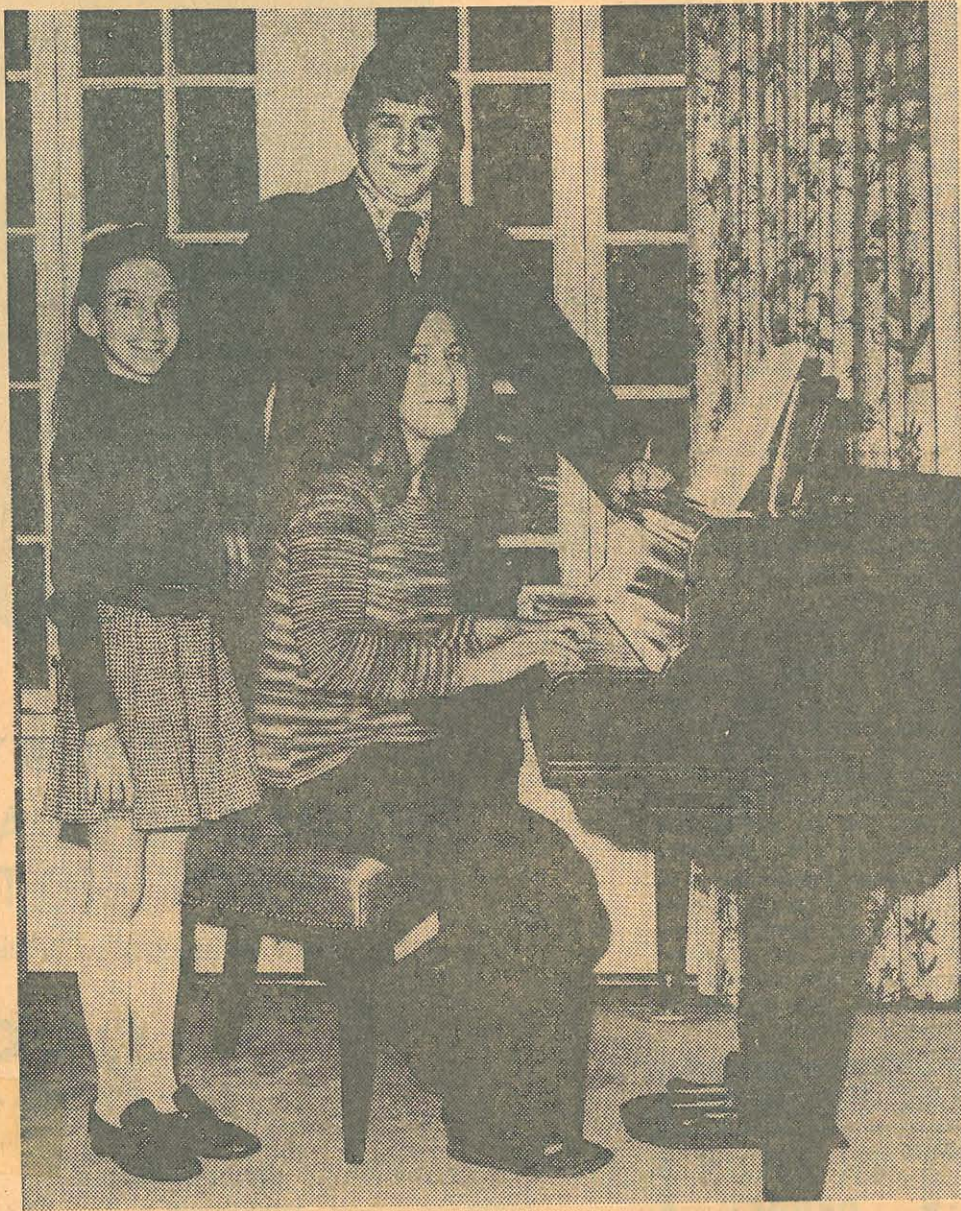

PROGRAM FEATURES THREE MUSICIANS AND A BALLERINA

An abundance of artistry has been assembled for the Junior Philharmonic Society recital to be held at 10:45 a.m. Saturday in Dixon Hall on the Newcomb College campus. Three musicians and a ballerina will offer solo performances in the third concert of the season.

The program will begin with a piano rendition, Three Preludes by Kabalevsky, executed by previous Junior Philharmonic winner Heather Guttenberg. A seven-year student of the instrument, Heather has also won first place in the New Orleans Music Teachers' Association contemporary music contest, first place in the Ursuline Bach competition, and rated three stars in the Louisiana Federation of Mu-

sic Clubs annual piano tournament. A sophomore at Benjamin Franklin High School, the 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Guttenberg enjoys swimming, tennis, and sewing in her spare time.

George T. Dugazon III, a student of the French horn for four years, will follow with Little Suite, from Hungarian Folk Songs, by Mihaly Hajdu. George's previous accomplishments include appointment to the Louisiana All State Band, the Louisiana All Star Marching Band, and the honor band at the Louisiana Tech summer music camp. The 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Dugazon II has also received first place in the NORD concerto contest and superior ratings for solo and

ensemble performances from the Louisiana Music Educators Association. A senior at Brother Martin High School, George's other interests include football, baseball, and basketball.

Pam Bolding, a pianist from Pineville High School in Pineville, Louisiana, is next on the program. Pam, who has studied piano for five years, has performed with the Northwestern State University Symphony Orchestra and the New Orleans Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra Youth Concert. Pam also composes songs, one of which, "Is Anybody There," was published last year by Broadman Publishers. The 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob R. Bolding will play "Reflets dans L'eau" by Debussy, "Fantasie-Impromptu" by Chopin, and Preambule from the sixth violin sonata by Bach.

Gretchen Newburger, a fifth grader at Metairie Park Country Day School, has studied ballet for three years. In her spare time, Gretchen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth E. Newburger, enjoys track and gymnastics, fields in which she also excels. She will conclude the morning program with a rendition of Pizzicato from "Sylvia" by Delibes.
