Dear Sir,

I received your letter of the 19th, this morning, and it will give me pleasure to aid all in my power in procuring apparatus for the poor Africans you are so kindly, and, as I think, effectually teaching.

This evening, I went into three Bookstoes, and selected some cards and books, and have since looked over my children's old books, to add to the selection. These are now sent. If any of the new books &c are not required, they can be returned for exchange.

Beside doing the above, I have sent to Messrs Bartlett & Co, and hope to receive their aid in the selection of additional pictures.

It will give me pleasure to learn by the return mail that you have received what are now sent, and to receive your further remarks, &c.

The facts you may communicate can be thrown before the public occasionally, but you can rely on its being done under such restrictions as you may impose.

In the Record I read the article to which you referred me.
