The Committee sincerely desire that your valuable life may be long spared, and that the noble example you have shown by your uncompromising adherence to the cause of truth and freedom which has entitled you to the gratitude and veneration of your Countrymen, may be followed by many, and that the closing hours of your existence on earth may be consoled with the reflection, that while you have sought judgment for the oppressed—you have anxiously endeavored to remove from

your native land its foulest blot, and thus
to enlarge the basis of its surest prosperity.
