Playboy Enterprises President Christie Hefner was invited to lecture Thursday at the normally straight-laced University of Notre Dame: "Most academic institutions worth their salt believe in diversity of ideas and access to ideas," said Hefner, daughter of magazine founder Hugh Hefner. Hefner, 30. was invited to speak on women in management and the financial turnaround of the troubled Playboy empire. She said the company expects to make its first annual profit in three years in the fiscal period coding next June. She said the company's divestiture of resort hotel, casine, book publishing and other marginal or unprofitable operations has improved Playboy's cash flow. After becoming president

of the company, she cut Playboy

by 40 percent.
