## New director at the helm for Oscars '90

Can anyone who lived through it forget such low points of last spring's Academy Awards broadcast as the joint appearance of Rob Lowe and Snow White and the "Talent of Tomorrow"? There's one small sign that the Oscar people would like to try. Gilbert Cates, former head of the Directors Guild, has been invited to produce the 1990 Oscar show, set for Monday, March 26 at the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion.

The choice of the veteran director of movies ("I Never Sang for My Father"; "Oh God! Book II") and television ("Hoote-

nanny," "Faerie Tale Theater") by new academy president Karl Malden was announced much earlier than usual, giving Cates a head start on preparation. Cates says that he wants to "take advantage of the benefit of time," and promises that he has very "definite ideas" about how to mount the show.

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
