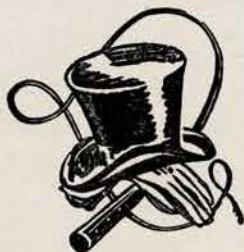

Grange, Nevers, Oberlander, Wilson, Tryone, Friedman and others were in the limelight so that Flournoy had to be good to keep up with the company in which he was placed.

In Bill Banker, Tulane has a fine successor to Flournoy, with Ike Armstrong as a running mate. Banker was unquestionably one of the greatest backs in the

Having seen enough of Georgia Tech to know that the Tornado is no set-up under any circumstances, so long as "Bill" Alexander is doing the coaching. I look for Tulane to have a rugged afternoon against the former champions. Nevertheless Tulane has leaped off to a fine start, with an advance show of strength that ranks with any team in Dixie.

This may very well be "Tulane's Year", with Banker and Armstrong to furnish the fireworks, aided by a strong and well-balanced line featuring the work of Morris Bodenger at guard.

THE SCORE BOARD

Watch It Carefully For Complete Information

Often only the officials and captains know what a certain penalty is for. We have sketched out the following to inform you. Each penalty is numbered below. When a penalty is inflicted the number of that penalty will be hung on the score board.

Please understand violations of rules are rarely intentional. They usually come from over-anxiousness, excitement and most often from the highly technical character of the present game.
