Saturday the Junior-Philharmonic Society is sponsoring its second concert of the season. It will feature performances by six young artists and presentation of the Irving Carr Award to last year's

most outstanding participant in the series.

Fourteen-year-old Eileen Kenny will open the recital which will take place at 10:45 a.m. at Dixon Hall on the Newcomb College campus. She will dance a variation from the ballet "Paquita" by Minkus.

Another dancer, Ann Ar-noult, will dance "Waltz" from "Ballet Suite" by Shostakovich. Ann is a 15-year-old 10th grader at Mercy Academy.

Vera Soong is the first of two pianists appearing on the bill. The 12-year-old will play the "Andante" m o v e m e n t from the Sonata, K.545 by Mozart and "Solfeggietto" by Bach. She is a winner of the Gold Cup and Gold Medal Award of the Federation of Music Clubs.

Pearl Louis will also play the piano. The pieces the 15year-old has chosen are "Mol-to Vivace" movement from the Sonata No. 2 in E Minor by Haydn, and "Golliwog's by Haydn, and "Golliwog's Cakewalk" by Debussy. She has been a first place winner in both the Ursuline Bach Contest and the New Orleans Music Teachers' Association

Sonata Contest.

Two string players, Sigurd Verret and Jonathan Williams, will round out the pro-Sigurd, a 9-year-old gram. cellist, and winner of the 1971
String Festival, will play
"Spring Song," Opus 43, No. 1
by Nolck, and "Montagnarde
d'Auvergne" from "A Suite Francaise," Opus 114 by Bazelaire.

Twelve-year-old Jonathan Williams, recipient of the Crusade for Strings 1970 Award, will play "Fifth Aire Varie" by Dancla, and "Perpetual Motion" by Bohm on his vio-

The Irving Carr award will be presented before the last performance on the program, which will be Ann Arnoult's dance.
