THE HISTORY OF VANDERBILT

Vanderbilt is an independent, privately supported university and was founded in 1873. It is named for the New York shipping and railway magnate, Commodore Cornelius Vanderbilt, who gave a million dollars to build and endow the University. On the base of his statue, placed on the campus by Nashville citizens, is inscribed his wish that the University should "contribute to strengthening the ties which should exist between all sections of our common country."

The University includes a liberal arts college and seven other schools. The degrees granted are as follows:

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCE: Bachelor of Arts.

THE GRADUATE SCHOOL: Master of Arts, Master of Arts in Teaching, Master of Science, Doctor of Philosophy.

GRADUATE SCHOOL OF MANAGEMENT: Degree to be determined.

SCHOOL OF ENGINEERING: Bachelor of Engineering.

THE DIVINITY SCHOOL: Master of Divinity, Doctor of Divinity.

SCHOOL OF LAW: Doctor of Jurisprudence.

SCHOOL OF MEDICINE: Doctor of Medicine.

SCHOOL OF NURSING: Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Master of Science in Nursing.

The faculties of the several schools number just over a thousand. Student enrollment is approximately 6,000; about a fourth of these are women. A majority of the students live on the campus, which occupies 150 acres. Vanderbilt's campus adjoins those of George Peabody College for Teachers and Scarritt College for Christian Workers. The Joint University Libraries, serving all three institutions, contain more than a million volumes.

Facilities off the campus include the Arthur J. Dyer Observatory, situated on a 1,130-foot hill six miles south.

Honorary scholarship societies and the year each chapter was chartered are: Phi Beta Kappa (liberal arts, 1901); Alpha Omega Alpha (medicine, 1923); Sigma Xi (scientific research, 1944); Tau Beta Pi (engineering, 1946); Order of the Coif (law, 1948); Sigma Theta Tau (nursing, 1953).

Vanderbilt is a member of the Association of American Universities.

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
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ALEXANDER HEARD (North Carolina, 1938)

Vanderbilt University Chancellor



ALEXANDER HEARD, in February 1963, became Chancellor of Vanderbilt University. Since that time, he has risen in the esteem of the students he serves, who said, in dedicating the 1967 Commodore to him, "Since his arrival Chancellor Heard has constantly worked to improve the entire University. He has given the University . . . enlightened and dedicated administration, guiding it to development and achievements."

A Phi Beta Kappa graduate from the University of North Carolina in 1938, Mr. Heard was awarded the Master of Arts degree in political science from Columbia University in 1948, and the Ph.D. degree from the same school in 1951. Before earning these degrees, however, he served five years of government service, including research and administrative work for the Department of the Interior and the Department of War and an assignment as vice-consul at the American Embassy in Quito, Ecuador. He also served as a Naval officer in the Pacific.


Mr. Heard. born in Savannah, Georgia in 1917, joined the faculty of the University of North Carolina in 1950, became a Professor of Political Science at that school in 1952, and held the position of Dean of the Graduate School before coming to Vanderbilt as Chancellor in 1963.

Mr. Heard served on the Board of Directors of the Nashville Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, 1966-1968, and was chairman during 1968. In January of 1967, he became a member of the Board of Trustees of the Ford Foundation, and in May 1968 he became a member of the Board of Directors of Time Incorporated.

A nationally recognized scholar, Chancellor Heard is a past president of the Southern Political Science Association and a former vice-president of the American Political Science Association. Among his books on politics and education are A Two-Party South?, The Costs of Democracy, and The Lost Years in Graduate Education. He was both contributor and editor for State Legislatures in American Politics.

In 1961 President Kennedy appointed Mr. Heard chairman of a special bipartisan Commission on Campaign Costs. The report of this Commission, endorsed by former Presidents Eisenhower and Truman, has since become a basis for legislative proposals before Congress. President Johnson appointed Chancellor Heard to serve on the National Citizens Committee for Community Relations, and in 1967 appointed him to the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. President Nixon appointed him in 1969 to the Commission on White House Fellows, and also to a special task force on priorities in higher education. In 1970 President Nixon appointed Mr. Heard as an advisor, serving as Representative of The College Campuses to the President.

Chancellor Heard has received several honorary degrees since he came to Vanderbilt. He was awarded a Doctor of Laws degree by Columbia University in 1965, and by the University of North Carolina in 1968. Pepperdine College of Los Angeles awarded him a Doctor of Humane Letters degree in 1968, and the University of Chattanooga awarded him the degree of Doctor of Science in 1969.

DUDLEY FIELD



Home of the Commodores

Dudley Field, constructed during 1921 and 1922, was the first stadium built in the South strictly for college football.

The field was dedicated on October 14, 1922, when the Commodores battled national power Michigan to a scoreless tie.

Before the game, the field was named for Dr. William L. Dudley, Dean of the Vanderbilt Medical College from 1895 to his death in 1914.

Dr. Dudley was the outstanding academic leader of his day in Southern football and one of the foremost national leaders. He organized the old Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association in 1893, and in 1906 helped to organize the N.C.A.A., which he later served as vice-president. He was a chief advocate of the rules change which scored more points for a touchdown than a field goal. Dr. Dudley became known in the Southeast area as "the father of clean athletics."

Professsor Charles S. Brown, President of the Vanderbilt Athletic Association, which planned the stadium in 1920, read these lines at the ceremony: "To William Lofland Dudley, dean of Southern athletics, scholar, gentleman, and friend, this ground is dedicated, and as Dudley Field, is consecrated to the use of Vanderbilt and her sons forever."

In 1922 the concrete-tiered, horseshoe-shaped stadium seated 20,000 spectators, a magnificent structure for the time. Bleachers seating 1,600 were added at the open end in 1937; 6,000 seats and a new press box were added to the West side in 1949; and 6,400 seats were added to the East side in 1960, making the current capacity 34,000. The 1949 and 1960 additions were of prefabricated steel with redwood seats. A modern lighting plant was installed in 1954.

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
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


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JESS NEELY (Vanderbilt, 1924)

In just three and a half years big things have happened on the Vanderbilt athletic scene under the direction of one of the school's most able sons, Jess Claiborne Neely.

Since becoming athletic director Neely has reestablished athletic dignity to Vanderbilt's proud heritage with the construction of the \$1.5 million Dan McGugin Athletic Center and the installation of Tartan Turf on ancient Dudley Field.

Neely came home in December of 1966 after 44 years, making coaching stops along the way at Southwestern of Memphis, Alabama, Clemson and a prolonged one at Rice.

Neely's first act as Athletic Director in putting Vanderbilt back into the limelight was to bring along the brightest young college football coaching prospect around . . . Bill Pace.

The name Neely is as respected in Texas as it is in Tennessee, for it was at Rice where he achieved most of his fame. As Rice coach for 27 years, he won 144 games, the most ever by a SWC coach, and four championships which is quite a feat since during his 1940-1966 reign Rice's enrollment, the smallest of any major football university, ranged from 1,300 to 1,800, including coeds.

He took Rice to six bowl games, winning three, over General Neyland's Tennessee team in the 1947 Orange Bowl, 8-0; North Carolina and Choo Choo Justice in the 1950 Cotton Bowl, 27-13, and Alabama in the 1954 Cotton Bowl, 28-6. In the 1940 Cotton Bowl his Clemson

team whipped coach Frank Leahy and Boston College,

One of Neely's greatest victories came on Nov. 16, 1957 when his Rice Owls upset the No. 1 team in the nation at the time, Bear Bryant's Texas Aggies. With quarterbacks King Hill and Frank Ryan at the throttle, the Owls clipped the Aggies, 7-6, before 70,000 in Rice Stadium.

Neely's 1958 team had another No. 1 team on the ropes, Col. Earl Blaik's Army Cadets. A long last-minute desperation TD pass to Pete Dawkins won for the Black Knights, 14-7.

Neely developed many All-Americans. Most notable were Weldon Humble, Banks McFadden, Dicky Moegle, Bill Howton, King Hill and Buddy Dial.


A native of Smyrna, Tenn., Neely is referred to as "the greatest captain in Vanderbilt history." A slick halfback, he led coach Dan McGugin's 1922 team to an 8-0-1 record, the tie coming against powerful Michigan, 0-0, in the inaugural game of Dudley Field.

The all-time dean of SWC coaches was one of the smartest coaches to ever walk the sidelines. Since receiving his law degree, his career has led him to the presidency of the National Football Coaches Association. He was also a member of the association's powerful rules committee. His greatest honor came when his fellow coaches named him recipient of the Amos Alonzo Stagg Award as the outstanding coach in the U.S.

As head coach in exactly 400 games, Neely ranks fourth in the number of wins in the history of the game with 207.




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
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BILL PACE (Wichita State, 1954)

Vanderbilt Head Coach



Vanderbilt's football program is being heard again the sound has reached members of the Southeastern Conference and is spreading—all because of one man, Bill Pace.

Gifted with an imaginative offensive mind, Coach Pace in just three short years has taken downtrodden Vanderbilt and elevated it back into football prominence

The results are beginning to show even though Coach Pace has stated that the Commodores are several years away from being a prominent SEC title contender. The 14-10 upset win over Bear Bryant's Alabama Crimson Tide last season is indicative of what Pace has in store.

Coach Pace has already done something that has never been accomplished in the history of Vanderbilt football . . . producing three back-to-back seasons of scoring in every game.

The 38-year-old Pace showed a flare for the spectacular, by taking the Commodores on a 5-4-1 ride in 1968, the first winning season at Vanderbilt since 1959. One of the big wins of the season was a 17-13 upset triumph over Army in Michie Stadium.

Energetic, affable, unpretentious, intelligent are just a few adjectives to describe the native of Picher, Okla. But Vanderbilt partisans are more appreciative of the fact he is a good, sound football coach.

His football brilliance was evidenced in his first ven-

ture as a head coach in one of the post-season classics, the 1968 Blue-Gray game. His Gray team methodically discolored the Blue, 28-7.

Pace is no johnny-come-lately piece of football talent. Like all successful coaches he worked up through the ranks, learning his trade as an offensive and defensive backfield coach at Kansas and Arkansas before coming to Vanderbilt in December of 1966.

Pace was destined to be a coach, just by position. He was a quarterback at his alma mater, Wichita State, and somehow quarterbacks dominate the coaching profession.

In the line of order after his 1954 graduation, Pace coached the Wichita freshmen in 1954, Ft. Sill Army champs in 1955 and 1956, the Arkansas freshmen in 1957, the Kansas defensive secondary in 1958 and 1959, the Kansas offensive backs in 1960 and 1961, the Arkansas defensive secondary in 1962 and 1963 and the Arkansas offensive backs in 1964, 1965 and 1966.

Kansas won the 1961 Bluebonnet Bowl game over Jess Neely's Rice owls, 33-7. During his offensive reign at Arkansas, the Razorbacks compiled a 22-game win streak and were the highest scoring team in the nation in 1965.

Pace is married to the former Joan Archer of Wichita, Kan., and they have two daughters, Sheri, 16 and Kim, 14. Oxford

A funny thing happened to the Green Wave of Tutone on their way to a 21-19 victory over Vanderbilt last year in New Orleans; they lost 26-23. Dave Strong, Mr. Dependable came up with an outstanding catch of a 50 yard pass from Denny Painter to put the Commodores ahead and set up a gift safety to make the final core 26-23.

Tulane, a pre-season pick as one of the outstanding lependent teams in the South, has come up with a mark thus far with victories over Georgia, Illinois, Incinnati and North Carolina while losing to Texas ch, Air Force and Georgia Tech. David Abercrombie, running from the tailback position, has amassed a total of 569 yards to date on 142 carries to average 4.0 a try. Standing in at 6-0, 190 pounds, the senior from Seminary, Miss., has gained twice as many yards as any one on the Tulane squad. Abercrombie has averaged 81 yards per game running with the ball against some pretty stiff competition.

Mike Walker and Greg Gleason have shared the quarterbacking chores thus far and have combined for a total of 831 yards and three touchdowns. Mr. Abercrombie has chipped in with one pass that went for 74 yards and a score, not bad for distance or average.

Tulane and Vanderbilt have been playing each other for a long time with 29 games being played thus far. Tulane holds a 15-11-3 edge in the series. The two teams have met every year since 1958 with each team winning five and two games ending in ties.

The Commodores, after winning their first two, are still looking for number three after losing five straight to some pretty fair football teams. Injuries, a part of football to be sure, have still been a thorn in the side of the Commodores with at least ten regular players missing from one to four games out of the seven played to date.

Today is Homecoming for Vanderbilt alumni and the Athletic Department would like to welcome you back to your campus, and hope that the Commodores will help to make your return a happy one.

It may be a Homecoming for several of the injured Commodores who may get back into action this week after several weeks way from the squad. Quarterback Watson Brown, tailback Mack Brown, center Sandy Haury and guard Gino Marchetti may all be back for action.

Defense has been the keynote of the last two games the Commodores have played and there are several names worthy of mention. Steve Fritts, John Robinson, John Carney and George Abernathy along with Terry Rettig and George Tomlinson have had fine games of late and have served to provide the leadership for the defensive unit. A late stand against Mississippi showed that the defense has plenty of pride and character, two needed qualities for a defensive unit.

The Commodores are a young football team and have shown individual improvement with each outing. Both Tulane and the Commodores are capable of exploding on offense and testing the solid defense shown by each squad.

ROB ROY PURDY

Senior Vice-Chancellor (Davidson, 1937)

Rob Roy Purdy, Senior Vice Chancellor and the chairman of the University Committee on Athletics, was a cum laude graduate of Davidson College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1937. He received his Master of Arts degree in English from Vanderbilt in 1938 and received his Doctor of Philosophy in English from Vanderbilt eight years later.


When World War II started in Europe, Dr. Purdy

was studying at the University of Grenoble in France under an American Field Service Fellowship. He then continued his fellowship at the Widener Library, Harvard University, and at the Library of Congress.

Before entering the U.S. Navy as an ensign in 1944, he was Assistant Professor of English at Florence (Ala.) State College (1941-42)and Instructor in English at Vanderbilt. He served as a communications of-

ficer in the Pacific area and was discharged in 1946 as Lieutenant (j.g.).

Dr. Purdy returned to Vanderbilt following the war and rose successively from Assistant Professor to Associate Professor to Professor (1955) of English. He taught Anglo-Saxon language and literature, Shakespeare and Chaucer. He was editor of the book, Fugitives Reunion, published in 1959. Also in 1959 Dr.



He has served as a member of the of the College of Arts and Science, and the Education Policy Committee and Press Committee. He is an ex-officio University Senate.

Dr. Purdy is also the Chairman of the Committee.

Naylor has been involved at one time or another in every function of the athletic program at Vanderbilt except actual coaching. Presently he doubles as assistant athletic director and business manager.





CROWD NOISE AND THE RULES

NOISE LEVEL is a serious problem at football games. Several years ago all the Southeastern Conference head football coaches and athletic directors voted unanimously that all of the referees will remind the head coaches before each game about the problem.

The procedure:

- When the offensive qurterback feels
 the noise level is such that his signals
 can't be heard by his teammates, he
 HOLDS his position behind the center
 and looks toward the referee. Should
 the referee be in accord with the quarterback, he will sound his whistle immediately and stop the clock.
- 2. The referee will then ask the captain of the defensive team to move towards the

- noise area. By holding up both hands he will ask for QUIET from the student body and spectators in respect of proper sportsmanship.
- 3. After this procedure is completed, the referee then gives his ready-for-play signal. Should the quarterback feel the noise level hasn't subsided enough for his teammates to hear the signals, he will again HOLD his position behind the center and look towards the referee. If the referee is in accord again, he will stop the clock and penalize the defensive team five yards for delay of game.
- The procedure and five-yard penalty outlined in #3 is to be repeated and followed until such time that the noise

- level is on a normal or proper basis as decided by the referee.
- 5. Should the referee NOT be in accord with the quarterback regarding the noise level, and judge that the quarterback's teammates CAN properly hear his signals, the quarterback will be required to put the ball in play within the 25-second rule requirement.
- 6. Should the quarterback move out from behind the center—at any of the above times—without the authority of the referee he will be on his own. In other words, the referee doesn't have to honor his decision if in his mind he doesn't believe that the noise level has reached a certain proportion where the clock should be stopped.

RIX YARD

Tulane Director of Athletics

Rix Yard is beginning his eighth year in charge of Tulane's athletic program. The most dramatic moves of his first seven years came when Tulane broke company from the Southeastern Conference and became a major Southern independent in 1966 and when the decision was made to reinstate the physical education major in 1969.

Dr. Yard came to Tulane from Denison University in Granville, Ohio, where he headed a 12-sport varsity program and men's physical education department. Dr. Yard twice served as chairman of the NCAA television committee, and earned Lacrosse Coach of the Year honors in 1963. He is currently a member of the NCAA Academic Testing and Requirements Committee.

A graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, Dr. Yard was an all-Eastern tackle on the Penn football team and has been selected for that University's Lacrosse Hall of Fame.

He is a native of Toms River, N.J., where he attended Toms River High School. Dr. Yard also attended The Hun Preparatory School before enrolling at the University of Pennsylvania.

In 1941 Dr. Yard joined the Navy as Chief Boatswain's Mate in Gene Tunney's physical fitness program and served

as an instructor at Norfolk Naval Base. He was commissioned Ensign in 1942 and was later stationed at Notre Dame Midshipman school and Guam. Discharged in December, 1945, Dr. Yard is a Captain in the Naval Reserve.

Dr. Yard first joined the Denison staff in 1946 as basketball coach and assistant football coach under Woody Hayes. He left in 1949 to become supervisor of freshman athletics and freshman football coach at Penn, and was elevated to offensive line coach in 1952.

He returned to Denison in 1953 as Director of Athletics, and served as basketball coach in 1953 and lacrosse coach from 1953 to 1963. His unique lacrosse coaching record saw his team steadily increase its winning percentage each year for 11 years—from 0-10 in 1953 to 12-0 in 1963 when it was the nation's only unbeaten team and Dr. Yard received Coach of the Year honors.

Married to the former Adra "Skip" Gehrett, Dr. Yard is the father of two children. Rix, Jr., a Princeton, graduate, holds an advanced business degree from Tulane and is employed by the Allied Chemical Co. in Morristown, N.J. Connie, a school teacher, recently graduated from Newcomb College.

The cost of the new football field for Vanbilt is approximately \$250,000 while the which replaces the dangerous old cinder around the football field, cost \$90,000.

announcement for approval for the eet came from Vanderbilt Athletic Direc-Jess Neely, who three years ago came back his alma mater and vowed that better falities were his immediate goals.

Neely was captain of the Vanderbilt team in 22 when Dudley Field was dedicated in a 0-0 against Michigan. Coincidentally, Vanderwas the opponent that helped dedicate Michigan's Tartan surface last year in Ann Arbor.

This premier synthetic playing surface consists of a "grasslike" topping of tough nylon fibers bonded to a base or "impact cushion" of especially compounded synthetic resins.

The impact cushion is wet-poured over a prepared dirt-and-gravel base and about two inches of asphalt. It dries in about one-half hour. A thin layer of resin is then troweled on and the carpeting is immediately laid.

The result: A solid, integral playing surface with no seams. No top layer to wrinkle or pull loose. No joints or clamps through which water can seep. No layers that will deteriorate and delaminate due to exposure and wear.

There are no shoe restrictions. No special tennis-type or dull cleated shoes (unless the player prefers them).

No worry about snow on field. It is plowed off with snow removal equipment with no danger of damage.



It's what's underneath that counts: "Tartan" Turf's lower impact cushion is wet-poured. It dries in about a half hour. A thin layer of resin is then troweled on immediately before its tough, nylon topping is laid. The result: An integral playing surface with no seams, no top layer to wrinkle or pull loose, no joints or clamps through which water can seep and no layers to deteriorate and delaminate due to exposure and wear. "Tartan" Turf carries no shoe restrictions. Baseball and football players can use their regular spikes and cleats.

Pittman remained at Mississippi State in 1954, when Darrell Royal became the head coach, beginning a long friendship and coaching association. Royal made Pittman defensive line coach.

Royal moved to Washington in 1956 and took Pittman along as offensive line coach and chief aide. A year later the two shifted to Texas in the same capacity. Pittman remained Royal's top assistant for nine years before coming to Tulane. In that span, Texas notched four Southwestern Conference crowns, went to seven bowl games in nine seasons, and won 75 games against 19 losses and three ties.




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
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Holy Cross-A Bug Beats a Football Team

These are good kids; I'm sure of fliat. I just can't understand it," he numbled repeatedly.

Only a few days later Bill Whitton

did understand.

His players, who had worked so hard to learn the new unbalanced-line Tattack and had been mighty impressive in a full dress rehearsal earlier, had been so lethargic simply because they were ill. They had been bitten by the hepatitis bug-a slow destroyer of en-

Whitton, of course, had no way of

knowing this.

Sure, Bob Cooney, a junior defensive end, had been hospitalized several days before the Harvard opener with what was thought to be a severe case of influenza. Other HC players became ill during the next week. There was suspicion of a flu epidemic.

Infectious Hepatitis

It wasn't until Thursday that Cooney's illness was diagnosed as infectious hepatitis. The next day, a few hours before the departure for Hanover, N.H., and the game with Dartmouth, the entire squad was given immunization shots. Four boys were so sick they were hurried from the line to the college infirmary.

Three others became violently ill at

Hanover that night and were rushed

back to Worcester. Several others faced Dartmouth but had to leave after a few plays. The Indians' strong Ivy Leaguers rolled up a 38-6 score against a HC team which started without 11 reg-

Back home again, the entire HC squad took a hurried blood test on Sunday morning. All were found infected, to some degree, with hepatitis. Some 25 were to spend several weeks

in isolation in the college infirmary.
"It's a disaster," sighed Coach Whitton, who himself had been very sick, but had carried on during the week of

preparations for Dartmouth.

Holy Cross, the next day, was forced to cancel the remaining eight games of its schedule. So far as can be learned, this had never happened to a college football team before. So Whitton had encountered more hard luck than any new head coach in history.

Costly Illness

The disaster cost Holy Cross at least \$200,000 in revenue from football, which had supported many minor sports. There were all the usual expenses, but no gate receipts for eight games, including the finale with Boston College which had been HC's home game and always a sellout as early as September.

But the rough setback hasn't discouraged Holy Cross authorities in their determination to build their football back to the high plane where Dr. Eddie Anderson placed it in the golden

There had been rumors in the years before that HC might abandon football as had many other Jesuit Colleges. Some long-haired dissidents and a noisy professor or two had been taking pot shots at HC football and lobbying against continuing it.

Their voices became whispers once disaster hit the football squad. The hepatitis epidemic may have proved a

blessing in disguise.

Alumni and friends rallied their sympathies and their dollars and made it clear that they wanted Holy Cross to stay in football.

Dartmouth, an almost annual rival of the Crusaders the last 33 seasons, sent a check to Holy Cross for \$1,000 and suggested that other ECAC colleges also contribute to ease the emergency. Boston College, HC's dearest enemy, sent \$2,000. Army and Navy each put \$1,000 checks towards the continuance of Crusader football. Brigham Young University, a Mormon in-stitution, sent \$500 to the Catholic school. South Carolina, which had never played HC in any sport, was a contributor, too. So were others.

More than 500 alumni sent \$15 checks

for souvenir season's tickets when there wasn't a single home game.

Jerseys See Action

Sacramento State, which had dedicated its season to Holy Cross and wore the Crusaders' jerseys in its final game, launched a campaign to help. Mike Carter, the team captain, Coach Ray Clemons and publicist Phil Dynan created so much interest in HC at Sacramento that hundreds of students and friends made contributions. The HC co-captains flew to Sacramento and sat on the team's bench for its final game. Later Carter, Clemons and Dynan were feted in Boston at the Holy Cross Club's annual O'Melia dinner.

Fans in all parts of the country sent checks of \$1, \$5 and \$10 with their sympathies. The fund welled. It is not nearly the \$200,000 HC lost, but it all

It was a water fountain on the hilltop practice field, half a mile above the campus, which led to the hepatitis epidemic. Neighborhood kids, a whole family of which had been infected by hepatitis, had been at the fountain during the summer.

Most of the HC players were infected on their very first day of practice. (Federal, state and civic health officials, who probed the situation intensely because it was unprecedented, agreed to this. None of the freshman squad, which reported ten days later, became ill.)

At least 10 HC varsity footballers were so sick that they missed a semester. The ECAC granted three seniors another year of eligibility, and will consider the cases of the afflicted un-

derclassmen later.

Held Spring Practice

Holy Cross, for the first time in some 20 years, had spring practice. "It was an absolute necessity," explained Whit-ton, "Our squad has the equivalent of two sophomore classes so far as football experience is concerned. Our seniors of this fall have played only two games, or less, in two years."

The Crusaders may have been down, but they seem to have everybody behind them. The road back will be steep, but they hope to climb it. HC is looking to the future and ready to forget the nightmare of hepatitis with a con-viction that happier days are just around the corner.

COLLEGIATE COMMISSIONERS ASSOCIATION

Early in 1939 five college football commissioners established an organization for the purpose of attacking mutual problems. From that small beginning has grown what is now the Collegiate Commissioners Association, its members the chief executive officers and their assistants from the eleven major college conferences from coast to coast. Representing nearly 300 institutions, they range in size from the sevenmember Mid-American Conference to the mammoth 190-member Eastern College Athletic Conference.

The CCA's field of interest has broadened greatly since its inception, now encompassing not only football, but all sports on the collegiate program. The members as such give united attention not alone to officiating assignment and rules interpretation, but also to procedures on undergraduate athletic recruitment and eligibility and to the many other facets of intercollegiate sports administration.

Tulane University

Tulane University is an educational institution deeply rooted in the past and reaching toward the future.

Founded in 1834 as the Medical College of Louisiana, Tulane today offers undergraduate programs in 25 areas of study, masters' degrees in 42 fields and the doctor of philosophy degree in 27 disciplines.

Courses are offered in the College of Arts and Sciences, Newcomb College (the coordinate college of women), and University College (the evening division); in the Schools of Architecture, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Public Health and Tropical Medicine, and Social Work; in the Graduate School, the Graduate Scool of Business Administration, the Summer School, the Center for Teacher Education and at several research institutes.

The interest in tropical medicine—the Medical College of Louisiana was founded to combat epidemics of yellow fever and other tropical diseases—is the one cord that runs throughout the University history, even as its interests expanded with its development as part of the University of Louisiana in 1847, and with its emergence, finally, as the

Tulane University of Louisiana in 1884, as er a generous gift from Paul Tulane had established the Tulane Educational Fund. The Fund's administrators used the gift to reorganize the University as a private, non-sectarian institution bearing Tulane's name.

Today Tulane's President, Dr. Herbert E. Longenecker, directs the operation of a cosmopolitan community whose faculty (800 full-time, 150 part-time) and students (6500 full-time, 2000 part-time) represent every state and 60 foreign countries.

By far the major portion of the University's activities are centered at the main campus, a 100-acre site in uptown New Orleans. Scholars also pursue their interests at the downtown Medical School campus; at the Delta Regional Primate Research Center in Covington, La., 35 miles from the main campus; at the International Center for Medical Research and training at Cali, Colombia, and at the University's newest campus—the F. Edw. Hebert Center, across the Mississippi River from downtown New Orleans, a development devoted to scientific research.

children.



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History of the Southeastern Conference

The ten institutions which now compose the Southeastern Conference began athletic competition with one another as members of the old Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association (SIAA), which was organized on Dec. 22, 1894 at a meeting of faculty representatives in Atlanta, presumably called by Dr. William L. Dudley of Vanderbilt.

Seven schools were represented at the meeting but twelve more joined as charter members during the first year of competition, 1895. Dr. Dudley was elected president and served in that capacity until his death in 1914. The SIAA expanded to thirty members by 1920, and on Dec. 12-13 of that year in a meeting at Gainesville, Fla., called by Prof. S. V. Sanford of the University of Georgia the larger schools reorganized as the Southern Conference, with Prof. Sanford serving as the first president.

Despite an original limit of sixteen, the Southern Conference grew to a membership of 23 by 1928. The SIAA and the SC together had at one time or another included most of the Southern colleges fielding intercollegiate teams over a geographical area ranging from Virginia to Texas.

On Dec. 8-9, 1932 at the annual meeting of the Southern Conference, in Knoxville, Tenn., the thirteen members west and south of the Appalachians reorganized as the Southeastern Conference, and the ten members east remained as the Southern. Dr. Frank L. McVey, President of the University of Kentucky, was elected president of the new conference. He called an informal meeting of the presidents of the institutions for Feb. 16, 1933 in Birmingham, Ala., and the first annual meeting of the full conference was held in Atlanta, Feb. 27, 1933.

Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Ga. Tech, Kentucky, L.S.U., Mississippi, Miss. State, Sewanee, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt were the 13 original schools of the SEC. Sewanee withdrew, however, Dec. 13, 1940, then Ga. Tech on June 1, 1964 and Tulane June 1, 1966, leaving the conference ten members.

Throughout the entire SEC history the presidents have maintained the active role of represen-

tation at the annual meetings, and have determined the policy for the conference. The overall policy evolves as a continual strengthening of eligibility and academic regulations to insure that programs for the student-athlete working toward a degree are developed at the highest possible level. Through the pursuit of this policy the SEC has become a national leader in collegiate athletics. Prime contributions include organization of the "grant-in-aid" and co-operatively developing (with the SWC) the "letter-of-intent."

The office of Commissioner was created in 1940, due to the great amount of detail work developing for each current president and the secretary of the conference, especially in the field of recruiting and eligibility. Martin S. Conner of Jackson, Miss. was appointed Commissioner and took office on August 21 of that year as an extension of the authority of the presidents. He devised a system for registering the athletes and developed the league's agreement into sturdy lines. Mr. Connor became incapacitated due to illness late in 1946 and Dean N. W. Dougherty of the University of Tennessee, longtime Secretary of the Conference, served as Acting Commissioner from August of 1947 until Bernie H. Moore was appointed the second fulltime Commissioner on Feb. 21, 1948.

Moore brought to the office the experience of a successful coach and administrator, having accomplished outstanding records (including national championships) in both football and track at Louisiana State. In his 18-year tenure he guided the SEC to operational stability, financial security and national stature undreamed of by the founders. Bernie retired amid a shower of honors, including the title of Commissioner, Emeritus, and was succeeded on April 1, 1966 by A. M. (Tonto) Coleman. One of the most popular persons in the athletic world, Coleman served as head coach and athletic director at Abilene Christian College, then as assistant coach at Florida, then as assistant coach and assistant athletic director at Ga. Tech before accepting the duty of SEC Commissioner.

COMMODORE BOOSTERS




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Some Weren't Close

To qualify for this 1968 listing a coach must have won 80 or more victories for his college career.

Actually, the Southeastern Conference has been well represented on this tablet of honor since the original ranking in 1958. Seven other men from SEC schools achieved this Top Twenty before retiring from the duties of head coach. They are: The late "Red" Sanders of Vanderbilt (and UCLA), Wally Butts of Georgia, Bowden Wyatt of Tennessee (also Wyoming and Arkansas), Art Guepe of Vanderbilt (and Virginia), Phil Dickens, a Tennessee man, who coached at Ga. Tech, and Jess Neely, a Vanderbilt graduate who coached at Clemson and Rice.

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Neely Fourth In All-Time Wins

Jess Neely, Dan McGugin and Ray Morrison, three men who brought fame and glory to Vanderbilt, rank among the first 25 coaches for victories in the history of college football.

Neely, presently the Vandy athletic director, is fourth behind such names as Amos Stagg and Pop Warner with 207 victories as head coach at Southwestern of Memphis, Clemson and Rice. Neely is a 1924 Vanderbilt graduate.

McGugin, who coached 30 years at Vanderbilt from 1904 to 1934 less one year for armed services duty, won 196 games and is tied for seventh with his former coach, the late Fielding Post of Michigan.

Morrison, Vandy's All-America quarterback in 1911, is tied for 25th with three others with 155 wins. Morrison coached at Vanderbilt, SMU, Temple and Austin College in Texas.
