For Louisiana sports fans, the football season begins and ends today. It lasts through some three hours of color, pageantry and gridiron thrills unmatched anywhere else in the world.

★ ★ ★

It's Louisiana State and Tulane, rivals since 1893, who meet here to settle the football championship of the Bayou Country. Today's game, as has been the past 48, will be a "humdinger."

★ ★ ★

The winner of today's traditional clash will get the "rag," a series trophy that is symbolic of the championship of Louisiana football. Battling for that rag will be two of the cleanest, highest-spirited football teams as ever represented any universities.

★ ★ ★

The rivalry between the Bayou schools is so intense that neither team should ever be rated the favorite. In fact, an "upset" in the series comes when there isn't an upset.

★ ★ ★

Gaynell Tinsley and Henry Frnka, the rival coaches, are all even after three LSU-Tulane games against each other. Frnka's 1948 team, paced by All-America Eddie Price, stomped the Tigers, 46-0, in Baton Rouge. In 1949 LSU's fabulous Cinderella Club beat the heavily favored Greenie team, 21-0, and went to the Sugar Bowl. Last fall in New Orleans Tinsley's Tigers shook their underdog role and tied a favored Tulane team, 14-14.

★ ★ ★

Tulane's offense will be led by Pete Clement, a sophomore quarterback, and Max McGee, a fast, shifty halfback. Speed, a tricky "T" formation and a 225-pound defensive line make the Greenies rough customers on any Saturday afternoon. Against this the Tigers, who rank as one of the pleasant surprises of 1951 football, will send a freshman-dominated club whose main forte is defense.

★ ★ ★

On the basis of comparative scores, the game is a toss-up. Mississippi State beat Tulane on a field goal, 10-7, but lost to the Tigers on another three-pointer, 3-0. Vandy stopped LSU, 20-13, but bowed to the Greenies, 14-10.

★ ★ ★

So, for today's game, every fan becomes an expert. His guess as to the outcome of Louisiana's biggest grid game is as good as anybody else's.

1951 FOOTBALL RULE CHANGES

FOOTBALL'S development, from its early beginnings to the fast-moving, colorful spectacle it is today, has necessitated annual rules changes to meet the various situations which occur.

This year there are no new basic rules. There are merely alterations to improve the present ones. One

rule which was dropped last year has now been put back in the book.

The five changes listed below will bring you up to date on the 1951 Rules Book. Read them over and enjoy the game!

1. THE FAIR CATCH WILL BE USED BY COLLEGES AGAIN THIS YEAR.

After a year's absence from the Rules Book, the Committee has found it advisable to reinstate the fair catch, in the best interest of protecting the receiving back from vicious down field tackles. This rule has been rewritten and simplified to facilitate its administration by officials. There is no longer the requirement that the player stop within two steps after the catch. The rule is now simple and clear. It merely states, "When a player makes a fair catch, the ball becomes dead where caught and shall belong to the receiving team at the spot where that player first touched it." The signal for a fair catch remains the same; the player making the catch shall raise one hand clearly above his head and wave it from side to side. Under the old rule, the team making the fair catch had the option of putting the ball in play by a free kick or scrimmage. This option is now deleted and the ball must be put in play from scrimmage.

2. PENALTY FOR ILLEGAL SHIFT NOW REDUCED TO FIVE YARDS.

For several years there has been a very fine distinction between a man illegally in motion and an illegal shift. The penalty for the former being five yards and the latter fifteen yards. Because of the fact that these two violations of the rules were so closely related, and many times confused, the Committee decided to make the penalty for each the same, which is a great step toward consistency and conformity in the rules.

3. VIOLATION OF SUBSTITUTION RULE NO LONGER PENALIZED AS DELAY-OF-GAME.

One of the most confusing things in football from a spectator's point of view has been eliminated. How often have you seen the defensive team run in a substitute when the ball was ready-for-play, but before the offensive team had even lined up over the ball. The Referee would blow his whistle and step off five yards against the defensive

team. The public address system would announce to the stands that the defensive team was being penalized for delay of game. Now you know and I know, that the game was not delayed by that substitution. Actually, it was a violation of the substitution rule as substitutions cannot be made once the ball is ready-for-play. However, last year any violation of the substitution rule was called illegal delay. This year it will be properly penalized as a violation of the substitution rule.

4. BALL SHALL NOT BE PUT IN PLAY UNTIL REFEREE SIGNALS READY-FOR-PLAY.

No more will the offensive team be able to pull that old surprise play of lining up on the ball and, without signals or huddle, snap it while the defensive team is still picking itself up off the field. This year the ball must be declared ready-for-play by the Referee before it can be put in play. The Referee will signal ready-for-play by extending his right arm aloft and bringing it down to his side.

5. STARTING THE CLOCK.

There is one change in the timing of a game this year that will be significant. Last year after any time out, free time out or excess time out, the clock was started as soon as the ball was ready-for-play. Quite often toward the end of a period, with only a few seconds left to play, the team in possession of the ball, trailing by a slight margin, would ask for one of its free times out, just to kill the clock and assure itself of one more play. The Referee would grant the time out, but as soon as the time was up and the Referee had declared the ball ready-for-play, the clock would start and usually run out before the team could put the ball in play. This seemed to work an injustice upon a team which had conserved its times out all during the game for just such an occasion. This year, the Rules Committee has decided that after a free time out has been granted, the clock shall not start until the ball is actually put in play.



Dear Friends of L. S. U.:

In the 1st Century BC, Cicero called the separation of rhetoric from philosophy "an absurd, unprofitable, and reprehensible divorce." In the 17th Century Bacon made a case against "slipping off particular sciences from the root and stock of universal knowledge." In 1837, Emerson declared that man was "losing his humanity." And in 1951 General Bradley called ours a "world of nuclear giants and ethical infants."

For 2000 years then men have expressed concern over the narrow specialization of learning—and with good reason; first, because few fields of higher learning can be comprehended except in their relationship to general knowledge; and second, there is grave danger that the students in our educational institutions will merely be well-trained rather than well-educated.

But this is an age of specialization, and because it is there seems to be only one course to follow. Colleges and universities must see to it that their graduates are both well-trained and well educated. This simply means that every college student should have a general background in the humanities, and the natural and social sciences to go along with the training in any special field he chooses.

This is a matter of educational policy at L.S.U. where this year 48 per cent of class registrations are in the College of Arts and Sciences. All of us today are aware of what happens to a world which has learned how to control the atom but not itself. Perhaps the humanities are not indispensable to earning a living, but they are indispensable to something even more important—civilization.

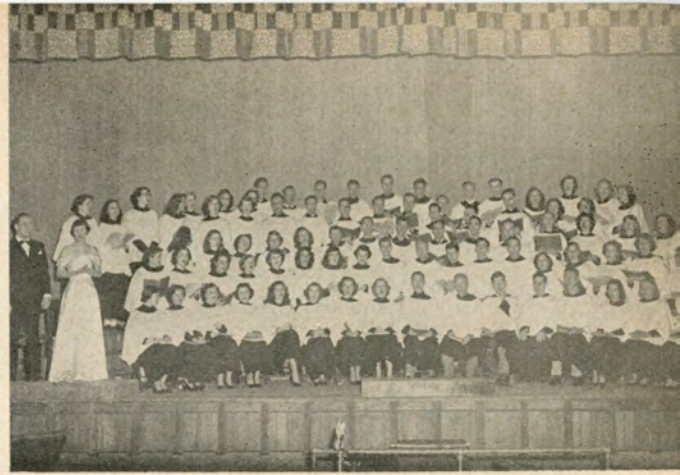

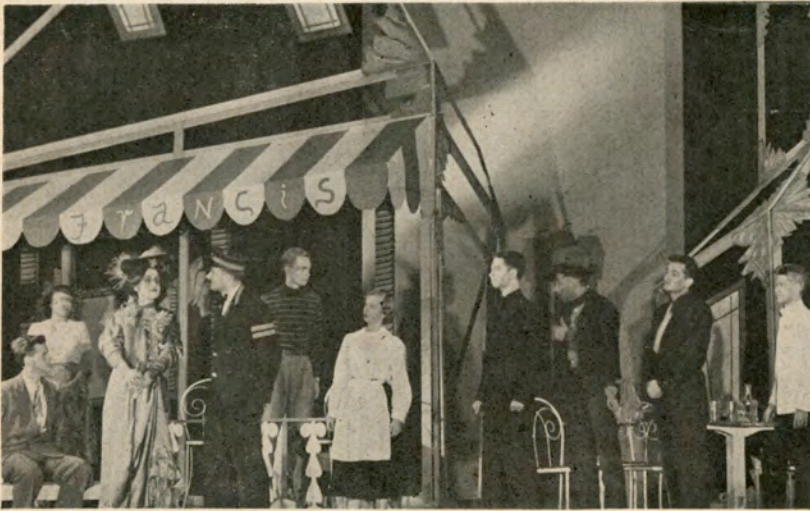

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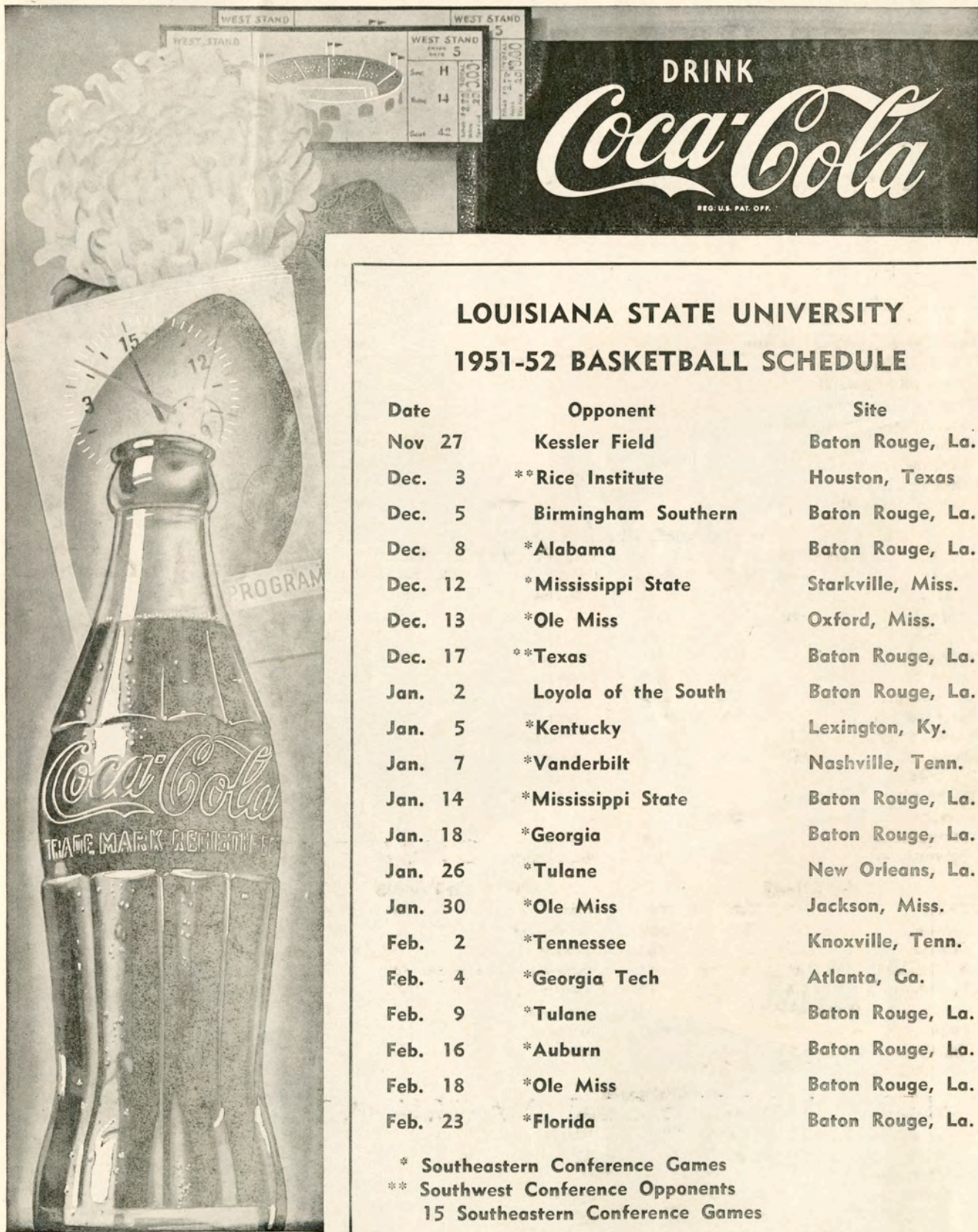
