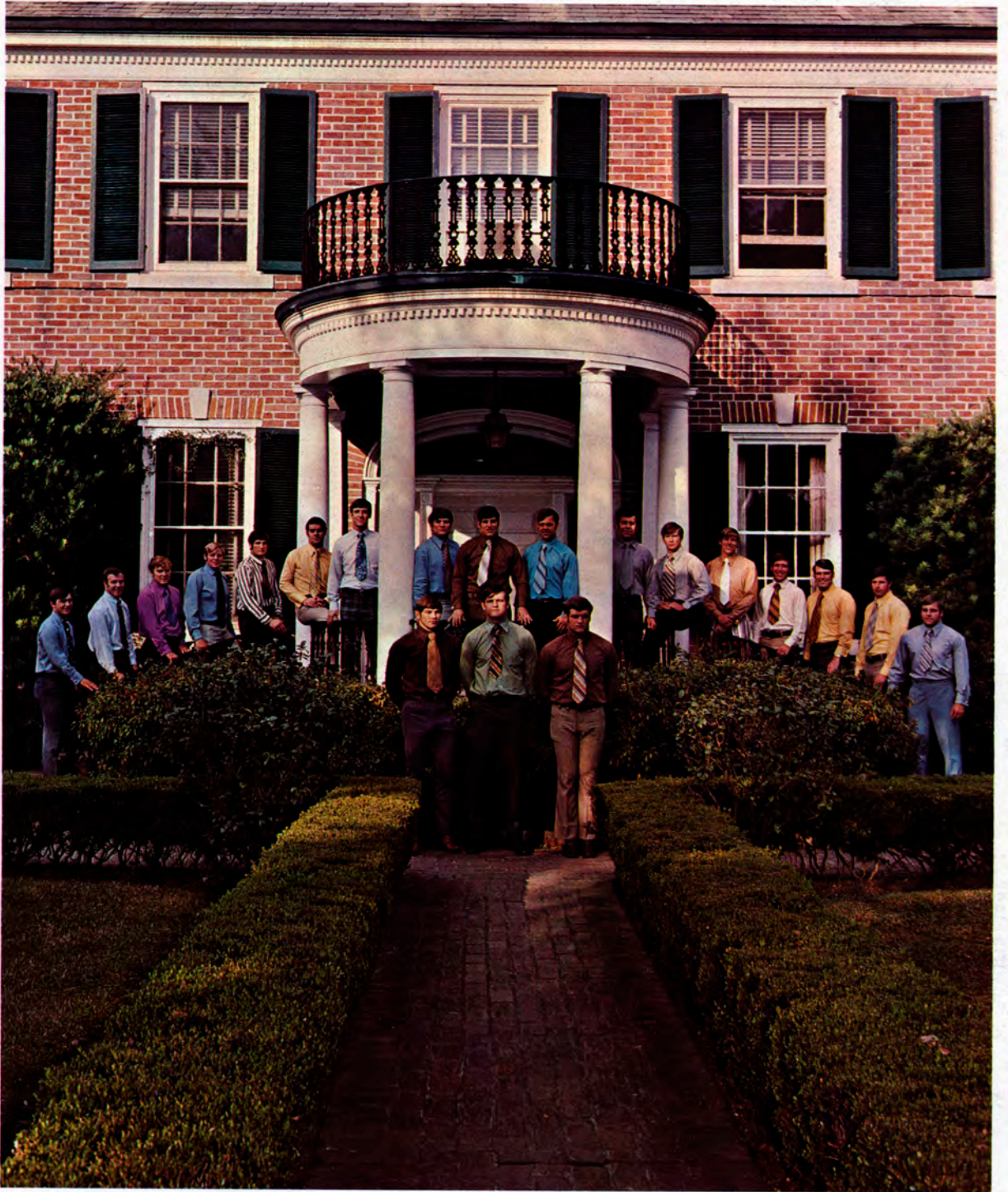

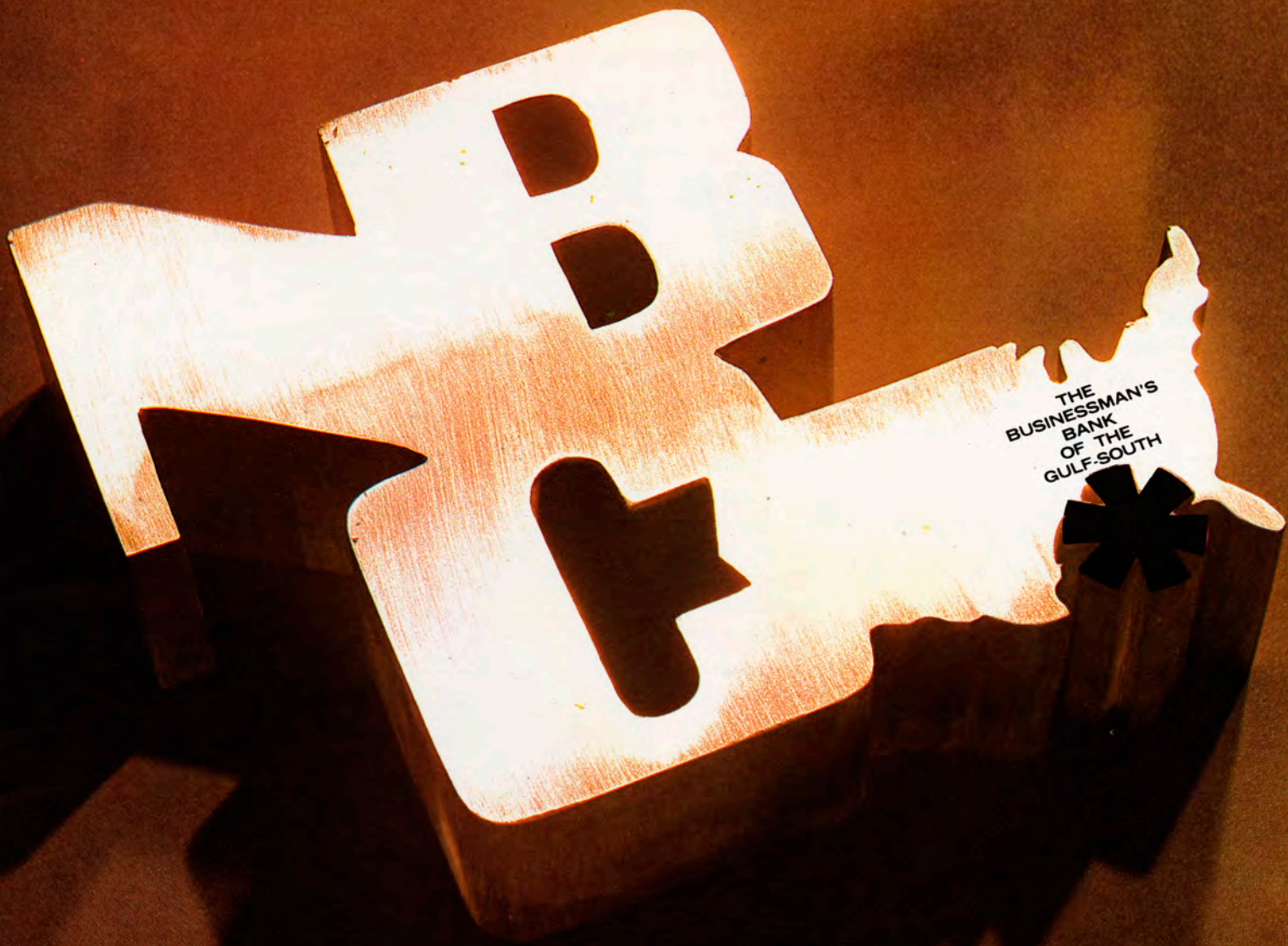

At one time the area was a 500-acre rice plantation near Covington, La.

Today, contemporary buildings made of concrete, marble and glass house Tulane scientists conducting extensive studies of chimpanzees, monkeys, baboons and other animals designated as primates.

Collectively, the buildings are known as the Tulane Delta Regional Primate Research Center, one of seven such centers in the United States.

Completed in 1964, the center occupies a 500-acre tract in a pleasantly-scented pine forest. It has five concrete buildings for laboratories, cages, administrative offices, and maintenance; a secluded field for radiation studies and two outdoor observation field cages covering an acre each.

An initial grant of \$2,500,000 from the National Institutes of Health covered the purchase of land and construction of buildings.

Located 35 miles from the main Tulane campus in New Orleans in an area south of Covington, the center is regarded as one of the most beautiful and extensive facilities for the study of subhuman primates. Recently, it became the newest unit of Tulane Medical Center by direction of Tulane President Herbert E. Longenecker.

Six other educational institutions are associated with Tulane in the Delta Center—Louisiana State and Loyola (New Orleans) Universities, and the Universities of Alabama, Arkansas, Mississippi and Texas. Cooperation of outside research workers is a principal function of the center and one of the basic reasons for its existence.

Dr. Arthur J. Riopelle, center director, supervises research programs conducted by a staff of 25 resident scientists, assisted by 53 technicians. Officers of the World Health Organization have come several times for observation or to participate in research.

Research on about 625 primates of 23 species is done in the laboratory and in their natural habitat. Emphasis is placed in four specific areas: communicable diseases; genetics and develop-

mental disorders; behavioral sciences; and environmental health.

The first of these, the communicable diseases program, is carried on primarily through research in four areas: parasitology, virology, microbiology and biochemistry. Principal aims are the study of bionomics, immunochemistry and parasite host-relations in selected diseases, using non-human primates as models.

Genetics and developmental research at the center emphasizes several major problems of reproductive physiology. They include fertilization, development of the embryo and the origin of birth defects. Environmental factors and influences affecting fertility and fetal growth also are studied.

The behavioral sciences program is centered on the study of social, intellectual and emotional capacities in normal primates and in primates undergoing metabolic or infectious diseases states. Some animals are experimentally altered by neurosurgical, electrical or biochemical means.

In large outdoor cages and in the field, studies of social and ecological factors in behavior are conducted by center scientists.

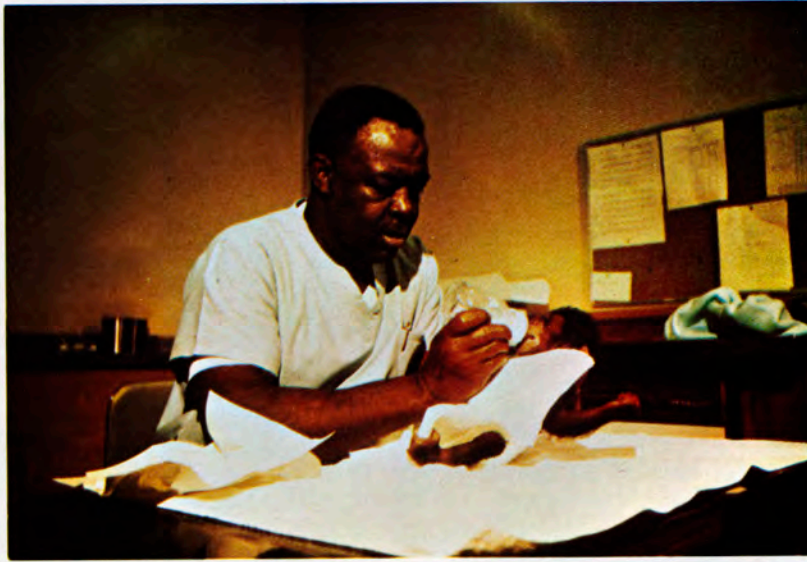
Environmental health is studied principally in relation to radiation biology; the emphasis being on investigations of radiation effects on the fetal brain and on the aging process in the central nervous system.

The studies should bring about a better understanding of mechanisms which underlie environmentally-induced birth defects in the nervous system and provide information on how human life would survive in an adverse environment, such as an area of atomic fall-out.

Tulane scientists at the center also study the effects of environmental changes on the physiological capacities of the animals and their resistance to disease.

Primary aim of research at the Tulane Delta Regional Primate Research Center is to direct the results toward eventual solution of health problems of man.

RED CROSS STATIONS—Tulane Stadium is equipped with the most modern, up-to-date first aid equipment available, matching the finest Red Cross stadium facilities in the country. The main station is located on the ground level in the northwest corner of the stadium, and additional stations are maintained at the northeast, southeast and southwest corners on the ground level and under the west stands near the north 20-yard line. Should there be an emergency near you, notify the nearest stadium guard immediately.

DOCTORS' CALLS—Doctors' telephones are located as follows: East side, ground level at entrance to ramp #3; West side, ground level at entrance to ramp #3; West side ramp, radio booth level, above section X-L. Doctors' numbers are assigned by the Tulane Athletic Department. A record of your number will be retained at the stadium telephones and your number will be announced over the public address system.

OTHER EMERGENCY CALLS—Stadium telephone number is 861-3661. Pages will be made over the public address system only in case of extreme emergencies.

LOST AND FOUND—During and after the game, items should be claimed at the Lost & Found Office on the ground level in the southwest corner of the stadium. On ensuing days, items can be claimed at the Stadium Ticket Office, 6401 Willow Street, telephone 861-3661.

REST ROOMS—Rest Rooms are located on the ground level and on the upper level ramp under the top deck. There are also rest rooms at each end of the upper deck.

TELEPHONES—Telephone pay stations are on the ground level concourse on all sides and ends of the stadium.

CONCESSION PRICES—Pay no more. All vendors must wear identifying badges. Please buy only from authorized vendors and pay only the above prices. Report any instances of over charge or other complaints to the nearest stadium guard, including the vendor's badge number.

Duke Chappuis—"Through football I've had the opportunity to meet people, to get close to other guys on the team. Plus, I feel I have gained an insight into organization . . . the process by which many facets of our society operate."

Billy Clingon—"You learn how to compete in football. This knowledge, I feel, gives you a background on what you'll face in life after college. Besides, it's good exercise and leads to health and physical fitness."

Chip Dewitt—"From football, I have finally learned the art of mind controlling the body. The more you get your mind ready, the better your body functions. It's amazing what you can accomplish if you try hard."

Bryan Duck—"I've learned to accept authority. I'm a more disciplined individual. Being associated with a football program has made me appreciate and practice sportsmanship. The big gains and losses in football often parallel those in life."

Mike Farnell—"Tulane has provided me with the opportunity to be among all classes of people. That has taught me how to get along with people who don't necessarily have the same background I do. I would never have had the opportunity to learn of these different attitudes and ways of life, if not for football."

Joe Gendron—"The game of football has given me the opportunity to receive, first, an excellent education. Also, from my experiences playing football I've gained the feeling that I can overcome any challenge I might face in my future life."

Johnny Gill—"Benefits that immediately come to mind are the intangibles like lasting associations that develop with other players, and coaches. The inherent challenge in football is important, too."

Bart Graves—"Football has done so much for me . . . like given me an education in the best school in the South. It has allowed me to bring my family down to live in a city like New Orleans. The game has been the biggest part of my life since seventh grade. It has taught me how to pick myself up after a rough time."

Joel Henderson—"If it weren't for football, I wouldn't be where I am today. It has given me a good access to an education and taught me to compete and how to compete, be it on the football field, in the classroom, or anywhere in life."

Ray Hester—"The biggest thing for me has been the personal satisfaction I get from playing. I enjoy the hardship of football. I get satisfaction by doing my job right, and getting recognition for it."

Rick Kingrea—"I believe that everyone is endowed with a competitive spirit. A writer may manifest this spirit in a desire to write a best seller. I have found that for myself, I can best manifest my competitive spirit on the athletic field."

Jack Laborde—"The game of football has provided me with the opportunities for a civil engineering degree and to meet influential people in the city. You have to be disciplined many times in life; football teaches you that. Besides all that, I've enjoyed playing in front of all the hometown fans."

David Richard—"Football teaches above all, discipline. Also, the competition against people equal to, or better than you, helps prepare you for the competition you'll face later in life."

Mike Sanford—"The spirit of competition and a diehard attitude about fighting for what you want in life are important things I've learned from football. You can relate the bumps and bruises you get in football to the bumps and bruises of life . . . it makes life easier to handle."

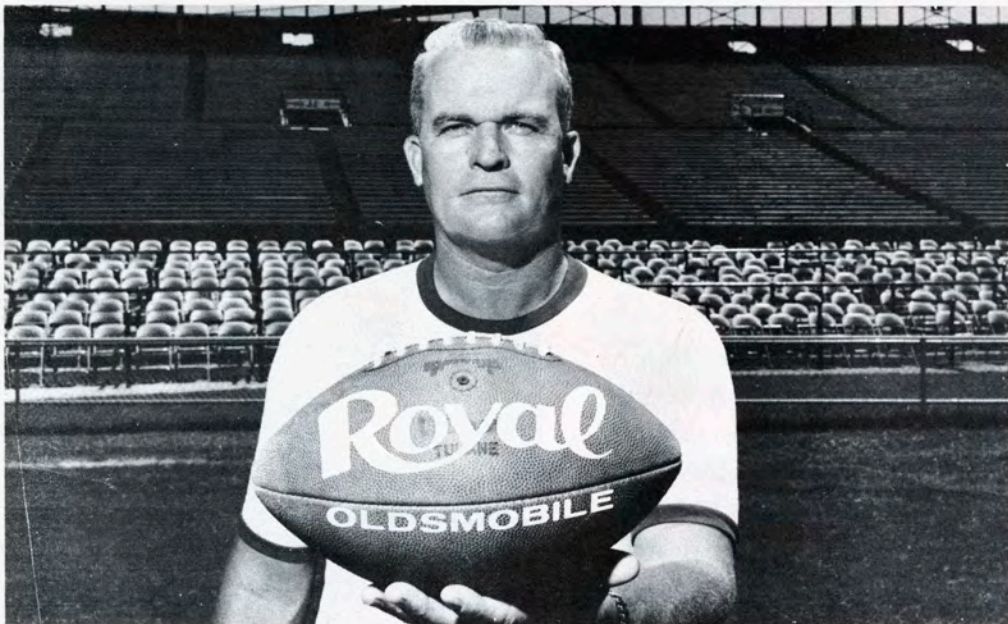

New Facilities for Law School

The Tulane University School of Law has been moved into new facilities at Freret Street and Newcomb Place. The building, the former Howard-Tilton Memorial Library, was renovated and furnished at a total cost of \$1,040,000. It has been renamed Joseph Merrick Jones Hall in honor of the late president of the Tulane Board of Administrators and a Tulane law graduate. Dedication ceremonies are scheduled for January, 1971.

The renovated structure includes four classrooms with raised seating accommodating 620 students. Dr. Ferdinand F. Stone, professor of law and director of the Institute of Comparative Law, conducts a class of 200 students in the largest of the classrooms. The building also houses a court room with 100 seats and two seminar rooms seating 50 each.

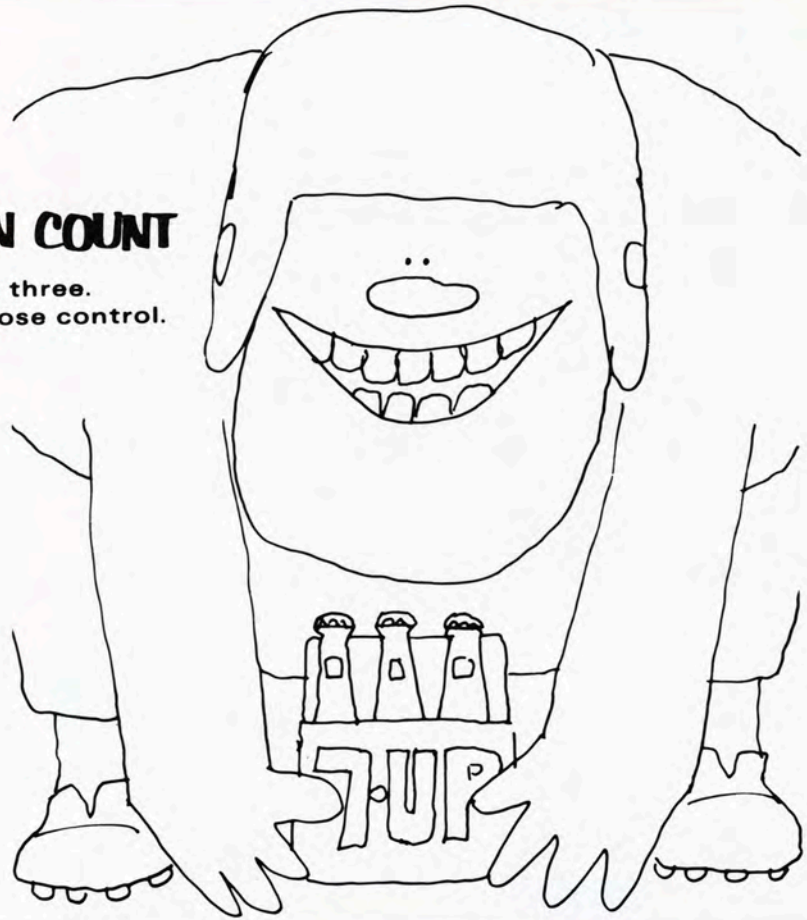
Office space is also plentiful for the law school's 30-member faculty. Dr. Leonard Oppenheim, professor of law, goes over a class schedule with St. Paul Bourgeois, second year law student from Jeanerette, La. The law school was formerly located in cramped quarters in Tilton Hall on St. Charles Avenue.



Of the building's 71,905 square feet of space, 44,695 square feet are occupied by the law library. This space includes offices for the library staff, reading and discussion rooms off the book stack area and a reference and bibliography room. Numerous small study rooms within the book stacks provide students and research workers with facilities convenient to the material they need to use.

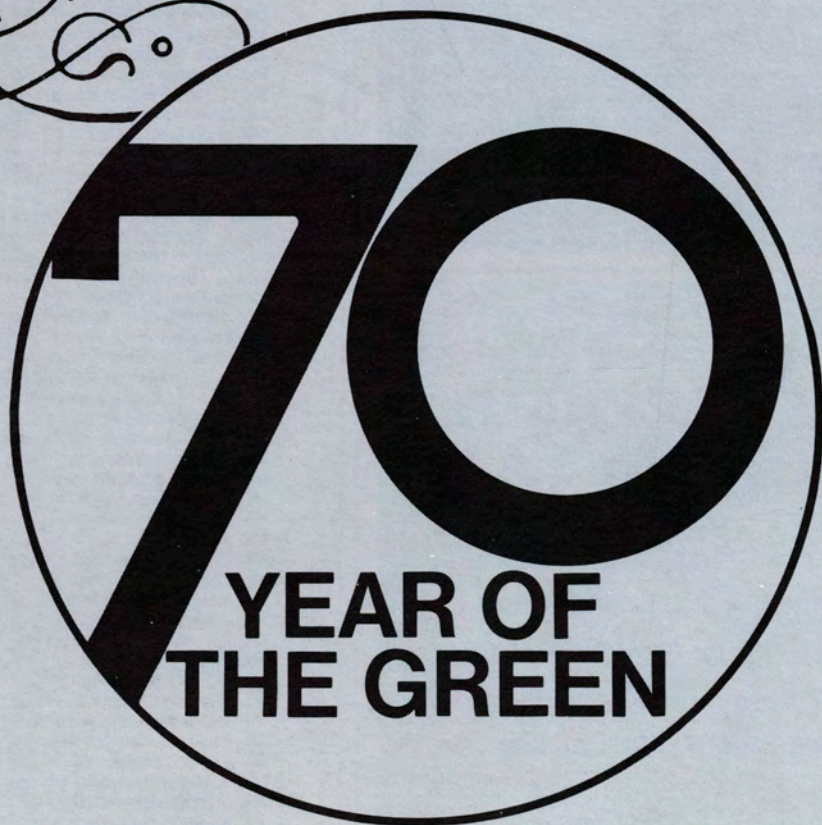
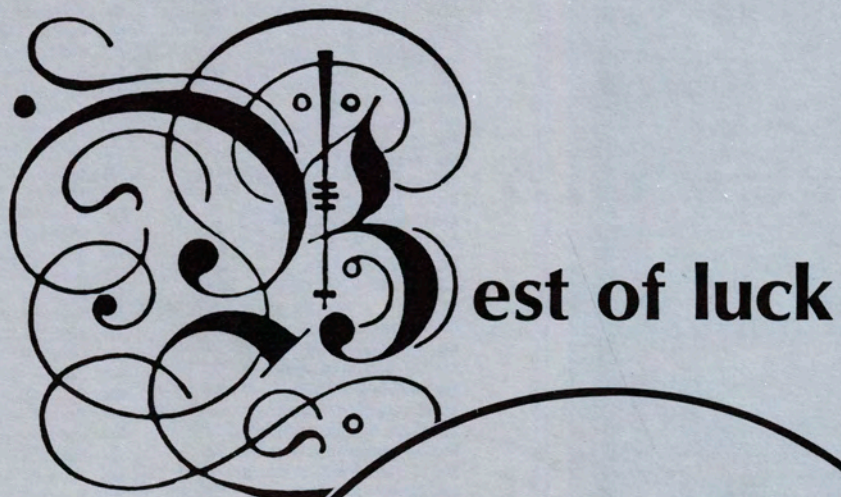

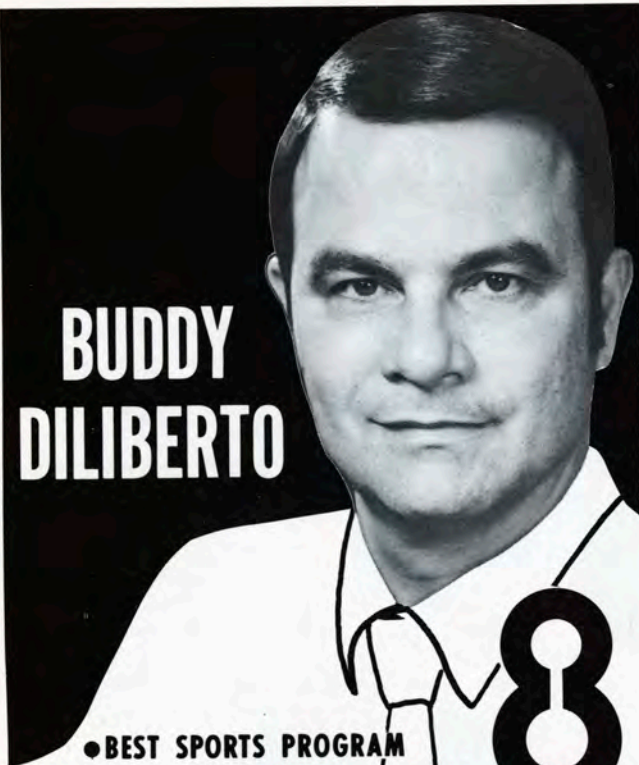

TULANE FOOTBALL RECORDS AND POSSIBILITIES--PRIOR TO LOUISIANA ST. GAME NOV. 28

CROWD This is the biggest sports crowd in the South this fall. Previous biggest was 77,861 for Saints-LA Rams game here Nov. 1. Tulane Stadium record is 83,221 for LSU game here Nov. 22, 1958. All-time intercollegiate record for a night crowd is 82,567 for Tulane-LSU game here Nov. 19, 1966. Tonight's crowd will boost Tulane's average home attendance this season to approximately 35,500, largest since 38,844 average in 1966.

RECORD IF TULANE WINS--8-3 record will represent most wins in 22 seasons, since 1948 team went 9-1. Percentage (.727) will be best since 1949 team (7-2-1) was .750. IF A TIE--7-3-1 record will be most wins in 21 years, since 1949 team went 7-2-1; best percentage (.682) since 1950 team (6-2-1) was .722. IF LSU WINS--7-4 record will be most wins in 21 years, since 1949 team went 7-2-1; best percentage (.682) since 1950 team (6-2-1) was .722.

RUSHING *ABERCROMBIE has 209 carries this season, breaking record of 188 set by Eddie Price in 1948. ABERCROMBIE has 964 net yards this season, needs 18 to pass Bill Banker (981 in 1928) for third place on all-time season list. ABERCROMBIE needs 36 yards to become the second player in Tulane history to crack the 1,000-yard mark for a single season. Eddie Price had 1,178 in 1948 and 1,137 in 1949. *ABERCROMBIE had 246 net yards last week against N.C. State, shattering Price's single game mark of 238 vs. Navy in 1949.

PASSING TEAM has passed for 1,229 yards this season, needs 205 more to tie record of 1,434 yards in 1969.

RECEIVING BARRIOS has 446 yards, needs 38 more to match record of 484 by W. C. McElhannon in 1951.

SCORING GIBSON has 34 points, needs 5 more to tie record of 39 by Uwe Pontius in 1966 and 1967 as highest-scoring place kicker. GIBSON has 6 field goals, needs 1 to tie Pontius in 1966 and 1967. **TEAM has made 7 field goals (Gibson 6, Muse 1), tying record of 7 in 1966 and 1967. *TEAM has attempted 14 field goals, old record was 11 in 1966 & 67.

INTERCEPTIONS **TEAM has 27 this season, tying record set in 1949. *TEAM has 399 yards on returns, breaking mark of 381 in 1931. **ELLIS has 9, tying record set by Jimmy Glisson in 1949. *ELLIS has 14 in his career, breaking record of 12 by Don Zimmerman in 1930-32 and Ellsworth Kingery in 1949-51. *BULLARD has 167 yards on returns, breaking record of 141 by Glisson in 1949. Bullard has 8 interceptions, needs 1 to tie record of 9 by Ellis and Glisson.

PUNTING Sanders has 66 punts this year, needs 5 to tie 71 by Dave East, 1963. SANDERS has 2,494 yards this year, needs 365 to tie his won mark of 2,859 in 1969. SANDERS has 195 career punts, needs 6 to tie 201 by East in 1963-65. *SANDERS has 7,995 career yards, breaking mark of 7,660 by East.

Seven stations will be regulars on the Tulane network this fall: KSYL in Alexandria, WIBR in Baton Rouge, KXKW in Lafayette, KLOU in Lake Charles, KLIC in Monroe, WDSU in New Orleans, and KEEL-FM in Shreveport. Bruce Miller does the play-by-play, Wayne Mack is the color man, and Lynn Michel is the chief engineer.

Miller is starting his twelfth season calling the action for the Green Wave. A 39-year-old native of Geneva, Ill., he is a 21-year veteran of broadcasting and has been with station WDSU in New Orleans for 14 years. Miller has previous experience doing play-by-play broadcasting for the University of Illinois and working on the Armed Forces Radio Service.

Mack is a newcomer to the broadcast team this fall, but he's a familiar figure in New Orleans, where he is Sports Director of WDSU-TV. Also from Illinois, Mack is a 46-year-old native of Pekin, and is a 23-year veteran of broadcasting. He has been with WDSU for 13 years, serving as its sports director for the past five. He has done play-by-play for the Universities of Minnesota, Nebraska, and Gustavus-Adolphus.

Tulane Football Highlights. WDSU Television, Channel 6 in New Orleans, carries a half-hour of filmed highlights of the previous game each Sunday at 10 a.m.

Green Wave Warm Up. WYES Television, Channel 12 in New Orleans, televises this new show, previewing the Green Wave's upcoming opponent. The program is carried Thursdays from 9 to 9:30 p.m., and repeated Saturdays from 1 to 1:30 p.m.

Green Wave Report. WDSU radio carries this five-minute show featuring Lynn Cole with Tulane players and coaches Monday through Friday at 8:40 a.m. and 6:25 p.m.

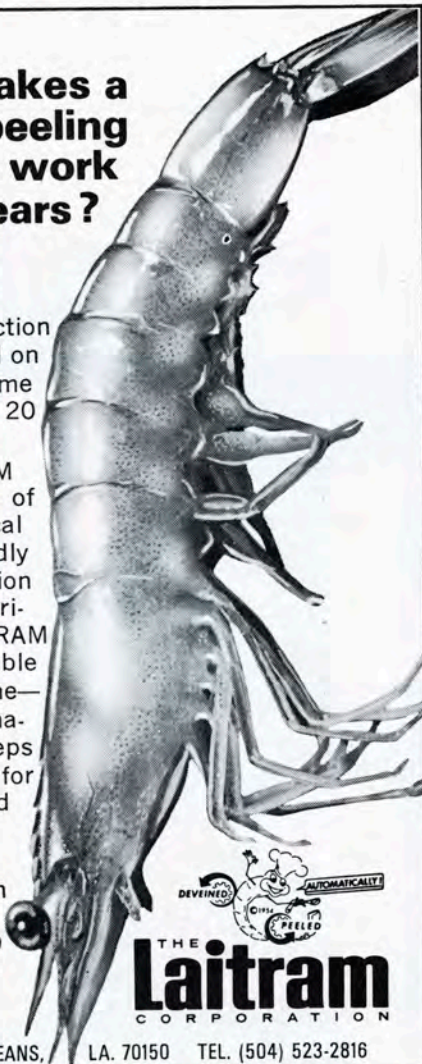

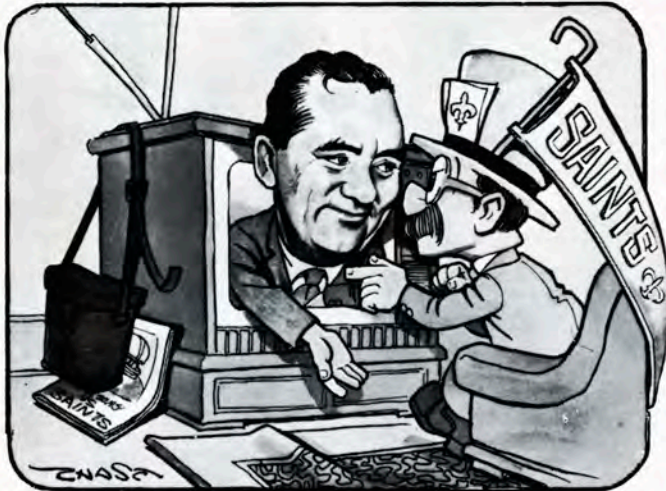

Allen Wilkenfeld—"The biggest gain I have gotten from football is the ability to discipline myself. I think I now have the ability to pick myself up after a bad time without losing my poise. The competition has been a positive thing for me, too."

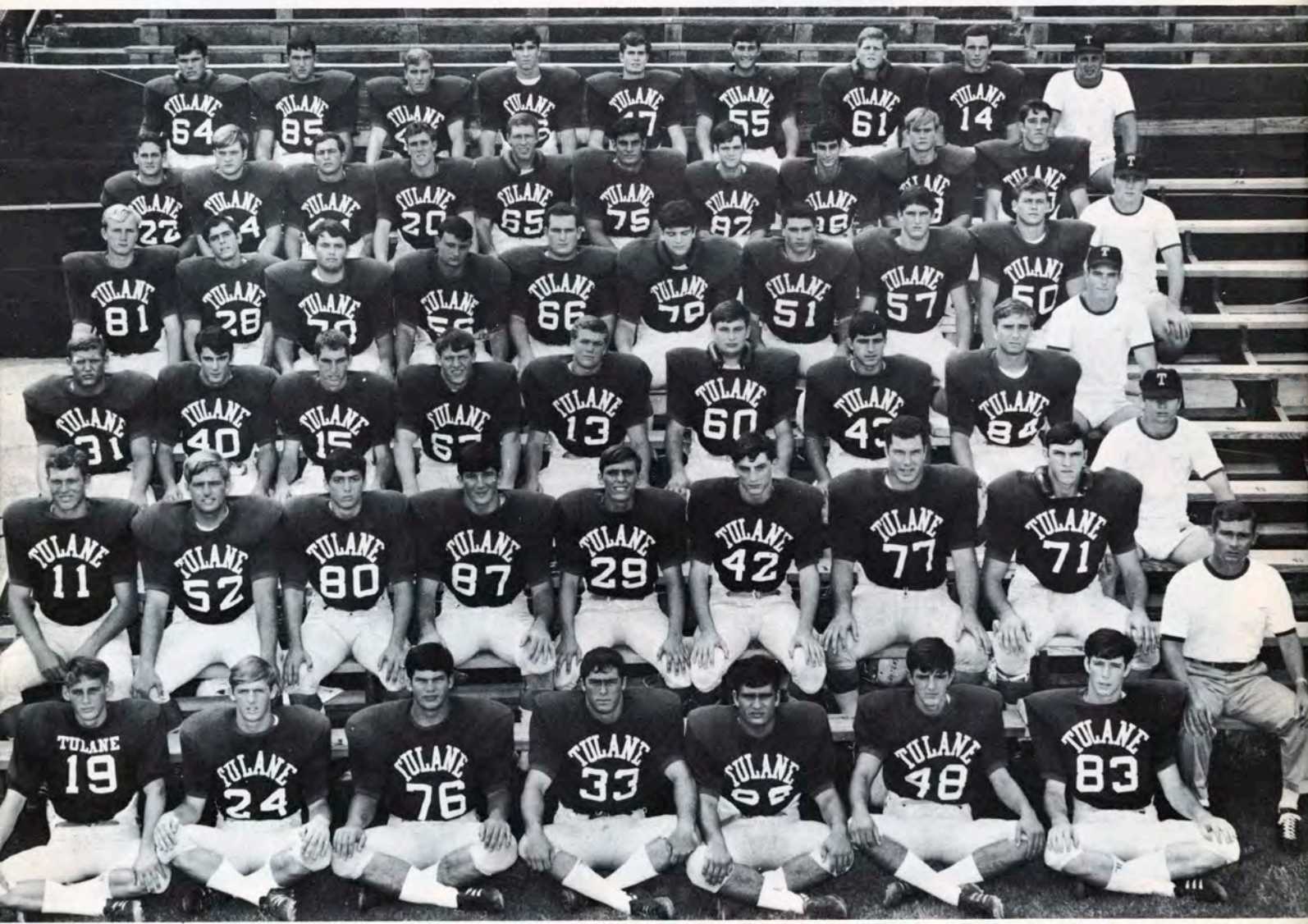
