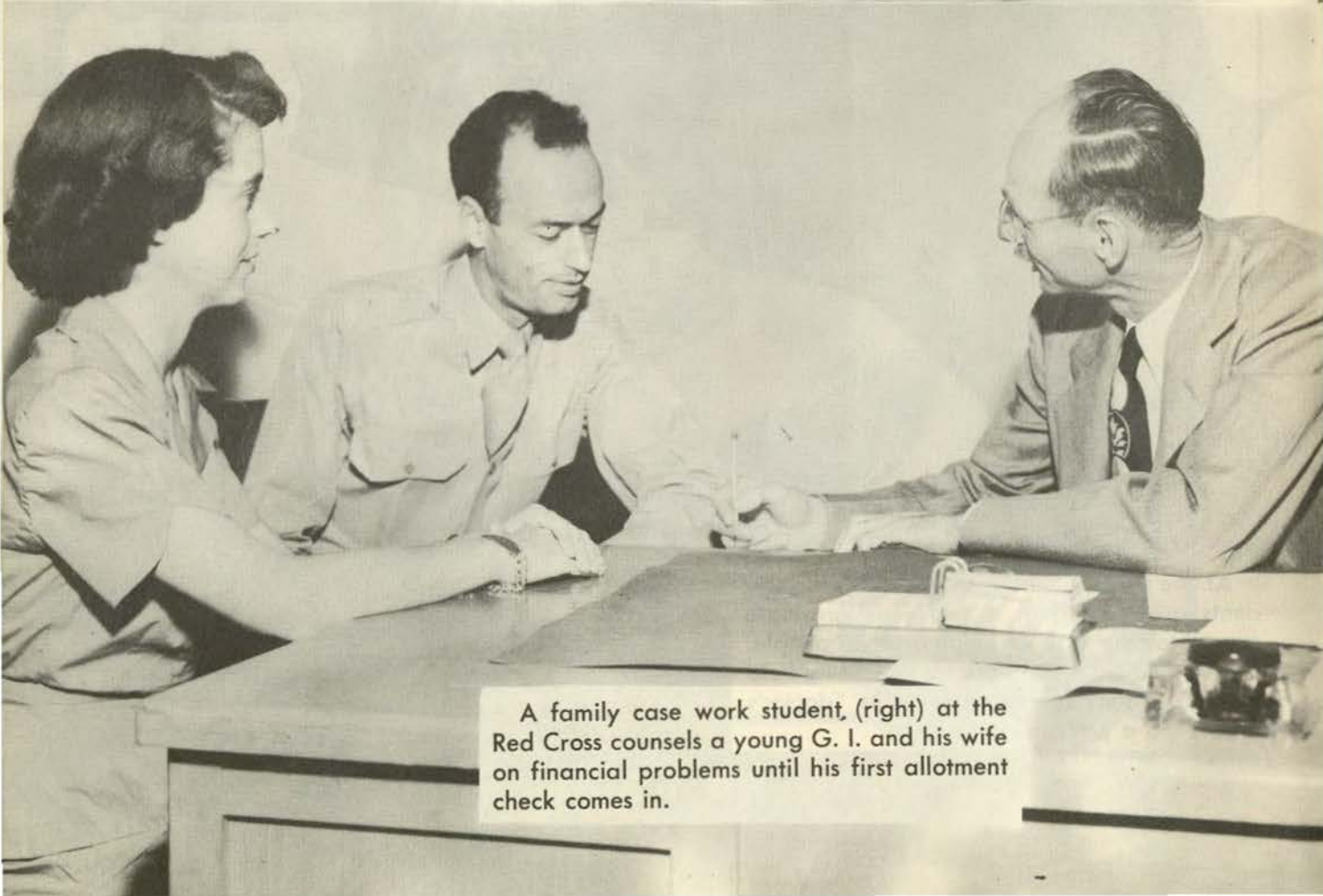

Another student in medical social work, one of the six social work fields, plays Good Samaritan by entertaining a homesick patient.



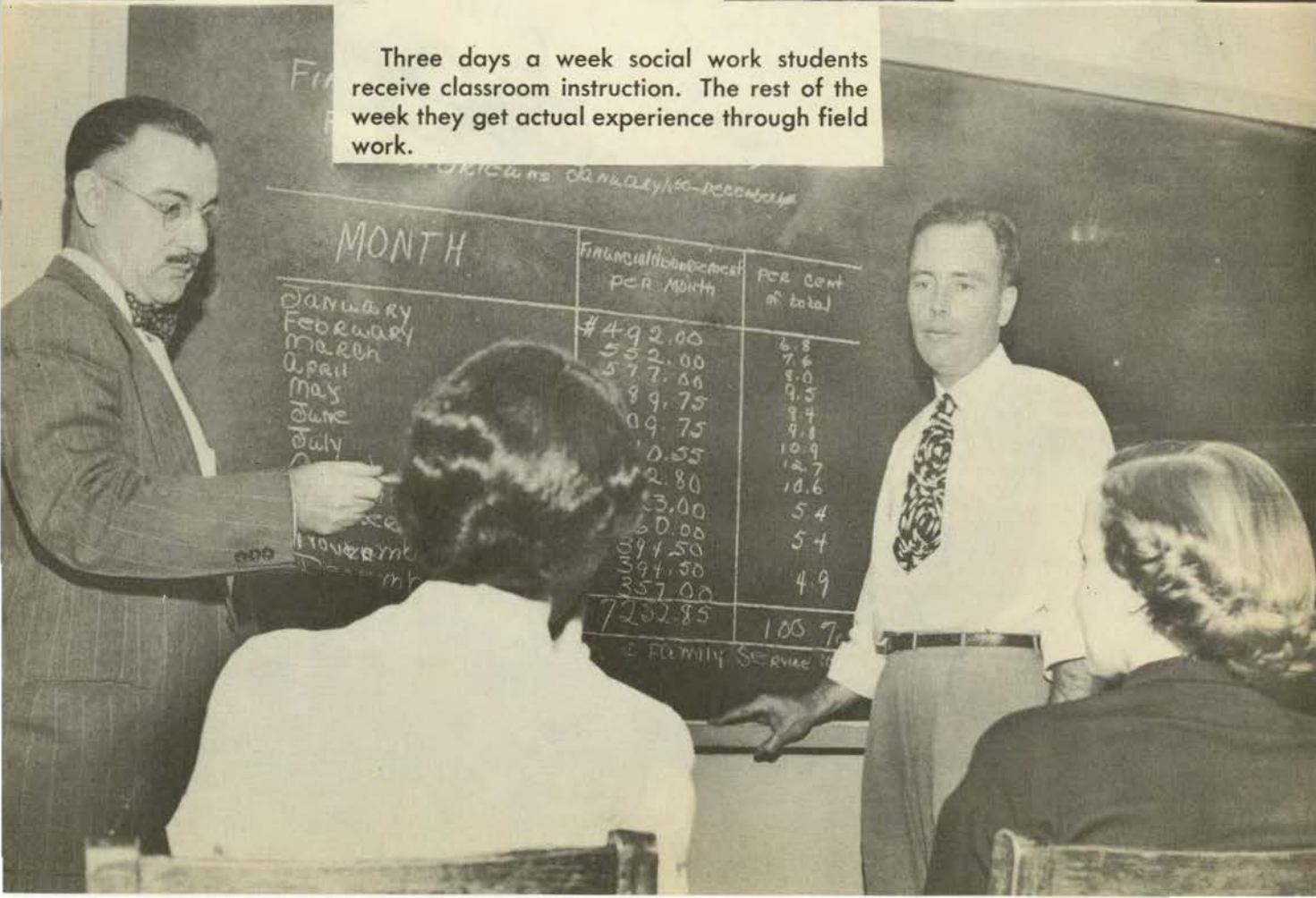
