

Cuts come home

After weeks of pondering over Governor David C. Treen's 4.4 percent budget cut affecting schools of higher education, the University of New Orleans Budget Committee has finally reached a decision as to where the \$1.4 million will be slashed.

"Certain funds are allocated at the beginning of the year to areas that have fixed operating costs and cannot be deleted," stated Chancellor Leon Richelle. These areas include heating, cooling and lighting. "Therefore, the budget committee had to cut funds that were allocated but not yet spent," he added.

According to George D'Aquin, Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs, the cuts came in these areas:

instruction:	\$294,353
research:	86,333
academic support:	413,431
student services:	12,721
institutional support:	134,118
physical plant services:	394,404

"We have not fired anyone; not a single person has lost his or her job," D'Aquin said. All non-academic positions which are not presently filled will remain vacant. Any positions that become vacant will remain so through June 30, 1983. "We may lose some people who are contracted on a per semester basis," D'Aquin added, "but we are trying to avoid that." If a department loses an employee, like a secretary, we'll loan one out from another department, he stated.

The University Police, budgeted out of institutional support, D'Aquin stated may lose strength because of their high rate of turn over. Another area of high turn over is janitorial services. "Soon there will be fewer janitors and the buildings will begin to look dirtier," he added.

According to D'Aquin, equipment freezes will really hurt. "Microscropes are as important to biology and earth science students as hard back books are to Liberal Arts students." he stated.

"The way we made these cuts is not the way we would have made them in June." D'Aquin added. "Every program is not of equal importance, but in this situation we had to cut funds that were uncommitted."

Unless the current upswing in the stock market is a sign

that the recession is coming to an end, D'Aquin looks for things to be worse next year. "This is just the tip of the iceberg," he stated. The budget committee, he added, is meeting this week to work on a provisional priority system in case this sort of thing happens next year. They are designing a working plan which would operate at 85 percent of the planned budget, he added.

The cuts, approved in adherence to Treen's across the board cut, will also affect a number of programs in the Regent's budget. Programs to be affected will include: aid

to independent institutions, research and development programs, the Southern Regional Education Board, Tulane Medical School capitulation and nursing stipends.

In spite of the cuts, the capital outlay will fund 126 projects including the Consent Decree, which will require \$95 million in outlays through December 1987.

The executive order excludes higher education programs required by the desegregation lawsuit agreement. But, according to Southern University Board members, further programs would have an adverse affect on Consent Decree Programs.

Several campus organizations have united in a demonstration against nuclear arms with the "Bury Nuclear Weapons" jazz funeral to begin at 12:30 pm today, Thursday, November 11 on the UC north lawn. UNO A-V interviews Mrs. Thelma Toole

The UNO A-V Television Studio is producing a videotaped interview with the mother of John Kennedy Toole, the late author of the Pulitzer Prize winning book, "A Confederacy of Dunces," the Coordinator of Television Operations

Mrs. Thelma Toole, mother of the New Orleans-born author, will talk about her son, what he was like as a child and as a grown man, what motivated him to write his uproariously, delightful book, and the difficulties she encountered in trying to

have the book published after his videotape or cablecast leactures. death, said Michael Adler, TV Coordinator.

The program will be co-produced by the UNO Library, the Audio-Visual Center and the Drama/Communications Department, he said. When it is released, it will be available for viewing through the Interlibrary Loan service, said Adler.

This is just one of our many projects, stated Adler. UNO's production studio is capable of cablecasting either live or from tape to the campus over the closed circuit television system, continued the TV Coordinator.

The studio has five black and white TV cameras, a switcher with special effects, a multi-input film chain, a 28-input audio mixer and various audio sources such as turntables, reel-to-reel, cassette and cart machines, said Adler. Also available are a 3/4 inch portable TV color camera and recorder, and a videotape editing system, Adler said.

"With all these resources available to us. we can offer a wide variety of services to the UNO faculty and students," said Adler. "We

Toll-free telephone service is now available in all 50 states providing direct access to Veterans Administration Regional Offices. Anthony R. Lentini, Director of the New Orleans Regional Office, said today reminding veterans and their dependents of the service which is available from 7:45 a.m. to 4:25 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Because the service is so popular. Lentini said veterans should have at hand as much VA-related information about themselves as possible when making a call

Lentini pointed out that VA counselors can provide faster service when the veteran's claim number, military serial number or Social Security number is provided.

The following toll-free number is provided for use by veterans and their dependents in the State of Louisiana in need of assistance from the Veterans Administration Regional Office in New Orleans: 1-800-462-9510.
