BRODIE, Sir Benjamin Collins (1783–1862). Surgeon.

ALS to Brande, 3 pages 8vo, 14 Saville Row, 7 June 1854. Apologising for forgetting to send Brande a presentation copy of his latest book, and promising to send a copy of the new edition, when published.

'... One evening I wrote out a list of friends & others to whom I wished to send copies, & sent it off by the post to Longmans without looking it over afterwards. It was thus I am sorry to say that I neglected to send it to you as well as to four or five other friends. ...'

In 1854, Brodie anonymously published *Psychological Inquiries*, a series of essays positing a relationship between physical and mental health. William Thomas Brande (1788–1866) was an eminent

chemist.

BRODIE, Sir Benjamin Collins (the elder), English surgeon; b. Winterslow, Eng., June 9, 1783; s. Peter Bellinger and (Collins) B.; studied under Abernethy and Wilson in London; became pupil of Everard Home, St. George's Hosp., 1803; D.C.L., Oxford U.; m. Miss Sellon, 1816; eldest son, Benjamin Collins. Apptd. prof. comparative anatomy and physiology Royal Coll. Surgeons, 1816, pres., 1844; physician to George IV; sergeant-surgeon to William IV, 1832, then to Victoria. Recipient Copley medal, 1811. Fellow Royal Soc., 1810 (pres. 1858-61); mem. French Acad. Scis. Author: Diseases of the Joints, 1818. Credited with 1st surg. treatment of varicose veins, 1814; reduced number of amputations of joints through conservative treatment; described inflammation of head of tibia or Tb abscess (Brodie's abscess), 1832; gave possibly 1st description of intermittent claudication in man, 1846; opposed homeopathy. Died Broome Park, Surrey, Eng., Oct. 21, 1962.

BRODIE, Sir Benjamin Collins (the vounger), Eng-
