Football ticket prices at Tulane University are below the average, a survey of prices of twenty leading American universities reveals.

While prices for reserved seats on the sides of the playing field are proportionately the same despite the fact that Tulane's tickets include a 5% city tax not assessed against the others, the Wave tickets for end zone prices are considerably under the average.



In addition, the survey reveals that Tulane's general admission are among the few where all seats are reserved. In most instances, the price calls for temporary bleacher seats at the ends.

Tulane, too, is among the few schools where children are admitted at all games at a quarter and high school pupils at 40 cents. Most universities do not have such prices for children and where they do have such a scale the number is extremely limited. Tulane has 5,000 seats in permanent stands for such admissions at all games.

ON THE RAIL

UPGRADE:

A loss, a tie, and a win is the present record of this edition of the Tulane Green Wave. Now, that doesn't look any too good, does it? To the average person glancing at that record, it would seem that the Wave was not much of a ball club. Why most any club could do that, and it certainly wasn't anything to shout about. So why all the noise.

Well, friend, this is why. We will be real honest and confess that on paper the above listing of games won and lost is not a close comparison to the recent record set by the Yanks in their yearly outing with the National league's representatives, but we like it and for this reason. The Wave is slowly, but most surely going up the grade.

First they met the Tiger of Clemson. The Green went out in front, took it rather easy, were caught napping, and ended up on the short end of the score. Now, Clemson was good, but they haven't ruined anybody since beating Tulane. Next came the Tiger from the Plains of Auburn. He was a tougher Tiger, and the Wave did not go out in front. And he may not sound as tough as one of the Bengal clan, but he was a rougher, tougher, and better job than his predecessors. Tulane scored, Carolina scored and the game stood at seven-all. Then Tulane scored again, three points this time. Carolina tallied for seven more numbers, and they led 14-10. Thus is stood in the last period. And what did the Wave do about it? Well, the club took the ball on its own 34-yard line, and Carolina didn't get it again until they had scored both a touchdown and an extra point. Yes, sir, Tulane drove 66 yards down the field, playing the ole time Wave football, to come from behind and win the game. That, friend, will give you an idea of what we are shouting about. Tulane beat a first class team and beat them the hard way.

THE HOOTING OWL:

This afternoon we have before us the much vaunted Owl of Rice Institute from Houston, Texas. Pre-season dope put this team at the head of the class. Since that time they have been licked twice, both times by mighty close scores. Thus we are looking at an outfit that has blood in its eye and whatever else it takes to get plenty mad about the whole thing. Yes, we are entertaining a very ruf-fled Owl.

Tulane is on the way up, and Rice is on the way back. Hence, we may expect the worst of collisions when they collide. ON OTHER FIELDS:

Let us glance around at the other major encounters of the day on the football front. The big outfits are moving towards the games that will make or break their seasons. At Knoxville two topnotch teams will meet in a contest that may decide the winner of the conference crown for this year. For, up in eastern Tennessee the mighty Tide of Alabama will do battle with the also powerful Volunteer aggregation of Tennessee. And if the Tide can come out of this contest on the right side, they will be fairly well on the road to the championship. Every year the rest of the conference spends several months kicking about the so-called easy schedule that 'Bama plays. Well, if anybody wants to tackle Tennessee, Tulane, Georgia Tech, and Vanderbilt, all first rate league teams, go to it. And the last three named are played on consecutive Saturdays. If 'Bama can beat all of these and two other conference members they should have a fair claim to the honors. But, Bob Neyland is set to give them the fight of their lives, and a Tennessee victory won't be the year's biggest surprise by any margin.

Ole Miss, conqueror of L. S. U., takes on Vanderbilt at Nashville. The Commodores should win, but this may be another one of those Harry Mehre days. Georgia Tech, after a swell fight against Notre Dame will go out of the circuit to play Duke. This should be a dog-fight from beginning to end. And Auburn ought to break into the win column with a close victory over the Maroons of Miss State.

THOUGHTS, ETC.:

After a terrific opening day the present season has settled down right well and is rolling along smoothly. Of course every week-end sees its share of upsets and gambler's death warrants, but all in all things are very pleasant, almost too much so. Isn't it too bad that the ole pigskin carnival can't run off like the annual circus between the Yanks and the pseudo opposition? But, then it would be too easy, and the Monday morning quarterbacks would have nothing to howl about.

THUMBNAILS OF THE OWLS

HAGER, DON-end; playing No. 42; weight 210; height, 6 ft. 2 in.; age, 18; junior from Bay City, Texas. Hager has the makings for being the greatest end in the history of the Southwest conference. He is by far the fastest and also one of the best line blockers. On defense he doesn't bother to dodge the blockers, but runs right over them. He is the roughest man on the squad and the hardest man to take out of a play. With proper publicity, Don should make All-American easily.

WILLIAMS, WALTER-end; playing No. 46; weight, 185; height 6 ft. 1 in.; age, 24; senior from Harlingen, Texas. Rice is depending on Walter to hold down one of the end positions. He is fast and is hard to knock off his feet. He uses his

hands very well.

GREEN, J. R .- tackle; playing No. 32; weight, 212; height 6 ft. 2 in.; age, 21; junior from Pampa, Texas. J. R. is a fine student and an equally fine football player. The tackle position is well swamped with good material, and to take that posi-tion a boy will have to have plenty of hustle and fire. J. Ř. has both.

HINES, JESS (CAPTAIN) -tackle; playing No. 49; weight, 199; height, 6 ft. 1 in.; age, 22; senior from Simsboro, Texas. Jess will be playing his best this year and trying to set an example for the rest


SCHUEHLE, JAKE-halfback; weight, 193; height, 5 ft. 10 in.; playing No. 30; age, 20, senior




