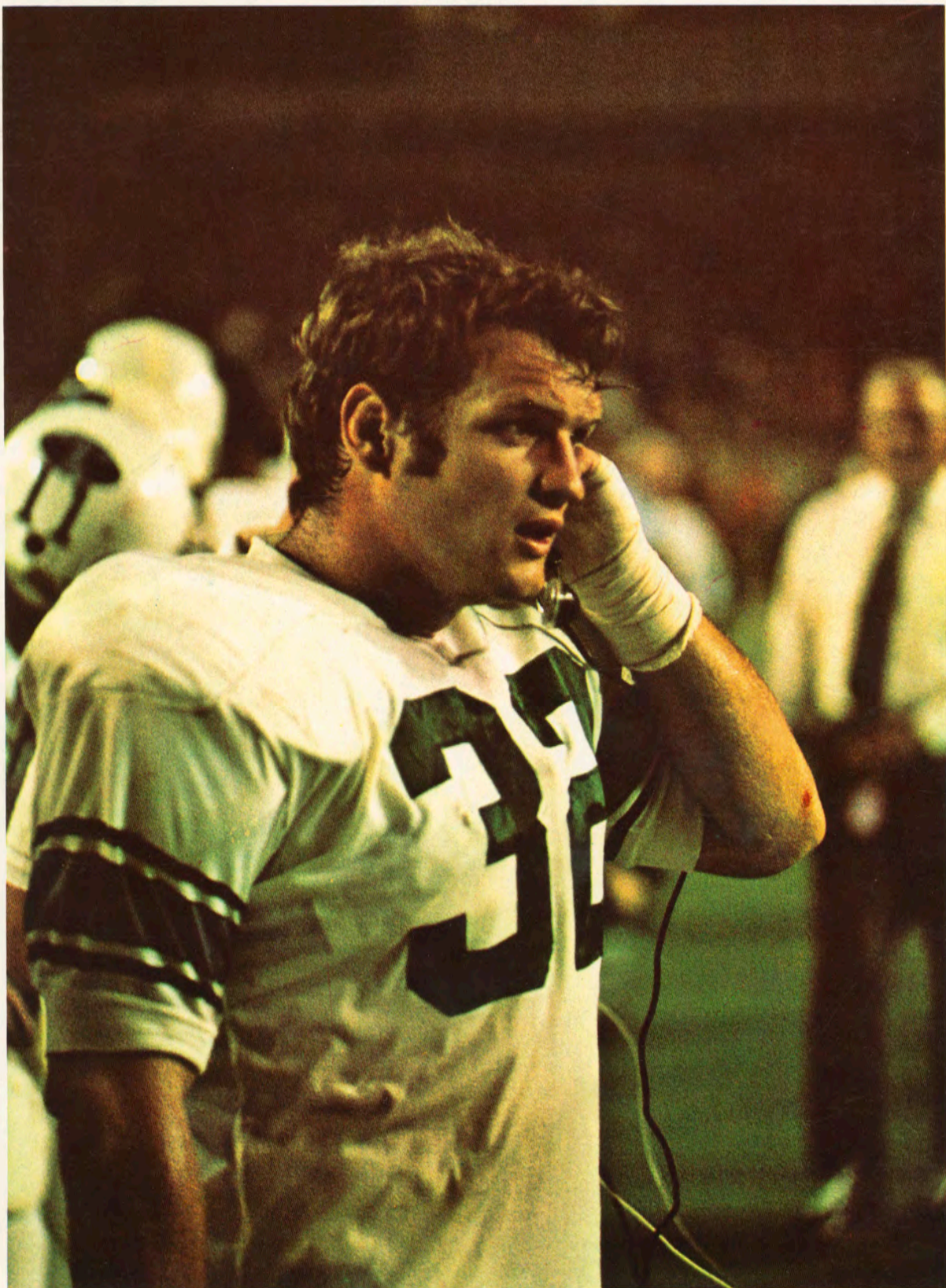

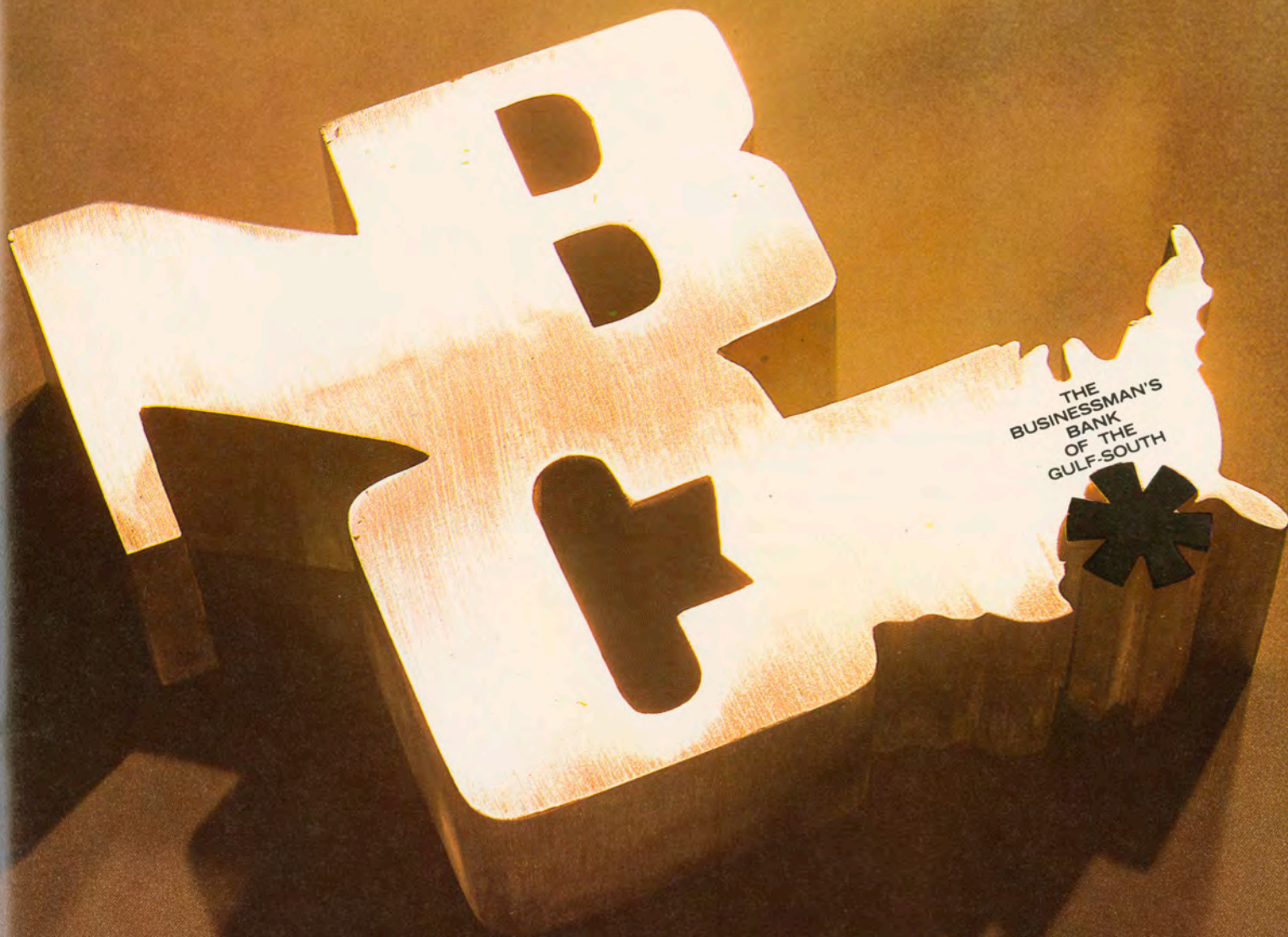

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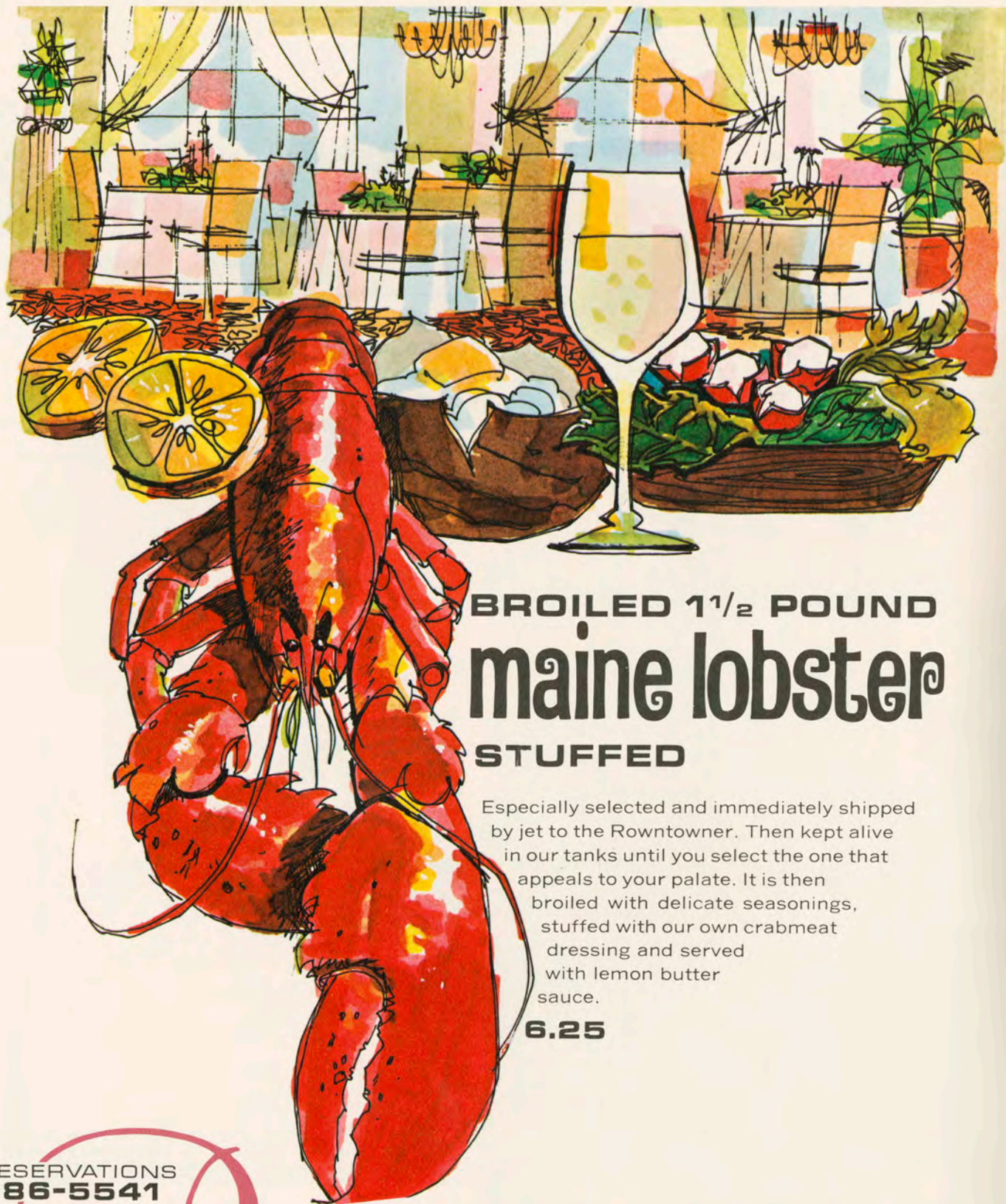
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The Cave of Balankanche

1—Dr. Robert Wauchope directs the Tulane Middle American Research Institute which has been involved in archaeological exploration in Mexico and Central America since 1926, including the recent exploration of the Cave of Balankanche in Northern Yucatan. 2—The Cave of Balankanche was explored by a Tulane team of archaeologists, headed by Dr. Wyllis Andrews IV (above). It proved to be an ancient shrine, hidden for over 900 years.

3—To gain access to the cave's inner chambers, the Tulane archaeologists squirmed through narrow tunnels, often partially filled with water, before they reached the domed subterranean chambers 100 feet below the ground.

4—Dr. G. Wyllis Andrews IV discovered that the floor of the cave was covered with pottery and stone vessels, most of them carved with the face of Tlaloc, the Mexican Rain God. The ancient shrine has been converted into an archaeological museum.

Exploring a cave is a great adventure. Finding and exploring a cave is even a greater adventure. Perhaps the greatest adventure of all is finding treasures in a cave.

Take, for example, the Cave of Balankanche in Northern Yucatan which was explored recently by archaeologists of the Middle American Research Institute of Tulane, and described as one of the most important archaeological finds of recent times. Institute staff members have been unearthing prehistoric treasures in Middle America, particularly in Mexico and Guatemala since 1926. The past 13 of these years have been spent working in cooperation with the National Geographic Society in excavating and restoring Dzibilchaltun, a Mayan city near Merida, Yucatan. According to Dr. Robert Wauchope, institute director, this ancient city "is perhaps the largest and longest-inhabited, pre-Colombian site ever discovered in the Maya lowland. It is providing a completely new picture of Maya pre-history by revealing rich new discoveries further and further back in time."

While excavating at Dzibilchaltun, the institute's staff, headed by Dr. E. Wyllys Andrews IV, was requested by the Mexican government to explore several other sites, including the Cave of Balankanche.

First task of the archaeologists was to get into the cave whose passages had been deliberately sealed off with masonry from other caves in the area. Once inside, they discovered a number of tunnels which opened into a series of large domed subterranean chambers. Dr. Andrews and his staff determined that the cave was an ancient shrine to the Mexican Rain God, Tlaloc, hidden for nine centuries.

The floors of the chambers were covered with hundreds of stone and pottery vessels, carved with the face of the Rain God, or with the jaguar whose roar was thought to symbolize thunder, or with figures of Toltec warriors, who invaded Mayan Yucatan in the ninth century.

At the request of the Mexican government, Tulane and the National Geographic Society explored the cave and its ancient relics further, expanded the passageways, strung in electric lights and thus made an archaeological museum which the public could visit and enjoy.

However, before this work could be done, the head priests of the local Indians held ceremonies in the cave to placate the Rain God, whom they felt would be offended by the desecration of his shrine. The rituals lasted 21 hours without interruption and were much the same as those held by the Maya 900 years before.

RED CROSS STATIONS—Tulane Stadium is equipped with the most modern, up-to-date first aid equipment available, matching the finest Red Cross stadium facilities in the country. The main station is located on the ground level in the northwest corner of the stadium, and additional stations are maintained at the northeast, southeast and southwest corners on the ground level and under the west stands near the north 20-yard line. Should there be an emergency near you, notify the nearest stadium guard immediately.

DOCTORS' CALLS—Doctors' telephones are located as follows: East side, ground level at entrance to ramp #3; West side, ground level at entrance to ramp #3; West side ramp, radio booth level, above section X-L. Doctors' numbers are assigned by the Tulane Athletic Department. A record of your number will be retained at the stadium telephones and your number will be announced over the public address system.

OTHER EMERGENCY CALLS—Stadium telephone number is 861-3661. Pages will be made over the public address system only in case of extreme emergencies.

LOST AND FOUND—During and after the game, items should be claimed at the Lost & Found Office on the ground level in the southwest corner of the stadium. On ensuing days, items can be claimed at the Stadium Ticket Office, 6401 Willow Street, telephone 861-3661.

REST ROOMS—Rest Rooms are located on the ground level and on the upper level ramp under the top deck. There are also rest rooms at each end of the upper deck.

TELEPHONES—Telephone pay stations are on the ground level concourse on all sides and ends of the stadium.

CONCESSION PRICES—Pay no more. All vendors must wear identifying badges. Please buy only from authorized vendors and pay only the above prices. Report any instances of over charge or other complaints to the nearest stadium guard, including the vendor's badge number.

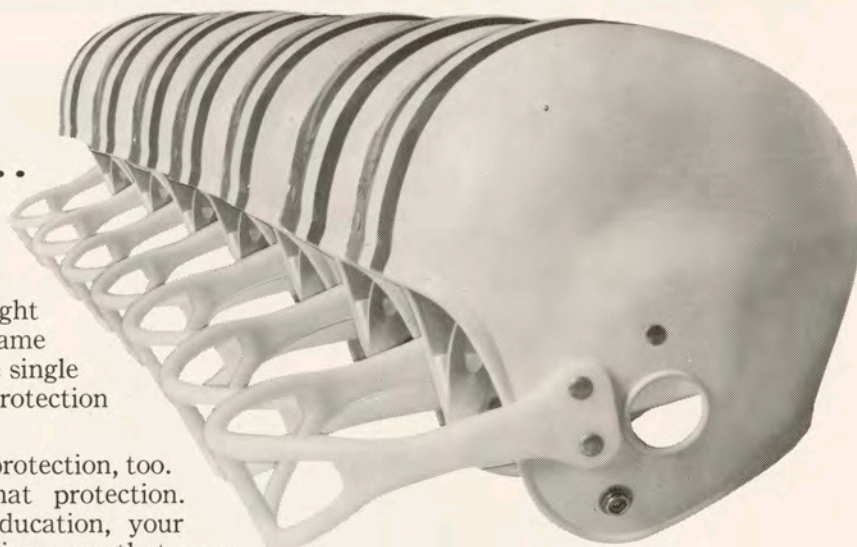

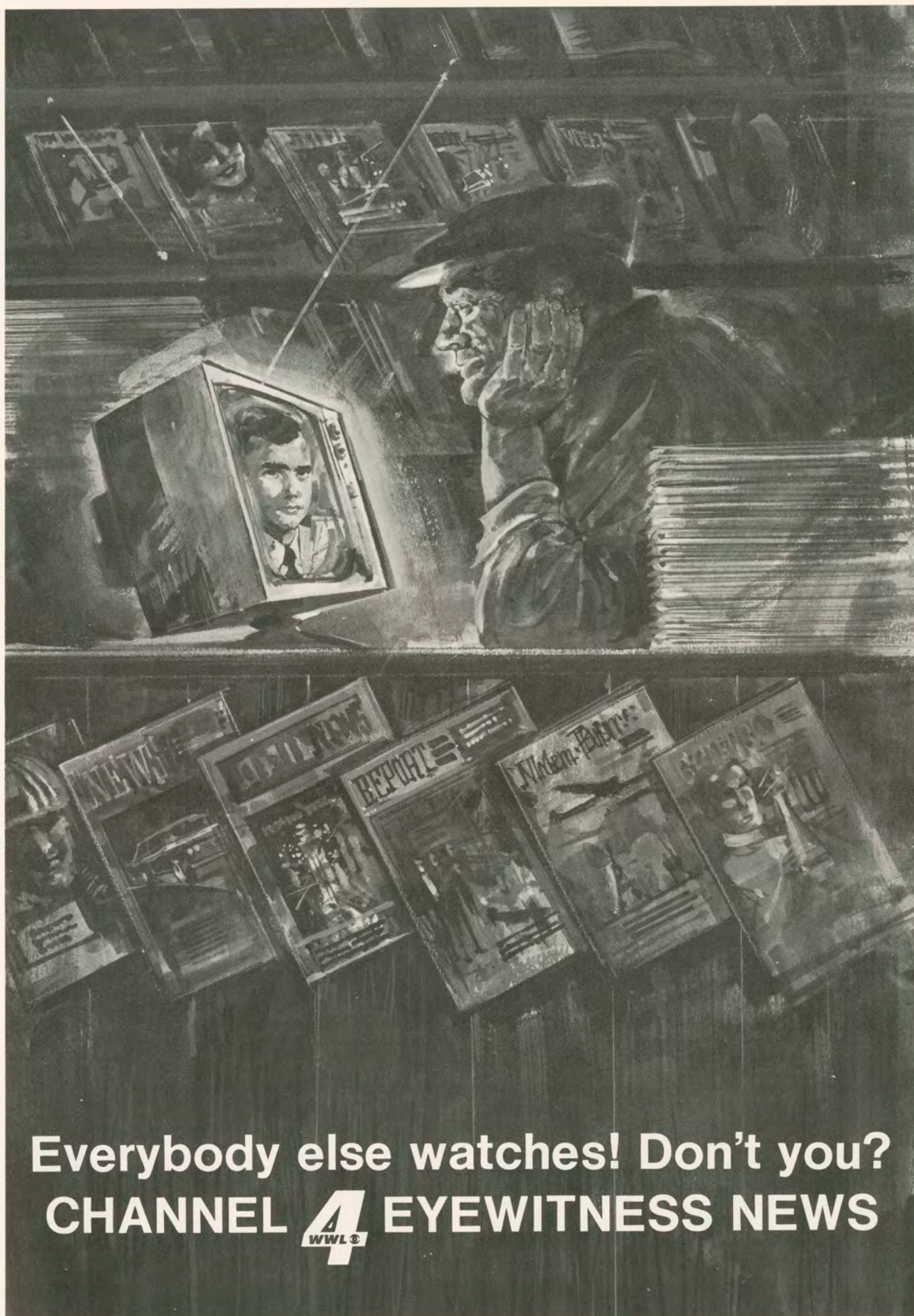

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the smell of cramergesic

and the sight of scientific, electrical equipment greet you as you enter Bubba Porche's haven, the Tulane Training Room.

For those of you who are as ignorant about the terms of medications as the average reporter, Cramergesic is a medication used to keep an injured area warm, it's part of the ingredients of a "hot pack."

That's not all you learn as you talk to Bubba Porche and his staff.

You learn what an integral part of any athletic team, football in particular, the training room is.

You learn that during football season, the average day for the staff runs from 7 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

You learn that of the nearly 200 scholarship athletes harbored by the university, about 40-45 come in daily for treatment of some sort.

You learn that there is, to make an understatement, a lot more to training and treatment than a doctor being on the sidelines during the course of a game.

An average mid-week day in "Porchetown" goes something like this: At 7 a.m. everyone assembles to see newly injured players who need to be kept out of the day's practice and report their loss to the coaching staff.

The rest of the morning is dedicated to the first of the two-a-day treatments for players who are under medication or treatment of some sort.

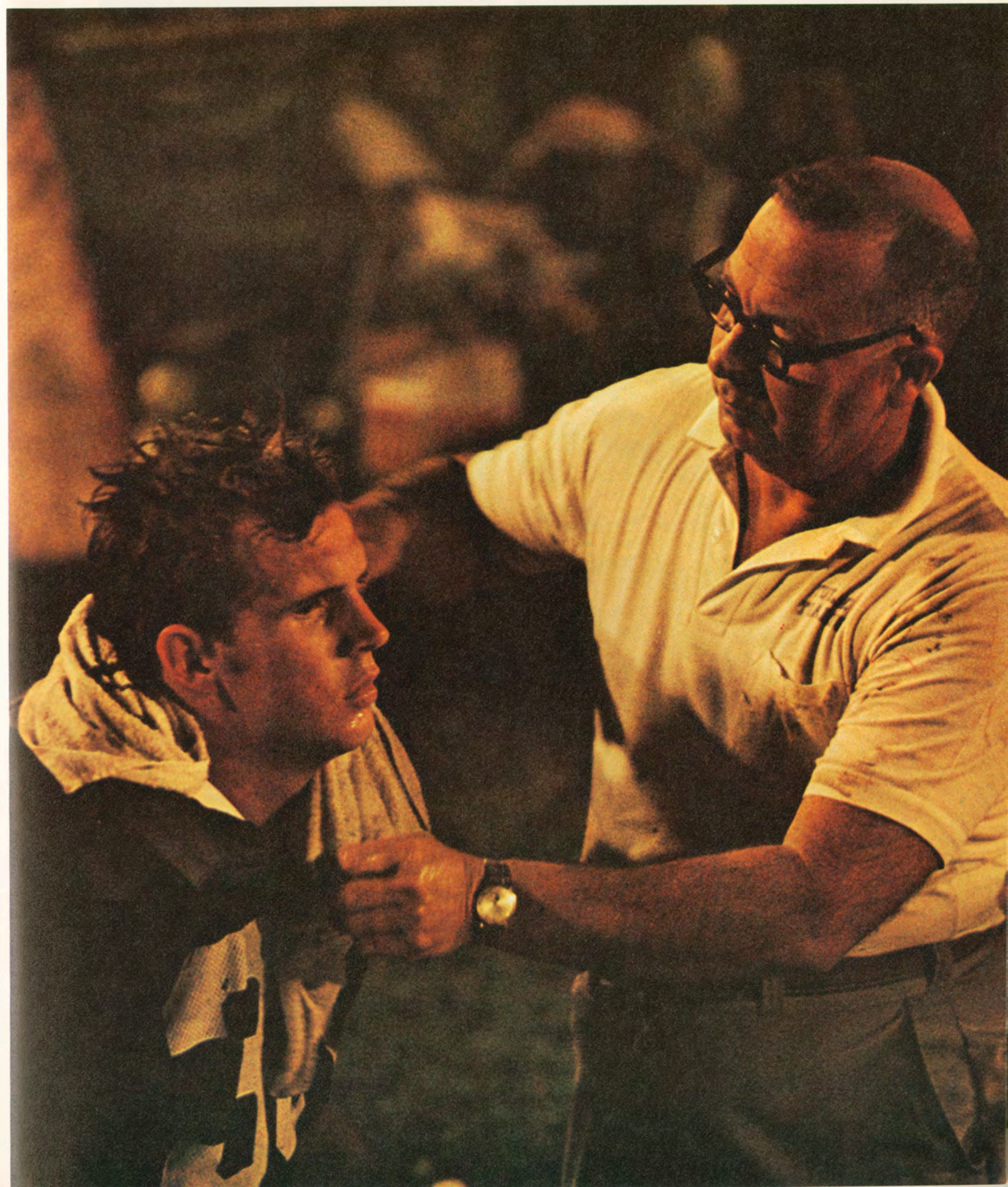
There is no lunch break for the men as taping of the athletes begins at 1 p.m. Altogether, 75% of all varsity players need some medication in addition to their wads of tape.

At 4:30 or so the team goes out to practice accompanied by Porche and all but one of his staff.

This is the worst time of the day for Bubba Porche. "Invariably something happens out there on the practice field. The worst injuries we get come from freak things where guys haven't even been hit!" exclaimed a frustrated trainer.

"One time," Bubba explained, "a starting quarterback of ours was dropping back so that a friend could get a picture. He stepped in a hole and badly sprained his ankle. Another time,

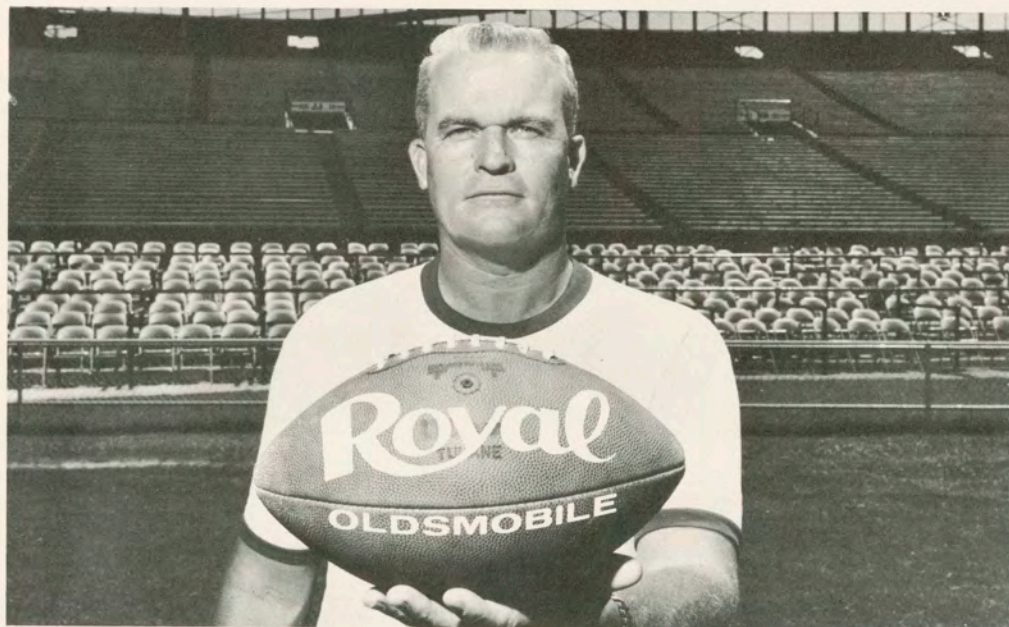


SCOUTING REPORT:

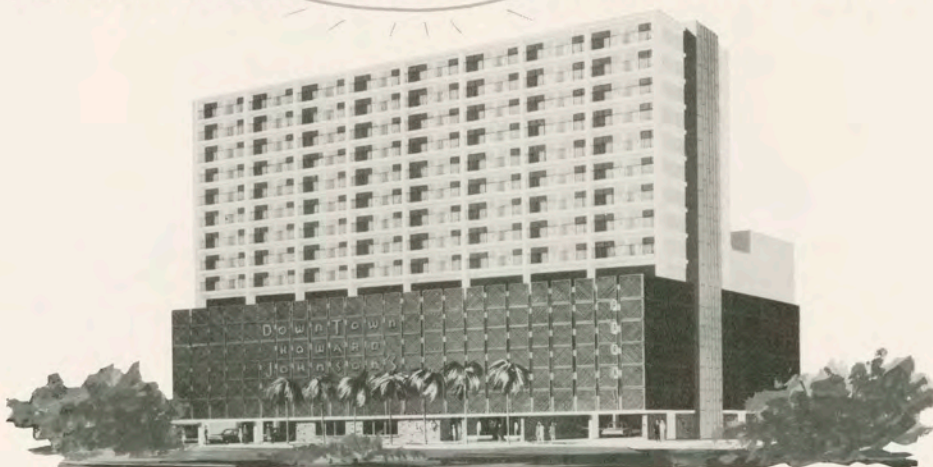
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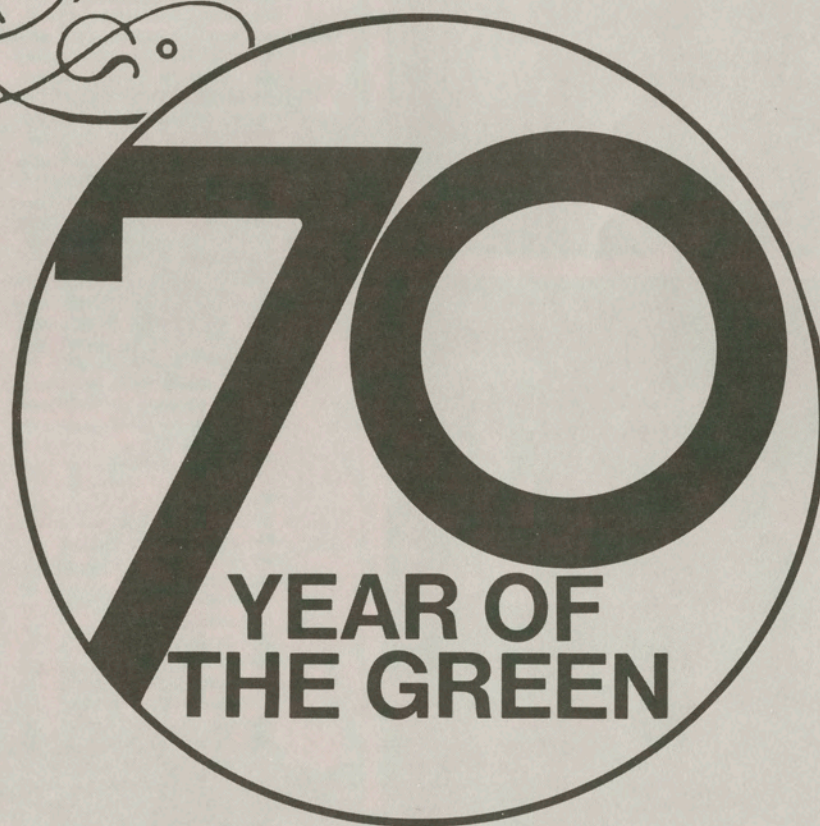
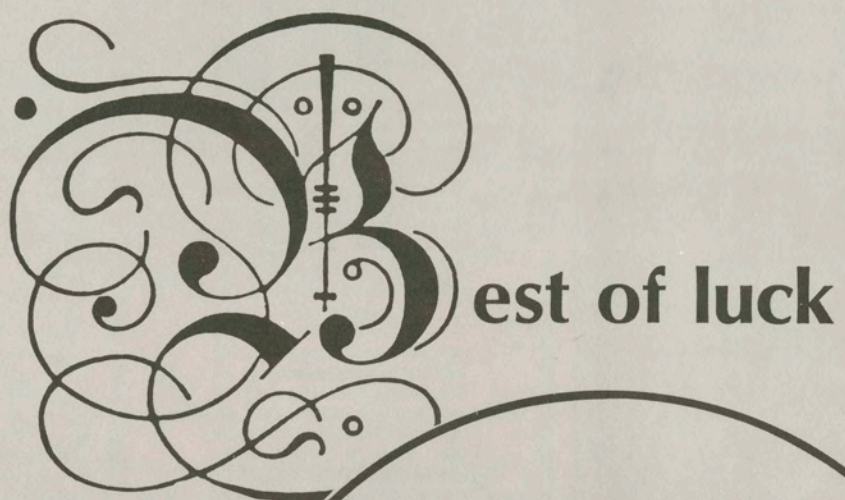
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Basketball '70-'71

Seven stations will be regulars on the Tulane network this fall: KSYL in Alexandria, WIBR in Baton Rouge, KXKW in Lafayette, KLOU in Lake Charles, KLIC in Monroe, WDSU in New Orleans, and KEEL-FM in Shreveport. Bruce Miller does the play-by-play, Wayne Mack is the color man, and Lynn Michel is the chief engineer.

Miller is starting his twelfth season calling the action for the Green Wave. A 39-year-old native of Geneva, Ill., he is a 21-year veteran of broadcasting and has been with station WDSU in New Orleans for 14 years. Miller has previous experience doing play-by-play broadcasting for the University of Illinois and working on the Armed Forces Radio Service.

Mack is a newcomer to the broadcast team this fall, but he's a familiar figure in New Orleans, where he is Sports Director of WDSU-TV. 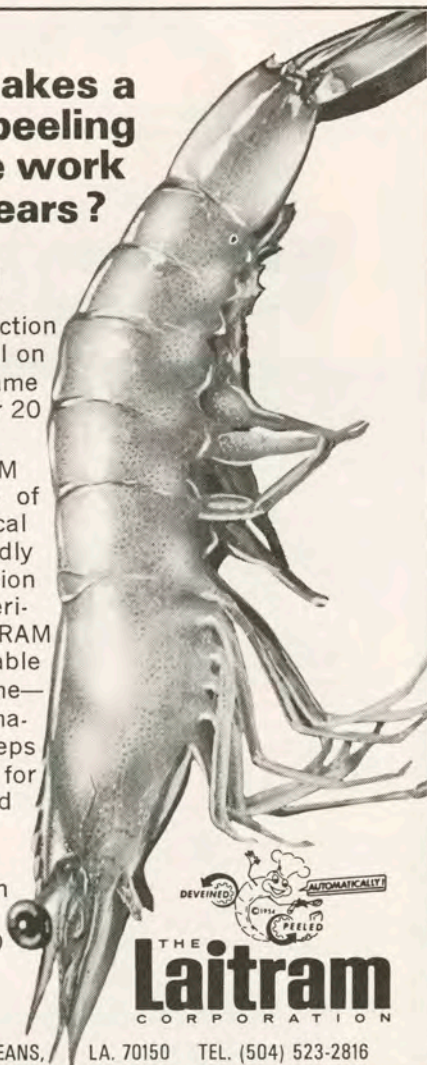

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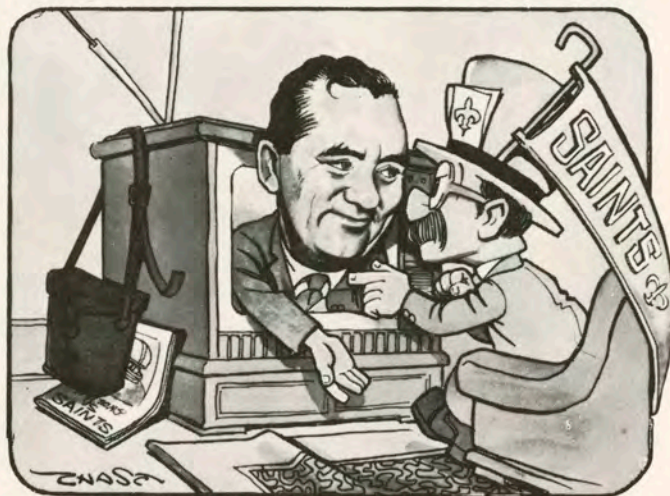

in a classroom, a boy had his foot under a chair, he moved suddenly, his foot caught, tore ligaments and he needed a knee operation."

"It's bad enough to see a boy hurt in a contest but when it happens without even contact, it's really frustrating. This happens quite a bit, you can't explain it either, it's just freakish," said Bubba with a shake of his head.

Schedule wise, practice generally ends about 6:30 or so with everyone showering. Some pre-arranged treatments plus medication for abrasions suffered in practice are next, followed finally by a clean up of the room.

Bubba Porche has been on this routine as Tulane trainer for 22 years now.

The biggest, and most tedious part of this routine is something that goes unnoticed by the average fan. Few realize that a player may not miss a game because of an injury but it still takes time to treat all his bumps and bruises.

As Bubba says, "It's hard to explain where all our time goes to, all I know is that there are never enough hours in the day for a trainer and his staff."

"The thing I'm proudest of when it happens," remarked the veteran trainer, "is rehabilitation. For a player to come off a serious injury and play again requires a tremendous amount of mental motivation.

"A good example is our first string tight end, Art Ledet. He has had two major ligaments and cartilage removed from both his knees and now he is back playing first string. Art is one of the most mentally motivated individuals I have ever seen," claims Bubba.

To Bubba Porche, the self satisfaction offsets the work as trainer, to quote the widely respected gentleman, "This is not a job it is a privilege."

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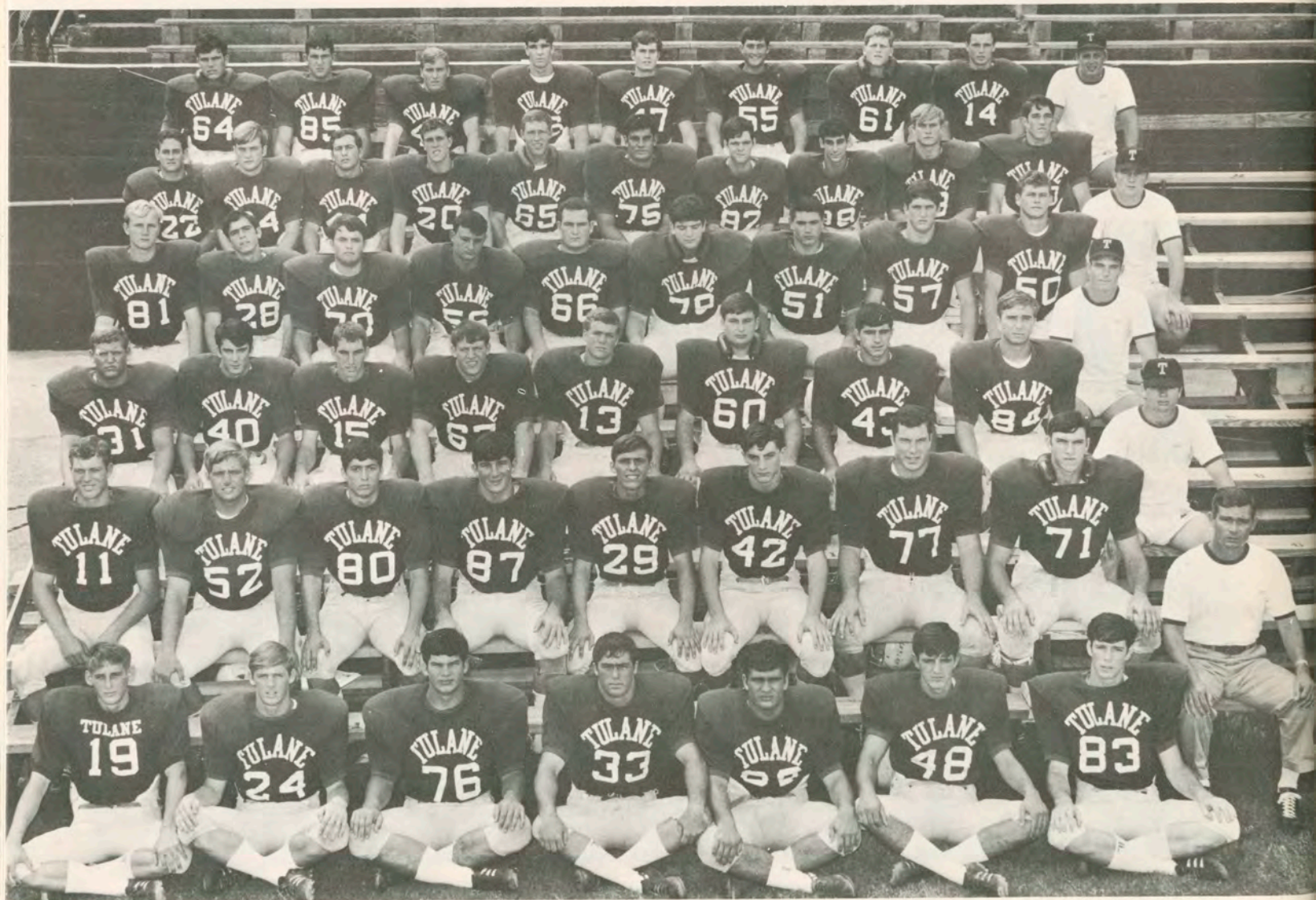
