My dear Sir:

The Com. on behalf
of the Amistad Captives wish you to meet Thomas
Fessenden Esq. of this city, in Hartford, Friday afternoon,
at the City Hotel. He expects to leave here, Friday morning,
for Hartford.

We are greatly apprehensive that the Supreme
Court will decide against the Africans. Advice from
Washington confirms this apprehension. Still, Mr. Bald-
win is sanguine of success. If the decision is, as we fear,
the Executive will be very quick in removing the Afri-
cans out of the reach of philanthropy.

It is our opinion that a serious consultation
had best take place in Hartford immediately, with
reference to applying to Ch. J. Williams to allow a writ
of Habeas Corpus to issue returnable before him. This
will bring up the case for adjudication before the action
of the Superior Court is known. The Africans are
now detained without law. It will therefore be a legal
thing to set them at liberty. After the decision at Wash-
ington is known a Conn. Judge might be reluctant
to interfere. This action in Conn. ought not to effect
the judgment of the Sup. Court at Washington.

Mr. Fessenden is a highly respectable coun-
sellor at Law of this City, & a professed abolitionist. He
understands the facts in the case & is a man of sound
judgment. We have employed him, at considerable
expense, to go to Hartford, to consult with some of the

leading brethren there, and then to act as circumstances may dictate. The names of the Com. here, had best be kept out of sight, and the proceedings had under the name of gentlemen in Connecticut. We have thought your name would be sufficient. You can judge of this. It does not appear desirable to have many consulted.

On receipt of this, we hope you will go to Hartford immediately. If you think proper to consult or take with you Mr. Williams or Mr. Demming, or both, please do so.

Any expense to be incurred will be promptly met from the funds in our hands.
