OFF-SIDE
Hands on and off hips—repeat several times.



ILLEGAL POSITION OR PROCEDURE
Hands revolving in front of chest.



ILLEGAL MOTION OR SHIFT
Horizontal arm with either hand.



ILLEGAL DELAY OR EXTRA TIME OUT
Folded arms.



ILLEGAL USE OF HANDS OR ARMS
Grasping one wrist.



UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT
Arms outstretched, palms down.



SAFETY
Palms together overhead.



INTENTIONAL GROUNDEDING
Both hands over right shoulder then down hard and forward.



FORWARD PASS OR FAIR CATCH INTERFERENCE
Pushing arms forward, palm vertical.



BALL ILLEGALLY TOUCHED, KICKED OR BATTED
Lapping both shoulders with finger tips.



INCOMPLETE FORWARD PASS; PENALTY DECLINED, NO PLAY OR NO SCORE
Hands rapidly criss-crossed in horizontal plane.



BALL DEAD
One arm aloft, open hand. If hand is closed, TOUCHBACK.



UNNECESSARY ROUGHNESS
Military salute. CLIPPING
Salute followed by slapping back of knee with hand. RUNNING INTO OR ROUGHING KICKER
Salute followed by swinging leg to simulate a punt.



TIME-OUT
Hands rapidly criss-crossed overhead.



CRAWLING, HELPING THE RUNNER OR INTERLOCKED INTERFERENCE
Pushing movement with hands below waist.



TOUCHDOWN OR FIELD GOAL
Both arms aloft and held rigid.



ILLEGAL FORWARD PASS
Waving hand behind back.



FIRST DOWN
Vigorous throwing motion concluded with outstretched arm pointing toward offensive goal.



START THE CLOCK OR NO MORE TIME-OUTS ALLOWED
Full arm circles to simulate winding a clock.

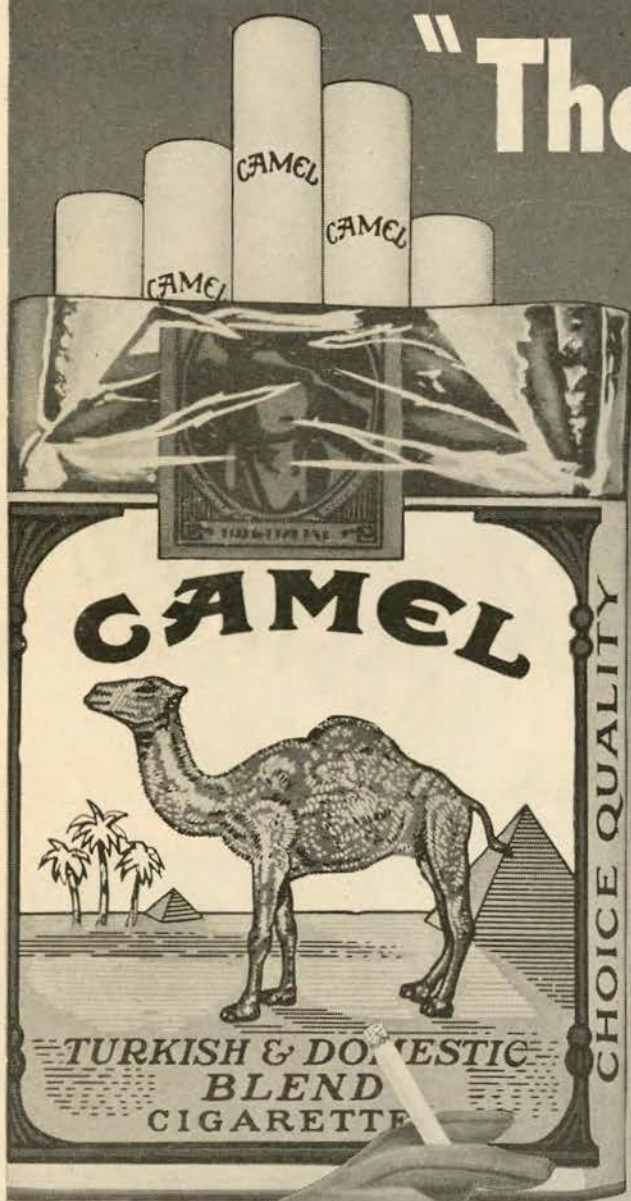

TULANE-CLEMSON

In its sixth home game of the season, the Tulane Green Wave today plays host to the Clemson College Tigers.

Coached by Frank Howard, the Tigers are the only Southern Conference foe on the Tulane schedule and the third representative of a major conference to play the Green Wave this season. Rice's Owls of the Southwest Conference and four Southeastern Conference teams have met the Green Wave thus far.

The Tigers will make their seventh appearance in Tulane Stadium today. Clemson first met a Tulane eleven in 1937 when the Tigers were being directed by Coach Jess Neely.

The Green Wave earned a one-touchdown, 7-0 decision in the series opener, but the following year the Clemsons gained a hard-fought 13-10 victory in probably the most exciting game of the series.

In 1939, two grid powerhouses collided and when the dust had settled, Tulane emerged with a 7-6 victory. That and a 14-14 tie with North Carolina were the closest scrapes the Greenies had that year, continuing to roll over eight opponents right into the Sugar Bowl against Texas A. & M. Clemson, too, won eight games and was

victorious in the Cotton Bowl game against Boston College.

Tulane triumphed again in 1940, 13-0, and after a short lapse play began anew in 1944, when the Green Wave earned a 36-20 victory on a muddy field.

Last season, the highest scoring game of the series was played, as a rugged Clemson eleven upset the Greenies 47-20, making use of every razzle-dazzle trick in the book. In all, Tulane has won four of six games played.

This South Carolina eleven seems always to be in peak form when it meets the Green Wave and has always produced plenty of thrills and close ball games. This year should be no exception.

The Tigers are fresh from a 14-7 victory over V.P.I., lone conquerors of North Carolina State, and have a record of two wins in six starts. They've turned in creditable performances but dropped close decisions to such Southern powers as Georgia, Wake Forest and North Carolina State.

The Green Wave has scored two victories in five contests. Losses have been to contending conference elevens like Mississippi State, Alabama and Rice.

Following its only actual road trip of the season next week, the Tulane Green Wave returns to Tulane Stadium on November 23 to take on the University of Notre Dame in the feature of the 1946 Homecoming celebration.

Next Saturday afternoon, Tulane will journey to Atlanta, Ga. to meet its fifth Southeastern Conference foe, Georgia Tech, before a sellout crowd which will pack Grant Field.

Plans are being laid to make the 1946 homecoming a memorable occasion. Last season, Tulane celebrated its first post-war homecoming following the wartime "alumni day" activities.

Activities begin on Friday, November 22 when registration will take place at the Student Center from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m. That night a student-alumni Tulane Band concert and campus night is scheduled in McAlister Auditorium followed by a pep meeting on the eve of the Notre Dame battle.

An Alumni dance will be held from 9:30 p. m. to 12:30 p. m. at the Claiborne Room of the St. Charles Hotel Friday night also.

Tulane's "T" Club will celebrated its first anniversary with the annual breakfast at the St. Charles Hotel at 8:30 a. m. Registration will continue at the Student Center Saturday morning from 9:30 a. m. to 11:00 a. m.

A business meeting of the Tulane Alumni Association will take place in the Student Center at 11:00 a. m. and will be followed by a luncheon in the Student Center at noon to which all alumni and their wives or husbands are invited.

The football game starts at 2:15 p. m. and will include halftime ceremonies at which the Homecoming Court will be presented and its queen crowned.

In addition to these activities, alumni and classes of the various colleges of Tulane university are planning reunions, dances and luncheons as a part of the homecoming program.

Tulane's 17 fraternity houses will be decorated elaborately for the occasion and the one with the most original trappings will be awarded a trophy.

Homecoming activities will come to a fitting end Saturday night with a mammoth dance in the Municipal Auditorium at which one of America's most prominent orchestras will play.
