

Junior Philharmonic to Present Concert at Dixon Hall on Saturday

The Junior Philharmonic Society announces its third recital of the 1968-69 series, which will take place Saturday at 10:45 a. m. at Dixon Hall on the Newcomb College campus. Four young performers will be featured.

First on the program will be 15-year-old Kathleen Bartels. Kathleen will play "Sonatina in A Minor" by Handel, "Sonata V Opus 283, First Movement" by Mozart, "Improvisation Opus 46" by Edward Macdowell, and "Satire," (a Miniatre) by Robert Stoltze.

Kathleen has been studying piano since first grade. She is presently a sophomore at John F. Kennedy High School, and is planning a career in music therapy. She also enjoys acting and is considering going into some type of speech work in college. At school, Kathleen is a member of the Student Council and belongs to the Speech Club. Last year she was a three-star winner in the Louisiana Federation of Music Clubs Tournament, received

a superior rating in the 1968 National Guild. She also received a gold cup for three year's superior rating in the Louisiana Federation of Music Clubs Music Festival, and was a winner in the Bach Contest. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herman W. Bartels.

Anthony Laciura Jr., 17, is second on the program. Anthony is a tenor and will sing "Marechiaro" by Tosti, "Torna a Surriento" by De Curtis and "Ah Marie" by Di Capua.

As a boy soprano, Anthony was a winner in the Junior Philharmonic auditions. He has also sung with the New Orleans Symphony Orchestra as an audition winner of the Youth Concerts in their Symphony for Children Series. An-

thony is active in the Loyola Opera Workshop Theater and has his own choir at St. Cecilia's Church. He is also a soloist at the First Baptist Church.

Anthony is a senior at Holy Cross High School. He hopes to continue his musical studies at Loyola and one day go into opera.

Pianist Sylvia Ann Golmon will be the third soloist. Sylvia, 14, will play pieces by Bach and Chopin.

Sylvia, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. V. Golmon of Alexandria, has appeared as piano soloist with the New Orleans Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra at the Youth Concerts, on programs at a statewide meeting of the Business and Professional Women, and for three years with the Northwestern State College Symphony. Her hobbies are horseback riding and swimming. Sylvia hopes to become a concert pianist, but, if she cannot do

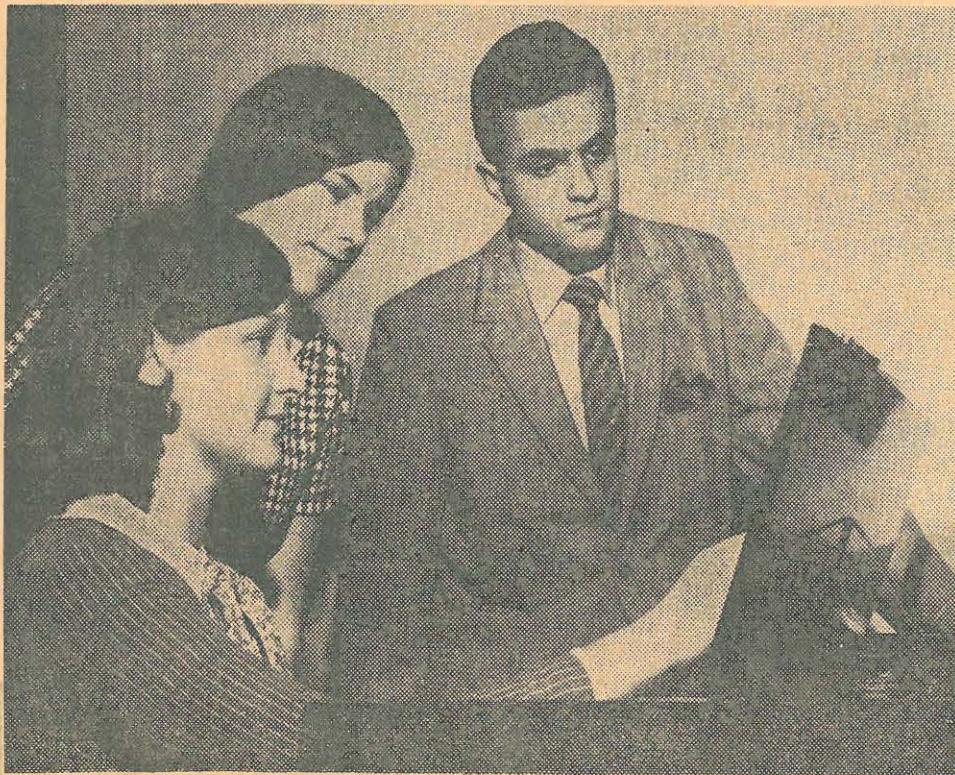
this, she would like to teach.

Nancy Ann Davis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Davis, the last pianist, will play the "Circus Suite" by Turina.

Nancy, 17, is a senior at Behrman High School. She has been studying piano for about four years and has already placed second in the Annual Sonata Contest sponsored by the New Orleans Music Teachers Association, was rated "superior" at the National Federation, and received a "Superior Plus" at the National Guild Piano Auditions. Nancy plans to major in music at college.

Closing the program will be two young dancers, Victoria Rucker and Christian Casso, who will dance the Snowflake pas de deux from the "Nutcracker Ballet" by Tchaikowsky.

Saturday, March 22, the Junior Philharmonic Society will hold its annual auditions from 9 a. m. until 5 p. m. at Dixon Hall. The purpose of the auditions is to select winners to perform at four concerts to be held next season. Auditions are open to singers, dancers and instrumentalists up to 25 years old.
